

Biscayne College Rushing **Toward September Opening**

Final preparations were being made this week for speedy construction of the new Biscayne College, the first Catholic college for men in South Florida. It will be conducted by the Augustinian Fathers of Villanova, Pa.

All architect plans have been completed and approved and the general contract is expected to be awarded early in April, with actual building to be started almost immediately thereafter.

The program calls for completion of the first unit of the college early in September, with first semester classes to begin Sept. 24. Registration of students will take place on Sept. 20.

Only a freshman class will be accepted this year. One additional class will be added each year following so that by 1965 the full complement of Fresh-Sophomore, Junior and classes will be enrolled. For the present, the college


will have facilities only for stu-

dents living off campus with their immediate families.

Applications already are being received and those desiring information regarding admission have been requested to write to the Admissions Office, Biscayne College, Box 746, Opa Locka, Florida.

Biscavne College will be located on the Palmetto Bypass (NW 167th St.) at 32nd Ave., just north of Opa Locka and west of the Golden Glades interchange. It will adjoin the new Monsignor Edward Pace High School. The location is centrally located to Pompano, Fort Lauderdale, the Hollywood area. Hallandale, Miami Beach, Metropolitan Miami, Hialeah, Coral Gables. South and Southwest

Building Program Launched AS DDF Returns Pour In

As additional returns still poured in, immediate action was taken this week to launch the building program made possible by the 1962 Diocesan Development Fund Campaign.

Prompt approval was given by the Diocesan Building Commission of plans for the new Catholic high school in Fort Myers, which will be the first Catholic high school on the west coast of the Diocese of Miami.

As a result, construction will be started at the earliest possible moment so that it will be completed and ready to receive its first pupils next September. Similar speed will mark action on the two other definite projects made possible by the fact that this year's Development Fund drive had passed its \$1 million minimum

They are the new College Building at St. John Vianney Minor Seminary and the new girls' section of the Monsignor Pace High School, both of which also will be rushed to completion by September.

Latest tabulation of the cash and pledges revealed that the amount contributed in the Development Fund Campaign had now passed the \$1,100,000 mark. Late or or delayed contributions still are being made and the total figure will determine the extent of additional building in carrying out other projects which are urgently needed.

These include additions to both boys' and girls' sections of Cardinal Gibbons High School, Fort Lauderdale; additions to LaSalle High School for boys, Southeast Miami; additions to Notre Dame Academy for girls, Northeast Miami; additions to Immaculata Academy for girls, Southeast Miami, and a Newman Center at the Palm Beach Junior College, West Palm

Archbishop Carlos Humberto Rodriguez y Quiros of San Jose, Costa Rica, will preach the sermon during the Solemn Pontifical Mass which will mark the Miami observance of Pan -American Day at 4 p.m. Friday, April 13 in Bayfront Park.

The second annual outdoor Mass will be sung at a specially erected altar by Bishon Coleman F. Carroll at the invitation of the City of Miami and the International Affairs Department of the Miami-Dade County Chamber of Commerce.

Honorary co - chairmanship of the 1962 Pan American Day program has been accepted by Bishop Carroll and Robert King High, Mayor of Miami. Thousands of Spanish - speaking South Florida residents as well as large delegations of parochial and diocesan high school students, faculties and parents are expected to attend. Guests of honor will include members of the Latin American hierarchy and consular corps representatives.

Arrangements for the occasion are now being completed by Msgr. John J. Fitzpatrick, executive editor of The Voice and diocesan director of the Spanishspeaking Apostolate. Universality Of 2nd Council Reflected In New Cardinals

10 new cardinals have such varied backgrounds that their elevation foreshadows the universality of the coming ecumenical council, according to Pope John XXIII.

The Pontiff spoke again of the council during the semipublic consistory during which the new cardinals took their place among the old cardinals for the first time and received their red birettas and capes. Pope John

"The Catholic Church, coming together in a general council, expresses in a perfect and imposing manner the four fundamental marks of its divine institution, namely that it is one, holy, catholic and apostolic," he said.

"The successors of the apostles, coming from every region where the Church extends her shadow, gather around the humble successor of Peter for the uplifting and sanctification of humanity, presenting to the world a unique spectacle of their faith and charity."

The Pope told the new cardi-

nals that "it is enough to consider your places of origin to realize this heartening reality." He pointed out that dioceses of Peru, Chile and Belgium are represented among the new cardinals.

In addition, he said the new cardinals came from the Church's central administrative offices and from the ranks of the Holy See's diplomatic corps.

Apart from the eight nations which the cardinals come from, the Pope said, they also bring to the College of Cardinals representation of some of the great religious orders and congregations. (Five of the new cardinals are Religious: Michael Cardinal Browne, an Irishman, is Master General of the Dominican Order. Cardinal Landazuri is a Franciscan, Cardinal Coussa an Aleppine Basilian of the Melkite Rite, Cardinal Silva Henriquez a Salesian, and Cardinal Albareda a Benedic-

The Pontiff said that therefore "the universality of this cardinalitial elevation is a harmonious prelude to the universality of the great council."

