# <sup>7</sup>3-Missionaries Murdered In Brutal Congolese Attack

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (NC) - Congolese troops have murdered 11 missionary priests and seven African Sisters in the worst outbreak of violence against the Catholic missions since this strife-torn nation became independent a year and a half ago.

The priests and nuns were killed along with a large number of Africans in the city of Kongolo in secessionist Katanga province, according to reports which were con-

Some said the priests and nuns were killed by central government troops. Others said the assassins were soldiers loyal to Antoine Gizenga, procommunist leader of Oriental province and ousted vice premier of the central government who was placed under house arrest (Jan. 14) by central government soldiers in Stanleyville, capital of Oriental province.

### NO IDENTIFICATION

None of the reports identified the victims. The only missionary priests in Kongolo, however, were 15 Belgian priests of the Congregation of the Holy Ghost. There was also one Holy Ghost Brother, also a Belgian. Kongolo is the See city of Bishop Gustave Bouve, C.S.Sp., a native of Belgium.

There were 34 Sisters in the city belonging to the congregations of the Daughters of the Cross and of the Sisters of the Holy and Immaculate Heart of

According to dispatches, the massacre was reported to Archbishop Louis Van Steene, W.F., of Bukavu by missioners who had escaped from Kongolo to Bukavu, 225 miles

Reports state that the murtook place on January 1. On that date President Moise Tshombe of Katanga said that Katangese troops had evacuated Kongolo and that central government troops had invaded the area, killing hundreds of persons and burning villages as they advanced on the city.

Missioners reaching Bukavu reportedly said that the bodies of all 18 murdered priests and nuns had been recovered. Another missioner was taken away, they reported, and has

### Pope Mourns Missionaries Slain In Congo

VATICAN CITY - Pope John XXIII likened the massacre of a score of missionaries in the Congo to a killing of Abel by

Addressing his general audience, the Pope said the slaughter in Kongolo in modern Katanga was repetition of the very beginnings of human societies — 'brothers killing brothers."

"Abel is well represented by these missionaries," he said.

Gripped by emotion, the Pope

"In the face of facts of this kind, do you want the Father of the Catholic family to be silent? It is the heart of the Vicar of Christ which speaks. Eyes must stream with tears for what has happened."

Pope John appealed to all present for prayers for the murdered missionaries.

Earlier, the full membership of the Central Preparatory Commission of the Ecumenical Council recited De Profundis for victims and Congolese people.

He will give a series of talks on that general subject during the semi-annual Conference of Priests to be held on Thursday and Friday, Jan. 25 and 26, at the St. John Vianney Minor Seminary. Sessions will be conducted on each of the two days from 11 a.m. to 4

Bishop Wright is a recognized authority on the Second Vatican

### PREPARE AGENDA

At this gathering of the hierarchy from throughout the entire world, the Holy Father said, the Council will give the Church the "possibility of contributing more efficaciously to the solution of problems of the modern

The Pittsburgh prelate has been serving as a member of the Theological Commission of the Ecumenical Council. Its task has been to prepare the agenda of the Council in matters of faith and morals.

"This means the whole area of dogma and morality, the creed and the code of Catholic Christianity," Bishop Wright explained. "Our commisssion has been at work in regular sessions for over a vear and it is made up of over two score members from all over the

# **Further Expansion Needed** At John Vianney Seminary

Still further expansion of St. John Vianney Minor Seminary and greatly increased high school facilities.

These are the two major goals of the 1962 Development Fund Campaign of the Diocese of Miami announced this week by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll. Three specific projects were named as the most critically-urgent for construction by the Diocese this year.

● A building providing another new dormitory and a larger Chapel for St. John Vianney

Minor Seminary.

- A new high school at Fort Myers, which will be the first Catholic high school on the West coast of the Diocese.
- High school facilities for girls at the Monsignor Pace High School, North Dade County, where only boys are now enrolled, to make it co-institu-

In addition, Bishop Carroll said, there is a great and immediate need for these projects:

- Cardinal Gibbons High School, Fort Lauderdale - additions to both the boys' and the girls' facilities.
- LaSalle High School for boys, Southeast Miami - addi-
- Immaculata Academy for girls, Southeast Miami - additions.
- Notre Dame Academy for girls, Northeast Miami - Additions.
- Newman Center at Palm Beach Junior College, West Palm Beach.

A minimum goal of one million dollars has been set for this year's Development Fund Campaign, although construction cost of all the projects mentioned would be well in excess of that amount. The final figure for the 1961 Development Fund Campaign was \$1,030,000.

Father Lamar Genovar, pastor of Our Lady Queen of Martyrs parish, Fort Lauderdale, has been appointed as representative and coordinator for the Bishop in the campaign this year, a capacity in which he also served last year.

Frank Mackle has been named as General Chairman for the drive and Anthony Abraham as General Co-Chairman.

### PASTORS MEET

Under the direction of Father Genovar, Mr. Mackle and Mr. Abraham an organization of priests and laymen is being created throughout the Diocese to operate on Deanery and parish levels. An Advance Gifts phase of the campaign will begin shortly, to be followed by a Special Gifts phase.

The General Phase of the campaign will give the thousands of families residing in the Diocese, as well as many of the seasonal transient visitors, an opportunity to participate.

This activity will come to a climax on Sunday, March 4, to be known as "Stay at Home Sunday." At that time an army of more than 5,000 men and women will make personal calls at every Catholic home in the Diocese in order to give every Catholic

# Throngs To Hear Bishop Boza

A four-day religious observance for the Spanish-speaking persons in the Greater Miami area will begin with a triduum of prayer on Wednesday, Jan. 24, and conclude during Solemn Pontifical Mass in Miami Stadium, Saturday, Jan. 27.

Bishop Coleman F. Carroll will sing the Mass at an altar which will be erected in the center of the stadium field. A mile-long procession of Latin-Americans carrying lighted

torches will originate at the Dade County Armory Parade Grounds and will enter the stadium during public recitation of the Rosary.

Highlight of the "Concentracion Religiosa" sponsored by the Diocese of Miami will be the appearance and sermon of Auxiliary Bishop Eduardo Boza Masvidal of Havana, number one religious exile from Cuba who last September was physically expelled and sent to Spain by the communist forces of Premier Fidel Castro.

FEARLESS CRITICISM

Known for his outspoken and fearless criticisms of the Castro regime, Bishop Boza will come to Miami from Bogota, Colombia, and will be the guest of Bishop Carroll during his first visit to the United States. Thousands of Cuban refugees are expected to join with other Latin Americans in the rally ex-

lege in Maynooth. At that time he addressed more than 100 priests from the United States, Australia, England and Ireland.

The Bishop pointed out that the obstacles to the return of Protestant groups to communion with the Holy See are not only religious but also sociological and historical. The problem, he said, is that of reconciling the dictates of a conciliatory spirit with the clear duties of fidelity to the apostolic faith. The opportunity is the area of greatly increased charity, patience and understanding, he declared, adding that if there could not be immediate unity of faith, there must be unity of love expressing itself in common efforts in social, cultural, economic and political relations.

Later addressing a meeting of the Archdiocesan Teachers' Institute in Boston, Bishop Wright gave advice on attitudes that will help to reunite all Christians.

### SPIRIT OF CONCORD

'Catholics should have tact," he said, "so that the spirit of concord will hasten the day when our prayers and those of the other Christian churches will be united. We should consider where our attitudes may be offensive."

At the Reformation, he said, the Church did not lose its unity or sanctity, "but the Church was impoverished by

the loss of the people in whose descendants we find so many qualities that we admire."

.. Bishop Wright has been a prominent figure in previous gatherings in the Diocese of Miami. Last September he delivered the sermon at the Mass held in connection with the Labor Day Observance sponsored by the Diocese, and in 1960 he delivered the sermon at the Red Mass celebrated at the Miami Beach Auditorium during the convention of the American Bar Association.

### NAMED BISHOP

A native of Boston, Bishop Wright studied at the Boston Latin School, Boston College, St. John's Seminary, Brighton, and later as secretary to the late William Cardinal O'Connell and Archbishop (now Cardinal) Richard Cushing, both of Bos-

He was consecrated as Auxiliary Bishop of Boston in 1947 and was named as the first Bishop of Worcester in 1959. He became the eighth Bishop of Pittsburgh March 18, 1959.

Bishop Wright is an officer of the French Legion of Honor and is a member of the Order of Merit of Italy.

Among the other numerous positions he has held have been Episcopal Moderator of the Mariological Society; Episcopal Advisor of Lay Retreat Movement and Assistant Chairman of the Education Board of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

# **Linked With Soviet Policy**

NEW YORK (NC) - The Russian Orthodox Church joined the World Council of Churches recently to promote tenets of Soviet foreign policy and to form a common front against Russian Catholicism, according to a reference paper distributed in the U. S. and Canada by the American Committee for Liberation.

It also states that the Soviets' anti-Catholic activities have been stepped up because of a fear that the forthcoming Second Vatican Council will issue an official condemnation of communism.

The paper was compiled by the Institute for the Study of the USSR in Munich, Germany, described as "a free corporation of scholars who have left the Soviet Union." The institute issues a journal edited by a professor B. Ivanov.

### FORMER FEDERAL OFFICIAL

President of the American Committee for Liberation is Howland Sargent, a former State Department official concerned with U.S. information programs abroad.

Russian Orthodox Church was admitted to membership in the World Council of Churches on Nov. 20, 1961.

"Attacks on the Vatican which have recently been appearing in the Soviet ecclesiastical and secular press indicate that the Moscow Patriarchate has joined the World Council of Churches not only to promote the basic theses of Soviet foreign policy but to promote the formation of a common front against Russian Catholicism as an irreconciliable opponent of the materialist world outlook and communist doctrine,' the reference paper states.

### COUNTER MOVE

"This is apparently one reason," the paper continues, "why the Moscow Patriarchate is so active in defending the concept of a federative ecclesiastical union in the ecumenical movement as a counter to the concept of a centralized union as proposed by the Roman Catholic Church.



not been heard from since. The missioners were reported to have told Archbishop Van Steene that the troops involved were those of the central gov-

They said the soldiers beat the priests and nuns before they killed them with automatic weapons.

In Leopoldville, the Congo's capital, Premier Cyrille Adoula of the central government said he had reports that troops led by Col. Joseph Pakassa, Gizenga's cousin, were responsible for the slaughter.

(A broadcast over the Belgian radio indicated the troops loyal to Gizenga were respon-

### OTHER VIOLENCE

A week after the massacre, a report from Kamituga in Kivu province said that two people were injured when a mob attacked a group going to church and threw rocks at the church doors.

The Kongolo killings occurred after a lull in the antimissionary violence that took place early in 1961.

While the first part of 1961 witnessed the flight of missionfrom violence-racked stretches of land covering a third of the Congo's vast territory, the second part of the year witnessed their gradual return.

By the end of the year, most of the missioners who had been forced from their posts had returned.

In January, fighting drove missioners from three missions in North Katanga. This was intertribal warfare in various parts of the Congo after the departure of the former Belgian rulers in the middle of 1960.

The announcement in February of the death of Premier Lumumba, who had been kept in detention since his deposition in 1960, touched off riots and persecution wherever his followers had a free hand. They were in power in parts of Oriental, Kasai, Katanga and Kivu provinces.

On Feb. 14, about 40 White Fathers and White Sisters were arrested and abused in the region of Kasongo, capital of the region of Maniema in Kivu province.

A day later, a region of Kasai province known as the Sankuru became the scene of antimissionary violence. An armed rabble of officerless Congolese soldiers and unemployed youths destroyed the mission of Makula-Kulu.

On Feb. 16, the parish of Kadutu near Kivu's provincial capital of Eukavu came under attack. While the pastor went for help, the attackers broke into the mission house and hunted down the priests. They seized one of them, Father Rene De Vos, W. F., and murdered him.

On Feb. 17, the Oriental province town of Basoko saw Sacred Heart priests arrested, beaten and deported. On Feb. 20, Father Joseph H. Tegels, C.S.J., was murdered

On Feb. 25 in Kivu, a convent of nuns was attacked. But the local people intervened and four of the attackers were killed before the assault was repulsed.

In March all the Passionist missioners in the Diocese of Tshombe and virtually all the Sacred Hearts (Picpus) Fathers in Kole apostolic prefecture were forced to leave.

Seventy-seven missioners in Sankuru were evacuated by the United Nations force there on

June wintessed the destruction by mutinous soldiers of Kafumbe mission in Katanga's Lac Moero prefecture.

During the fighting in Katanga in December a number of schools, hospitals, social centers and churches were hit by shells. Two Sisters were wounded and one priest, an Italian missionary of the Pauline Conwas\_killed. Mission work often came to a halt as the missioners came to the aid of the sick and wounded.