French Prelates Condemn Algeria Ceasefire Violence

PARIS (NC) — France's Cardinals and Archbishops have condemned the crimes of violence that have reached a peak with the announcement of eventual Algerian independence and called on all Frenchmen to work together for a peaceful

The joint statement was issued four days after the ceasefire ending the sevenyear-old war in Algeria between France and Moslem nationalists was announced.

The announcement was followed by intensified violence by the extreme right-wing Secret Army Organization (OAS) which has sought to keep Algeria a part of France. The violence has occurred both here and in Algeria, where the OAS and the French army have fought in Algiers with tanks and planes.

Pope John's participation in Holy Week ceremonies will begin on Palm Sunday, April 15, when he takes part in the blessing of the palms in St. Peter's basilica and offers Mass there.

New Orleans Archdiocese To Desegregate Schools

NEW ORLEANS (NC) Schools in the Archdiocese of New Orleans will be desegregated next semester, according to an announcement from Archbishop Joseph Francis Rum-

In a statement made public on Wednesday by Msgr. Henry Bezou, archdiocesan superintendent of the schools where some 75,000 pupils are enrolled, Archbishop Rummel stated that "effective at the time of registration for the 1962-63 school session, all Catholic children may apply for admission to the Catholic schools of the archdiocese . . . according to accepted education standard."

The integration of schools, both public and Catholic, has been a focal point of controversy here for years. Archbishop Rummel announced in 1956 that the integration of Catholic schools was under study, but a

group calling itself the Association of Catholic Laymen was set up to block integration and the move was subsequently postponed.

State Sen. E. W. Gravolet. a Catholic and vice chairman of the joint legislative committee segregation predicted a "mass boycott will greet the integration."

"I expect Catholics in New Orleans to show the same loyalty as other Catholics have shown in other areas where similar steps were taken," Monsignor Bezou declared revealing that 7,254 Negroes are enrolled in 15 elementary schools and another 1,724 in three Negro high schools. Public schools in the city were desegregated under federal court order in November, 1960 but only 12 Negroes are enrolled in six schools.

Argentina Cardinal Urges Harmony As Tensions Rise

BUENOS AIRES Antonio Cardinal Caggiano urged all Argentinians to put their country's interests above their own as a massive general strike and increased political tensions threatened the nation.

The tension stems from large gains scored by communistsupported Peronist candidates in legislative and provincial elections here on March 18. The Peronists are followers of former dictator Juan Peron, whose regime was overthrown in 1955 after it began major attacks on the Church.

Outlawed earlier, the Peronists won 44 seats in Congress and a number of provincial offices in the elections at the expense of the older parties, including the governing Intransigent Radicals, whose leader is



Pushed by conservative officers of the armed forces, the government has invalidated the March 18 elections. In reprisal, the Peronists, who control about half of the country's labor unions, organized a general strike.

Cardinal Caggiano — along with Archbishop Umberto Mozzoni, Apostolic Nuncio to Argentina, and Mayor Hernan Giralt of Buenos Aires - has been seeking to mediate the crisis.

ELECTION NULLIFIED

He has met with President Frondizi and Peronist leader Andrews Framini, whose election as governor of Buenos Aires province has been nullified. After his 70-minute talk with the Cardinál, Framini told newsmen he believes Argentina's workers will "act together not

to allow our victories to be taken from our hands." Framini, a labor union leader, described himself as "a Christian who wants social peace."

Cardinal Caggiano said in his broadcast to the nation:

"Fellow citizens: I ask my fellow citizens to stop and think of the fatherland at this time of serious danger. This is not the first time that differences of opinion and political errors and passions have divided Argentina. However, I hope that everyone will realize our real national aspirations and will make a common effort to prevent new errors for which the people will have to pay.

"Today as never before the supreme good of the nation is peace and harmony, and its only guarantee is constitutional order, which we must defend and obey at the cost of any sacrifices. In spite of all difficulties, we can find the road of harmony and peace if sanity and thought permit Argentines to realize the benefits of the feeling of brotherhood which can put to flight and dissipate political passions."





Archbishop Paul Hallinan **Enthroned In Atlanta Rites**

ATLANTA, Ga. (NC) - The spiritual leader of the Deep South's first archdiocese urged the congregation at his enthronement to help him meet the Church's special challenges here, including racial justice.

He is Archbishop Paul A. Hallinan, former Bishop of Charleston, S.C., who was enthroned in the Cathedral of ist the King by Archbishop regidio Vagnozzi, Apostolic Delegate in the United States.

Archbishop Hallinan, who will be 51 on April 8, heads a See which was created as a diocese in 1956 embracing 71 northern Georgia counties and was raised to the status of archdiocese in-February of this year. The Catholic population is 32,381 in a total population of 2,152,653, according to the 1961 Official Catholic Directory for the Church in the United States.

INCLUDES MIAMI

By virtue of his office, the Ohio-born prelate also is the first head of the Church's new ecclesiastical province of Atlanta, created from dioceses which were formerly a part of the Baltimore province.

Atlanta's suffragan Sees are dioceses in North Carolina (Raleigh), South Carolina (Charleston), Florida (St. Augustine and Miami) and the other half of Georgia (Savannah).