The Patriarch was recently subjected to insults. Two men accosted him and denounced him for not visiting the Indian prisoners. One of the men was a former seminarian, a Goan and a prisoner, the other was a Hindu who called himself a communist.

When the villagers at the scene saw this affront to a man who is known throughout Goa for his work among the poor they gathered around him to kiss his ring. Meanwhile two foreign journalists were hurt in the scuffle as they held back the Patriarch's assailants. Later the assailants apologized to the Patriarch.

The Apostolic Internuncio to India, Archbishop James R. Knox, has appealed through the press of Goa for clothing and blankets for the prisoners captured during the Indian invasion. The Discalced Carmelite Fathers, Auxiliaries of the Red Cross and other persons responded to his appeal.

Earlier the Internuncio had gone on a mission of charity on behalf of Pope John XXIII to the internment camps, bringing cigarets and sports equipment.

An international Catholic charitable unit will be set up in Goa to extend assistance to the needy regardless of religion. All work of reconstruction or expansion on Church property in Goa is at a temporary standstill. Contributions that the Church had received for its work from the Portuguese government have now ceased.

# Catholics Give Protestants **Cross For Sharing Church**

AUGSBURG, Germany (NC) - Catholics in a small Bavarian community who have shared their church with Protestants for several centuries have now donated a cherished cross for the altar in the new church the Protestants are completing.

It happened in the town of Deiningen near here. The gift was accompanied by the comment of the Catholic pastor that, though his congregation found it difficult to part with their cross, they deemed it a fitting gift as a symbol of their deep desire for Christian reunion. The common church arrangement with the Lutherans of Deiningen had been in force for 345 years.

Germany has other examples of shared churches. In Meissen in Soviet-controlled East Germa-

ny, even a cathedral is used by both Catholics and Lutherans. There, behind the Iron Curtain, a uniquely partitioned edifice is a symbol of Christian unity in the face of godless communism.

In Saxony the Lutherans predominate, and they have secured the right for themselves to use the Meissen cathedral for their services because they have no local place of worship of their own. Catholic Bishop Otto Spuelbeck of Meissen readily consents to the arrangement in a spirit of Christian fellowship.

The church has three naves and it is divided in half by a wooden fence which cuts it in the middle. The front section toward the main altar belongs to the Catholics who agree among themselves to choose different hours so as not to disturb one another.


Each sector of the church has a choir loft and organ of its own. The Lutheran altar is located in the center of the middle nave. When the Luthe pastor preaches he turns back on the Catholic sector, but when a priest preaches from the main altar he faces the whole church — as though he were typifying the unity of Christianity in the universal Church.

The American Jewish Committee in a statement expressed hope for cooperation with Catholics and Protestants in a "joint" study" of the encyclical's recommendations.

These developments were disclosed here at a meeting of the board of directors of the National Catholic Social Action Conference who met to map plans for the observance of 1962 as an "encyclical year" devoted to study of Mater et Magistra, whose English title is "Christianity and Social Progress."

The board expressed "gratification" at steps taken by Protestant and Jewish groups to "lay the groundwork for intergroup cooperation with Catholics in all matters pertaining to the civic welfare of local, national and international communities."

It was reported that the Catholic Social Action Conference's executive committee is making plans to clear the way for joint conferences and panel discussions at which Catholics, Protestants and Jews involved in social action will participate

The statement on cooperation of the American Jewish Committee, as made public at the Catholic group's meeting, said:

"In the spirit of mutual regard and cooperation, and motivated by the high Biblical tradition of prophetic justice, the American Jewish Committee has expressed its hopes of cooperating with representatives of the Catholic and Protestant communities in programs devoted to a joint study of principles of social

# Be Generous To Orphans And Dependent Children

The year 'round a group of dedicated Sisters and zealous lay people are engaged in the sometimes sad, but consoling work of caring for orphan and needy children in the diocese. We hear little about them until the day rolls 'round on which traditionally their Christ-like work and their pressing need for assistance are brought home to our people, in order to enlist their ever generous

This coming Sunday is the day when the annual collection is taken up in all parishes in support of the extensive program carried on by the Diocesan Catholic Charities, including the care provided for the orphans and the needy and handicapped children. Especially are we proud of the rapidly rising new St. Joseph Villa in Perrine, made possible through the contributions in last year's Diocesan Development Fund. This new home, which will be opened soon, will extend its arms to many more dependent children than ever before.

In his letter concerning the collection, Bishop Carroll said, "I need not remind you how deserving a little child is of the love and attention we can give him. Perhaps at no time is charity more generous or the motive of giving more pure than when we see Christ in these children, some of whom, like Him, are refugees and homeless; others, like Him, are experiencing suffering at an early age."

We are indeed obliged to love all or neighbors. But some by the very nature of their predicament more easily appeal to the heart, more deeply stir pity and sympathy. These little children fall into this category. Our tradition of mercy towards them will surely be strengthened and given new honor as we come again

### **Peril To Private Schools**

Some people who have not followed very closely the extremely important debate on federal aid to education have been shocked to learn that the entire private school system in the United States can in the foreseeable future be destroyed if the government limits its financial assistance only to public schools.

This is not an idle statement. At the dedication of a school last Sunday, Bishop Coleman F. Carroll reminded the Catholic parents assembled there that their sacrificial donations alone made possible the new institution, while at the same time they are carrying out their obligation to support the public school system. He stated that if federal aid is channeled to public schools only, then a third burden will be placed on their shoulders. He added, "if such a program were to go into effect, it is my belief that it would soon bring about the end of the private school system."

This most disturbing thought merits the careful consideration of every adult in the diocese. Again we urge you to become better acquainted with the issues involved and be able intelligently to discuss the matters with others. After all, this potential legislation will affect the homes, education and the bread and butter plans of most Catholic homes.

Very helpful information can be found in the recent study released by the Legal Department of the NCWC in Washington which after an exhaustive study of the whole question came to the conclusion that a general program of federal aid to education which includes church-related schools is constitutional. It shows in detail how any such program of aid that ignores the private school "discriminates against children attending non-public schools."

This study gives the startling information that Catholic parents saved the nation \$1.8 billion in the year of 1960 alone by building their own schools which otherwise would have caused a huge additional tax burden to all Americans.

Catholics should inform themselves of these facts in order that they may be able to draw their own conclusions and make their wishes known to their legislators. This is one of those vital matters which should not be ignored in the hope of someone else will take care of it.

### Crusade For Auto Safety

A civic project under way in Miami at present which is worthy of everyone's cooperation is the Auto Safety Crusade. Its purpose is to emphasize careful, courteous driving as a means of reducing accidents. It will do this through a series of public programs designed to bring home to all of us the moral responsibilities involved in driving.

The more we ponder the carnage on the road nowadays, the more it seems that safe driving is closely related to the practice of love of neighbor. For instance, St. Paul gave us a blueprint of love in action in 1st Corinthians, Chapter 13, which could well be applied as a description of a conscientious, careful driver.

Such a driver is "patient," the first descriptive adjective Paul puts on love of neighbor, which means of course he is willing to hold down his impulse to show or inform the other guy how stupid he is. He is "kind," remembering that even the bungling driver is a human being and deserves consideration. He "does not envy" the fellow who passed him so fast that he is determined to catch him at the next corner.

He is not pretentious, not puffed up, which means he



is not one of those road menaces who want to show off their high cylinder job and make others feel they are traveling in ox-carts. He is not "ambitious," that is, he does not mind too much if someone else leads the pack down the street. He "is not self-seeking," refusing to take his half of the road out of the middle. He "thinks no evil," and therefore wastes no time reflecting on how to teach the thoughtless driver a lesson that will scare the hair off his head. He "bears with all things . . . endures all things," not allowing anger to becloud his judgment and cause a reckless turn or maneuver, and refuses to make an issue out of every incident on the road that irritates him. He "hopeth all things" . . . that some day once again it may be a pleasure to take a drive in a car.

The Auto Safety Crusade should win our cooperation and remind us that love of neighbor still binds us when in an automobile.

# Role Of Laity In The Church Important Topic For Council

Addressing their attention to the

faithful, they encouraged discussion of the Council and outlined "the area in which your talk, your writings and your thought about the coming Council" should be contained - if they are to be true to the spirit of the Church.

The Dutch bishops point out that an adjustment of the apostolate is being requested by priests and laity to take account of the changed circumstances of the times. This adjustment, according to the Bishops, must be based on a correct understanding of the essential structure of the Church as contrasted with the accretion of customs, attitudes and practices that have grown up around the Church and are only temporary. The aim will be not only to make the Church more effective but also more attractive so that it will achieve that "splendid form" by which, as Pope John says, she will become "a gentle invitation" to others.

This desire for true reform will mean criticism by the faithful and the Bishops say that they realize that zeal for the house of God will underlie "the frankness with which the believer complains about certain shortcomings in the Church." They have no intention of suppressing this "public opinion" but they ask only that it be competent, loyal and loving, free from bitterness and resentment and reluctant to point out the mistakes of the Church.

I wish every American

Catholic would read this pastoral as we do need loving and competent discussion of the role of the layman in the Church in the United States. By accident of history we have come to think that the layman is merely the passive object of the Church's concern. In the early days ( 's country, for the most part only the clergy were educated and so they were hesitant to depute responsible apostolic work to the laity.

Today the situation is altogether different with doctors, lawyers and Ph. D.s in almost every parish. Yet we still hear jokes about our Catholic Action as "the apathy of the laity to the inertia of the clergy" or as "the organized interference of the clergy in the apostolic mission of the laity."

That the layman is not an ordained priest is crystal clear. But he is by the very fact of Baptism an apostle. As the Dutch Bishops say: "One cannot therefore support a distinction in the Church between the laity and the clergy with the fact that the clergy must take care of God's Kingdom while the laity, as the passive object of this care, is characterized by a secular mission." The laity have the duty to manifest the grace of Christ to the world about them.

The pastoral refers to the problem of "the Church's confrontation with the order of life within the world." It sees a marvelous opportunity opening up before the Church. For the first time in history, men seek a world-wide order for society and the universality of Christian love has "its first great opportunity to bear real fruit with modern efficiency."

Moreover, the Bishops also show that the Church is confronted by Marxist, humanist and existentialist philosophies: while the Church cannot identify itself with these philosophies, it can lay a finger upon the truths found in these movements and reveal them as the source of the persuasiveness of the false philosophies.




### Don't Expect Schools To Do Parents' Job AN ALTAR BOY NAMED "SPECK"

Some parents expect more wonders to be worked out in our Catholic schools than the Church does. You might say they have more

faith in our schools than the Church does, which is really going some, because the Church never lets up in her emphasis on the portance of a



atholic educa- Father Walsh

These parents expect the schools to perform miracles, especially in the character formation of their children. The Church does not. The parents think of the school as the first and most effective means of training children. The Church says this is not true, that the home instead ranks before the school

Many young parents instinctively assume the role of teachers in the home, but they are quick to surrender to a school teacher some essential duties which should be carried out only by themselves.

as a training ground.

Take the matter of character formation or moral training, Sound psychologists who have studied the moral development of children agree that from the months of infancy on the child is greatly influenced by what he hears and sees in the home. His mind is far more sensitive than it appears to be. He constantly receives impressions which leave their mark for good or bad.

Even when the child seems to have ingenuity enough only to shake a rattle and turn over, the words and actions of parents are setting up mental patterns in his mind. Even then he is forming a code of conduct which will later influence his own thoughts and deeds.

"Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is

old, he will not depart from it." This is ancient wisdom borne out by experience. No school can ever take the place of parents in these earliest years, only the parents can run the classroom in the home. As they speak and act, the child learns and character develops.

In the light of this isn't it easy to see what a great responsibility parents have to let themselves be guided by moral principles in all their home dealings? The infant absorbs silently the home drama being played out. The older child, with the wax-like mind, with natural gifts of imitation, shows clearly what he is learning from the teachers in the home.

Parents may shout for hours about what is right and wrong, but if they themselves have no respect for the same rule of conduct, their angry sermons are merely hot air. The power of the mother and father lies not in speeches, but in deeds.

If they insist on children saying morning and night prayers and neglect to do so themselves, the children will form no lasting habit. If they get the youngsters ready for Mass and stay home themselves, later on the children will do the same. The father may loudly demand that a boy go to confession, but if he hasn't been there for a year, the boy will not be impressed with its importance.

Children are slapped for using "bad language," but how can they consider such words wrong when the parents spice their conversations with the same expressions? The boy especially is lectured about the evil of stealing. No wonder he becomes confused when he hears his father bragging about putting over a shady business deal on someone.

Day by day, the moral principles, right and wrong, are taught in home life in every

word and attitude and action of the mother and father. The meaning of good and evil is deeply impressed on the little ones by listening, by seeing how the parents treat each other, how they speak of neighbors, how they regard the church, the priesthood,

the parish.

The school can do nothing more than supplement good home training or contradict bad example found in the home. Every teacher knows that if the home fails to provide the right kind of moral example, he is helpless to cope with the problem. Or, as often happens, if children are faithful to religious duties during school years, when carried along with the crowd, not long after graduation they

usually fall back into the parents' pattern of neglect.

Catholic homes, no matter how poor or heavily burdened, have all the super-natural, spiritual help needed to create the right atmosphere for the moral growth of their children. Of course, this is not easy. It demands self-restraint on the part of parents. It requires less talk and more action.

They have to be less selfish, more mindful of the children. They must put their faith in God to work in the home, making Christ the head of the house, seeing His laws as their own guide to family peace, using family prayers as a means of binding the members together as they grow to maturity.

This training cannot be found in even our excellent schools. Only the nome can provide it.


# Why You Can't Afford Not To Meditate

We don't mean vocal prayer; rather we believe that interior prayer or meditation is an absolute necessity for spiritual survival today. All this means is a lifting up of your mind and heart to Christ. in a sanctifying conversation.

If you have a memory, a mind and a heart, you can do it. And you should. Later on, a simple method easy enough for anyone will be given here.

There are two great reasons why you should pray in this manner. The first is that it's the only way to stay in concious contact with Christ. Every sincere seeker of Christ wants to get into contact with Him as soon and as perfectly as possible. Furthermore, He wants to maintain this active contact so as to develop a loving friendship with Our Lord leading to a partnership with Him in all one's daily activities.

This is obviously impossible unless there is frequent and daily contact with the mind and heart of Christ. Without prayer there will never be that prayerful reflection on

Christ that leads to an everincreasing love and imitation of Him. Without prayer, a man will never receive those honest insights into himself and his life that mark the beginnings of a more profound conversion to the ways of God.

A second basic reason for the necessity of mental prayer is found in the words of Our Savior: "Pray lest you enter into temptation." After repeating the same sentence St. Teresa of Avila adds in her "Interior Castle": "He who neglects mental prayer needs not a devil to carry him to hell, but he brings himself there by his own hands." St. Alphonsus Liguori states that "it is morally impossible for him who neglects meditation to live without sin."

St. Peter of Alcantara sums up some of the benefits of


meditation in the following words: "In mental prayer, the souls is purified from its sins ... nourished with charify ... confirmed in faith . . . and strengthened in hope . . . The mind expands . . . the heart is purified . . . temptation is conquered . . . sadness is dispelled ... drooping powers revive ... tepidity ceases . . . and the rust of vice disappears." (Treatise on Praver)

Don't say that you haven't time. The busier you are the more you need this kind of prayer. Without it you're like a spiritual cripple just staggering along on your road to eternal life. With it you'll accomplish twice as much as before spiritually and otherwise. Meditation is an absolute must for sane daily living. It will put order, peace and refreshment into your everyday life. What's more, it will put Christ there - where He belongs!

Pope John And The Industry Council Plan By MSGR. GEORGE G. HIGGINS

Some commentators on the new social encyclical, "Mater et Magistra," ("Christianity and Social Progress") have observ-

ed that Pope John XXIII seems to be less interested in the so-called Industry Council Plan than was Pope Pius XI. This is only partially



Pope John, in Msgr. Higgins "Mater et Magistra," carefully avoids giving his approval to any particular method of organizing or reorganizing economic life. Moreover even his terminology is somewhat different from that of Pius XI in his encyclical "Quadragesimo Anno" and in his later encyclical on communism, "Divini Redemptoris." Pius XI used the terminology of "corporativism" which, in English, has been freely translated into the Industry Council Plan.

Pope John XXIII, on the other

hand, carefully avoids using the corporative terminology employed by Pius XI.

The reason for this, according to Father Gerald Dion of Laval University in Quebec, is that Pope John is mostly preoccupied with the practical aspects of the problem. "He is a pastor and not a jurist," said Father Dion.

"He knows all the discussions" raised by the formulas of Pius XI and Pius XII and the misunderstandings ed by these discussions. So he keeps from any formulizing and even goes so far as to avoid using the words 'corporation' and 'corporative organization.' "

It would be a serious mistake to conclude that Pope John is any less interested than was Pius XI in the basic principles of social reconstruction underlying the so-called Industry Council Plan. The basic principles of social reconstruction outlined in "Mater et Magistra"

are the same as those which are to be found in Pius XI's encyclical "Quadragesimo Anno." Father Dion summarizes them as follows:


"Economic order will not come naturally, only by free competition, free enterprise and free initiative, although a certain degree of freedom must always be safeguarded. Intermediate bodies are natural and necessary if we want to avoid State totalitarianism. Institutional cooperation at all levels must be organized between the agents of the economy. Intermediate bodies must cooperate among themselves and with the government in order to help it play its positive role in the economy for the common good, national and international."

These are the basic principles underlying the Industry Council Plan. Pope John doesn't tell us, in detail, how they are to be put into practice. His approach,

I repeat, is very flexible. In the words of Father Dion, "Pope John opens the doors to all kinds of institutional cooperation among those interested at the different levels of production, strongly insisting on any organization of the economy. which takes into account the national and international common good.

"The State has a positive role to play-and this role must be accomplished with respect for legitimate autonomies and with the participation of all interested groups."

In substance, this is what proponents of the Industry Cour cil Plan have been saying all along. They have definitely been on the right track. At times. perhaps, their approach and their terminology have been a little too inflexible. If so, the new encyclical "Mater et Magistra" can serve as atimely istra" can serve as a timely corrective. I repeat, however, that the new encyclical should not be interpreted to mean that these principles underlying the Industry Council Plan are no longer of any great importance.







pected to attract more than 40,-000 persons.

Evening devotions which comprise the triduum of prayer will be conducted nightly, Jan. 24, 25 and 26 in eight parishes of the Greater Miami area. Confessions will be heard during the triduum as well as before Mass in the Miami Stadium in preparation for the observance.

Spanish speaking priests now stationed in South Florida will conduct devotions in Gesu Church, Corpus Christi Church, SS. Cuban refugees in San Juan, Puerto Rico, recently heard Bishop Boza urge them to unite spiritually in their fight for freedom and social justice.

### EXPRESSES HOPE

flew to San Juan from Bogota for a three-day visit during which he advised members of Catholic Organizations on questions pertaining to apostolic

"The object of my meeting with them," the prelate stated, "is mainly to inspire them with confidence, so that they do not disintegrate but continue working and forming themselves spiritually to constitute just one people, although dispersed in different

Bishop Boza said Premier Fidel Castro's recent admission that he is a Communist is helpful from one point of view because it gives his sympathizers no excuse to say he is not a Red. According to the Bishop, who is a native of Cuba, there are only about 120 priests in all of the island to minister to the spiritual needs of about six million Catholics. He expressed the hope that the Cuban people would not have to resist the communist regime too much

### LAUNCHES BULLETIN

In Bogota, Bishop Boza has launched a monthly bulletin for distribution to Cuban Catholics in exile. "Everything that nourishes hate is an aid to the enemy," he said in the first is-

"Love, first between those of us who think alike, overcomes defects and errors. We must also love those who do not think as we do, because only love is fruitful and constructive. If some have done harm, God will call them to account for their wrong. It is up to us to say daily with a sincere heart: Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us."

A Spanish language program featuring messages from Bishop Boza has been inaugurated on radio station WWL in New Or-

Sponsored by the Cuban Freedom Committee to challenge the communist propaganda of the Cuban radio, tapes by Bishop Boza are presented each Sunday from 9:30 to 10 p.m. The Christian versus the Marxist conception of man and the need for creating a community of ideals in Latin America are emta del Este, Uruguay, on

The Archbishop said an attitude of mourning on the part of Bolivian Catholics would show their solidarity with the persecuted Church in Cuba. He also called for prayers for the conversion of communists.

LA PAZ, Bolivia (NC) -Catholics in this South American country should greet the presence of an envoy from communist-dominated Cuba with a demonstration of mourning, a Bolivian prelate said here.

Archbishop Abel Antezana y Rojas, C.M.F., of La Paz was referring to the visit of Cuban Undersecretary of Foreign Rffairs Carlos Olivares to Bolivia's President Victor Paz Estenssoro.

Olivares is visiting a number of Latin American nations in an effort to dissuade them from taking action against the regime of Cuba's Marxist Premier Fidel Castro at the Inter-American Conference opening in Pun-

# Cardinal Again Criticizes Brazil's Stand On Castro

RIO DE JANEIRO (NC) -Jaime Cardinal de Barros Camara has again voiced criticism of Brazil's government for its refusal to take a stand against communism and the Red regime of Cuban Premier Fidel Castro.

The Archbishop of Rio De Janeiro commented on reports that the government is opposed to strong action against Castro by the Inter-American Conference opening Jan. 22 in Punta del Este.

Brazil's Foreign Minister San Tiago Dantas stated that sanctions against Cuba would deny its right of self-determination.

The Cardinal said:

"What a joke — this talk about 'self - determination!' It appears that this principle only applies when Soviet Russia approves and confirms, or when it at least serves Russia's iniquitous interests and perverse intentions."

Last November, Cardinal de Barros Camara praised Latin American nations that had broken diplomatic relations with Cuba and called for "moral sanctions" against the Castro government.

# Andes Missioner's Lunches Winning Fight For Students

PUNO, Peru (NC) - School attendance has jumped 25 per cent in this remote city in southern Peru, thanks to the efforts of a New York City missioner.

A veteran of 18 years in the missions of Peru, Father Robert E. Kearns, M.M., is directing a school lunch program here which is accomplishing what Peru's Ministry of Education has been trying to do for years - bring more Indian children into the class-

The New York Maryknoller is the organizer and coordinator of the vast program which aims

to give two free meals a day to 70,000 students. A number of organizations are taking part in the operation, including the Peruvian and U.S. governments, Catholic Relief Services National Catholic Welfare Conference and International Petroleum Company.

At present Father Kearns is feeding 26,000 students daily, including children in 50 schools operated by the Seventh Day Adventists in the Department of Puno. He hopes to feed 4,000 additional children by the end of the school year here.

# Castro Persecution Building Cuba Red Leader Red Cross Balked In Cuba Faith In God, Cuban Writes

The sufferings which most of the Cuban people now endure under the communist - controlled government of Fidel Castro may result in a stronger faith in God, according to a non-Catholic resident of the island.

In a letter to a Miami priest, the writer pointed out that Christmas was for the most part a "sad" occasion in

Those who were able to buy tne usual Christmas fare had children or other members of their families separated and living in many parts of the world or in prison," she related. "The poorer people celebrated their first communist Christmas with no pork, few chickens, no eggs, no butter, no oil, etc. Masses were held in all the churches which were full to overflowing.

"How sad it is that people have to suffer before they realize that nothing can be achieved without the power of God," the writer declared. "As a rule the churches here are noisy and little attention is paid to the service. This year you could hear a pin drop and there was no mad rush to leave the church at the first possible moment.


"It was as if they felt it was a refuge and that they were reluctant to leave the peace and safety of the church. Even I, though not a Catholic, have faith that this cannot last, but even so there are days when I question how is it that communism can have so much success."

Emphasizing that the Cuban families who remain on the island are "luckier" than those who have left, the writer, whose identity must remain secret, clarified her statements by pointing out that "They will have had an experience which could change their ideas as to the part religion should play in their lives, because this has to be lived; not explained to be understood."

Most Cubans, she continued, realize that communism is "one great lie and everything is said and done to further the anti - Christ forces throughout the world. Less food to lower their resistance. continual brainwashing when the resistance is low, military displays and big shows, and the lionizing of young people

GENEVA (NC) - The International Red Cross has stated that it has been thwarted in its attempt to comply with a petition requesting aid for political prisoners in Cuba.

The petition was drawn up by the Committee for the Defense of Cuban Political Prisoners, headed by ousted Aux-

iliary Bishop Eduardo Boza Masvidal of Havana.

The Committee has asked the Red Cross to assure that provisions such as food, clothing and medicines be delivered to the prisoners. The petition also said that the prisoners in Cuba were terrorized by their jailers and limited in the number of visitiors they could have.

### NCWC SCHOOL-AID STUDY SAYS

### Survival At Stake Private School

Following is the final article in a series condensing the study entitled "The Constitutionality of the Inclusion of Church-Related Schools in Federal Aid to Education." The study was prepared by the Legal Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

From this study's review certain conclusions may be clearly drawn:

1. Education in church-related schools is a public function which, by its nature, is deserving of governmental support.

2. There exists no constitutional bar to aid to education in church-related schools in a degree proportionate to the value of the public function it performs. Such aid to the secular function may take the form of matching grants or long-term loans to institutions, or of scholarships, tuition payments, or tax benefits.

3. The parent and child have a constitutional right to choose a church-related educational institution meeting reasonable state requirements.

4. Government in the United States is without power to impose upon the people a single educational system in which all must participate.

These conclusions, drawn from the relevant Supreme Court decisions, represent only a part of the justification for aid to education in church lated schools.

What must also be considered are results which would flow from a denial of such aid exclusively to the public schools.

Some of these results would raise serious constitutional problems, while others would render meaningless certain constitutional protections presently en-

These results should be carefully pondered when any program of major Federal aid to education is being considered, because they would plainly entail a transformation of a free and pluralist American society into a society in which uniformity would be certain and freedom doubtful.

Massive spending solely for public schools would result in a critical weakening of church-related schools, ultimate closing of many of them.

If the No Establishment Clause of the First Amendment operates to exclude the inculcation of religion in the public schools, what, by constitutional definition, is "religion"?

### MEANINGLESS DISTINCTION

To make a distinction based upon whether the religious value system embraced the supernatural would be meaningless and invidious.

Obviously, under an absolutist interpretation of the First Amendment, such valueinculcation must pose serious problems. Again, however, rationality should point to the solution.

But if value-teaching may, without First Amendment objection, be offered in the public schools which are supported completely by government, then it cannot be said that no government aid can be granted to education in church-related schools because the church-related schools, too, offer a program which inculcates values.

Several recent Supreme Court decisions show a hospitality '? change and a recognition the demands of justice are not necessarily met by such slogans as "freedom of contract," or "separate but equal" - or 'separation of Church and State" (where that phrase is separation).

The problems involved are predominantly practical: no constitutional bar exists to the aid herein described to education in church-related schools. Practicalities, not slogans, should govern the determinations to be made - determinations which give clear recognition to the rights of parents, the rights of children, the enlargement of freedom, and the preservation of the nation.

# McCormack Favors Private School Loans But Backs Aid For Public Schools Only

new Speaker of the House said here he favors U.S. loans to help parochial and other private schools, but he would vote for a bill which aided public schools

Rep. John McCormack of Massachusetts, former Majority Leader who was elected Speaker to succeed the late Rep. Sam Rayburn of Texas, ade the statement to reporters.

McCormack, a Catholic, has been under attack by some newspapers and organizations, notably Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State, because he announced support for private school loans at the last session, a proposal they oppose.

Opponents also charged that because of his belief in Federal loans for nonpublic schools, he would be prevented from supporting a public school assistance bill.

"I have always advocated school legislation and strengthening the whole elementary and secondary system. This includes both public private schools,"

"I recognize that you can't legislate for private schools in the same way you can for public schools, but Congress can legislate specifically.

"In addition to public school aid, I advocate long-term loans at reasonable interest rates to private schools for building classrooms and for teachers' salaries, to teach science, mathematics and foreign languages.

# 'Across-The-Board' U.S. Aid Is Out, Kennedy Again Says

den Kennedy stressed again in his State of the Union message his belief that "across - theboard" U.S. aid to nonpublic schools is unconstitutional.

The Chief Executive's comment came in his appeal to congress to adopt the administration's \$2.3 billion, threeyear program of help for public schools.

The bill, providing assistance for construction and payment of teachers' salaries, passed the Senate last session, but did not come to the House floor because the House Rules Committee denied clearance for debate.

A watered-down version was prepared for House action, but members voted 242 to 169 not to consider it. The bill's feature was a one-year, \$325 million program for public school construc-

The outlook for action on the President's new request remained dim after his address.

House education leaders have indicated they do not expect action on the bill this season because they hope to avoid the controversy in an election year. One of them, Rep. Adam Clayton Powell of New York, chairman of the House Education Committee, said that despite the President's address he still does not expect action.

President Kennedy's comment on the constitutionality of Federal aid to nonpublic - parochial and other private schools came in this sentence in which he referred to the administration bill introduced last

"I believe the bill . . . offered the minimum amount required by our needs and - in terms of across-the-board aid - the maximum scope permitted by our Constitution.

He added: "I therefore see no reason to weaken or withdraw that bill; and I urge its passage at this session."

The Chief Executive's first statement that parochial and other private schools should be denied "across-the-board"



in a message to Congress detailing his education proposals. At that time, he said:

"In accordance with the clear prohibition of the Constitution, no elementary or secondary school funds are allocated for constructing church schools or paying church school teachers'

This comment precipitated a major controversy in the past Congress, on the constitutionality of such aid.

# **New Nativity Church, School Dedicated By Bishop Carroll**

Federal aid to education which includes only public institutions could eventually be responsible for the destruction of the entire private school system in the United States, Bishop Coleman F. Carroll said Sunday following the blessing of a new provisional church, an elementary school and two convents in Broward County.

The convent in St. Matthew parish, Hallandale was blessed at 2 p.m. and the Nativity Church, school and convent in Hollywood were blessed at 4 p.m. Pontifical Low Mass was offered in the new church immediately following dedication ceremonies.

Speaking to a congregation of more than 800 clergy, religious and laity, Bishop Carroll commended the parents of children enrolled in parochial schools for their sacrificial donations and reminded them "that by your taxes you also share the burden of operating the public school system. Because you have the courage of your own convictions you have assumed these obligations," the Bishop declared

"There is a determination on the part of the government to give federal aid to schools to assist them in construction and help them in paying teachers' salaries," Bishop Carroll continued. "That is its intention and desire. If the federal government gives money to public schools, that will be the equivalent of a third burden which you will be carrying.

"If such a program were to go into effect it is my belief that it would soon bring about the end of private school systems," he said. "This is a young parish developing at a rather rapid rate and it will be necessary to increase the school facilities in the very near future. If an additional burden is placed upon you by way of taxation it will make it difficult for you and your pastor to give the minimum in educational facilities in the parish.

"When the Bishops of this country call this injustice they are only calling it to your attention so that you may make your wishes known," Bishop Carroll declared.

"The Catholic Church is interested in public schools and interested and hopeful that they may be improved," the Bishop said.

"Federal aid is necessary in particular areas of the country but federal aid should be given not only to children who attend public schools but to those who attend private schools. If there is to be federal aid it should not be discriminatory but to all and for the benefit of all."

Bishop Carroll also addressed the hundreds of boy 1 girls attending the ceremonies in an appeal for additional vocations to the priesthood and Sisterhood. Urging each to pray daily that they will be blessed by God with a call to the religious life, Bishop Carroll reminded them that the "great shortage of priests and Sisters will continue unless parents recognize vocations as the greatest blessing that can come to a family and encourage and nurture vocations to the religious life in their homes."

Msgr. William Barry, P.A., pastor, St. Patrick parish, Miami Beach, preached the sermon during the Mass at which representatives of religious orders stationed in South Florida and clergy from parishes in Dade and Broward Counties assisted.

Nativity parish which had its beginnings in a tent was erected less than two years ago by Bishop Carroll who appointed Father Hugh Flynn as administrator. Masses were celebrated temporarily in a tent erected on a seven and a half acre tract of land adjoining Chaminade High School near the Hollywood Hills section.

Ground was broken for the newly blessed structures on June 18, 1961 at Johnson St. and 52nd Ave. The provisional Church designed by Miami architect, Thomas J. Madden. Jr., is a two story structure with temporary nave providing seating accommodations for 800 persons on the first floor.

The convents in both Nativity and St. Matthew parishes were designed by Wahl Snyder and Associates of Miami and are two-story structures providing seven bedrooms. Sisters. Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary of Monroe, Mich., staff Nativity School and Dominican Sisters of St. Catherine de Ricci of Albany, N. Y. instruct classes in St. Matthew School.







# Should She Ask Him To Return?

My Non-Catholic husband left me and our four children a little over a year ago because I refused to go to work. Although his take-home pay was over \$600 a month, his expensive hobby of collecting stamps took all the money. He said he earned it and it was his. To keep peace, I tried working but couldn't manage both job and home - I have a kidney infection and my last two children died at birth. When I quit working, he left to live with a woman who works. He sends barely enough money to support the children but won't visit them. How can I get him to visit the children, who miss him so badly, or to just come back and start over?

Although your letter offers little information about your married life together, Esther, it does tell us several significant things about the character of the man you married. In the first place, when a married man claims that the money he earns is his because he's the one that earned it, you have a clear indication that this man simply doesn't understand the meaning of

If the marriage contract means anything at all, it means that husband and wife solemnly agree to share life together - completely and without reservations. In this sense, a married couple can no longer say, "mine" or "yours," but only "ours."

For personal or cultural reasons, couples may follow various patterns determining who shall be responsible for handling the family income - husband, wife, or both together - yet there can be nothing arbitrary about the essential purposes for which it is used. Regardless of who earns it or assumes responsibility for handling it, it must be used for the good of the whole family. This point of justice is so obvious that only a person who refuses to accept the basic obligations inherent in the marriage contract could possibly ignore it.

Further, a father who doesn't bother to visit his young children demonstrates such a lack of natural affection and responsibility that we must characterize him as psychically and

Regardless of the reasons for separation, the parental bond, based on the very nature of parenthood, remains strong in normal fathers and mothers. When this does not occur, we have a clear sign that the delinquent parent was either too selfish, immature, or irresponsible to accept the normal obligations of marriage.

He is obviously too self-centered or spiritually undeveloped to be concerned with what honest people may think of him, or with the scandal he is giving to the children God has entrusted to his care. Incidentally, the fact that he can "get away" with this without losing his job or being rejected by the community is a distressing commentary on contemporary society.

What does all this add up to? Well, Esther, you asked how you might get your husband to visit the children or to come back. I think it should be obvious that in dealing with such a man you have very little upon which you can rely. He refuses to talk to you or see his children, while his other actions indicate that he is not likely to be moved by appeals to decency or virtue.

Hence I would offer the following suggestions. First, you should see your parish priest about suing for separate maintenance in order to obtain legal protection relating to the adequate and continued support of yourself and children. Such action should not be conducted in a spirit of anger or revenge, but by marrying you and having children, your husband has incurred responsibilities that he is not free to escape.

Further, you may as well base your own plans for the future on the assumption that the present situation of separation will persist. There is nothing to be gained by wishful thinking or refusing to face facts - difficult as they may be.

Like many other unfortunate mothers in our society, you must prepare yourself to raise your children alone. Should your husband come to his senses and return to his family, so much the better; but there is no indication that he will do so it would be a serious mistake to continue living from a co day "as if" he were about to come back.

Finally, as you suggest in your letter, it will not be easy to explain this situation to your children. Most children can accept the death of their father without serious damage because they can still cherish his memory and be proud

It is quite another matter when he deserts the family, for they are bound to interpret this as rejection. They then face a difficult emotional problem. Although they are naturally inclined to condemn him, they suffer a sense of guilt if they do children are supposed to love and honor their parents.

Because the situation is evil, there's no real solution to their problem, but you can lessen its evil effects somewhat by concealing your normal feelings of resentment against him, and at least until the children are older and more emotionally secure, by indicating that the separation may be temporary. You will need a good deal of strength to carry on alone under the circumstances; but remember, Esther, you can rely on the grace of the sacrament to see you through successfully. God does not abandon those who trust in Him.





### Most 'Adult' Movie Viewers Are Youths

By WILLIAM H. MOORING

"Adult appeal" is said to be the prime movie demand of the day, although 65 per cent of the average audience is made up of adolescents. Some of these youngsters are adult in outlook, but those who go to the movies looking for dirt give no proof of it.

What does the Hollywood writer think of when his producer orders "adult appeal?" Many recent screenplays that might have been ideal for the teen trade, as well as appealing to their elders, have become "for adults only," often because of stupid interjections of exaggerations the Hollywood writers have offered as evidence of their artistic maturity.

Something of the kind occurred in "Splendor in the Grass," "Where the Boys Are," "Love in a Goldfish Bowl," "Look in Any Window," "Parrish," "Wild in the Country" and many other shows that were cast primarily to attract youths. Each time prurient youth was exploited in a socalled "mature" theme the discriminating adult might find mad rather than mature.

LOSS OF APPEAL Now we are to get, from

MGM, an unusually appealing story of youthful romance, taken from Elizabeth Spencer's novel, "Light in the Piazza." Yvette Mimieux and George Hamilton are good as the young couple.

There is a deep, human problem that calls for parer tal solution. Still, as an unnecessary, even unconvincing digression, the girl's mother and the boy's father, excellently played by Olivia de Havilland and Rossano Brazzi, have to indulge in some kind of sly, romantic aside. What is so "adult" about that?

Without lending any "maturity" to the theme (in fact it does the opposite) this and other brief digressions place "Light in the Piazza" on the Legion's adult list, when it might have been an inspiring, delightful, refreshing show for everybody.

A popular, official gesture to youthful acumen, takes George Stevens Jr., from his father's side as associate producer of "The Greatest Story Ever Told", to the U.S. Information Agency, as head of its film division.

Young Stevens is well trained in movies and TV. He is more familiar than many with the baffling thought patterns of the Hollywood big-wigs.