In his sermon at the televised ceremony whose high point was the placing of the crozier, the Bishop's symbol of authority, in a new prelate's hand, Archbishop Hallinan said that at the heart of the event here are the Catholics of Atlanta whose efforts "have merited this new honor and its corresponding new responsibility."

'SPECIAL CHALLENGES'



Who Killed Federal Aid? Dr. Archer Wrong Again

At a time when South Florida has been enjoying its greatest period of religious amity and good will, Glenn L. Archer came to town - again - this week. He is, you will recall, the executive director of that multi-named organization, Protestants and Other Americans United for the Separation of Church and State, commonly referred to as the POAU.

He had been invited, he said, to come here with the hope of forming a local independent agency of POAU. From all accounts, his reception was somewhat less than enthusiastic. That can be explained, perhaps, by the fact that people generally have grown weary of hearing the same old bigoted charges which have been refuted over and over again throughout the years.

This time he continued to direct his fire at his long favorite target - "the American hierarchy." Discussing Federal Aid to Education, Dr. Archer charged that Francis Cardinal Spellman and "the Bishops' Committee demanded public money across the board for their institutions;" that they had put the "death sentence" on President Kennedy's aid program, and that "the Roman Catholic prelates are doing themselves a disservice by demanding public money for their institutions."

What is the truth? The answer was given this week by Archbishop Thomas A. Boland, of Newark. Speaking at a Conference of the Lay Apostolate there regarding similar charges, the Archbishop declared:

"This is not true. The Bishops were not responsible for asking for Federal aid. They did not oppose Federal aid. But they did oppose gratuitous giving. They said Federal aid should be distributed on a basis of need and that it should be nondiscriminatory.

"They said that if discrimination against six million nonpublic school children were written into the program they would oppose such discrimination. Those who wrote a discriminatory bill and those who would not see the justice of our position are responsible for the defeat of the program to provide Federal aid for education. Not the Bishops."

Dr. Archer might do better if he could speak for another organization which might be called "All Americans for the Separation of Truth and Error."

The March For Vocations

If there are some priests and sisters of the future whose vocation can be traced back to the month of March, 1962, no one among us should be too surprised. After all, during this month, Vocation Month, tens of thousands of our people were united in the common cause of begging "the Lord of the harvest" to break through the barriers in the way of vocations and draw generous minded young men and women to His service.

It stands to reason — and it is backed up by the convictions of faith - that God must look kindly on the thousands of Masses and Holy Communions and rosaries offered by our people for an increase in vocations. Since Our Lord finds no cause more dear to His divine Heart than the cause of His priesthood, He surely has been pleased with the countless families uniting in prayer at home for vocations, and in the response of thousands of sick and infirm to Bishop Carroll's invitation to become active workers in the apostolate to provide more priests and Sisters.

Besides these things, Vocation Month afforded other opportunities to help the cause. All of our school children learned more about the greatness and meaning of vocations when members of the Priests' Vocation Committee visited and talked to them. Moreover, 10,000 students competed in the annual essay contest on vocations sponsored by the Serra Clubs.

Last Sunday, two outstanding altar boys from every parish in the diocese, chosen by their pastor, were honored at the Cathedral by Bishop Carroll with the Serra altar boy medal. We can never forget in seeing those youngsters, upon whom the liturgical life of the parish depends so greatly, that the majority of priests come from their ranks.

So Vocation Month is coming to an end. But as we know the vocation program of prayers and information must go on year 'round. We cannot let up during any month of the year in our efforts to provide literally hundreds of priests and Sisters for the future in this Diocese.



Alliance For Progress Tilts In Argentine Political Winds

WASHINGTON (NC) - Developments in Argentina can have a great influence on the success or failure of the Alliance for Progress.

Events in Argentina are held here to have proved the need for the Alliance program. But they have presented the program's management with embarrassing decisions. And they have raised the question whether this daring project to save Latin America from communism and Castroism was undertak-

It is basic to United States policy that social and economic reforms, coupled with the establishment of sound national finances, offer the best hope of saving Latin American nations from Red control.

FACING DILEMMA

The austerity program introduced by President Arturo Frondizi was calculated to strengthen Argentina's economy. But it stirred resentment, and this undoubtedly helped the Peronists and communists to win their stunning victories in the recent elections. Subsequent intervention by the Argentine military added to the dilemma facing the U.S. and its Alliance

Aid to a military dictatorship, if established, would be used by anti-U.S. propagandists, not only in the Argentine but throughout Latin America, it was argued. On hand it was ed, discontinuance of Alliance aid to Argentina, whether Frondizi or the military were in charge, would seriously worsen that country's financial position, put off indefinitely the needed social and economic reforms, and play directly into the hands of those the Alliance is intended to thwart.

To ignore and void the military leaders, who assert that they are acting only to head

off the Peronists and Reds, would seem to favor the chances of the latter. More important, it would severely shake the military establishments in other Latin American countries which may be called upon to put down communist attempts to seize power by guerrilla tactics in their respective coun-

COMPLICATES PICTURE

The fact the Peronists and communists won their new influence in a free election only complicates the whole picture.

From Spain, where he has been living in exile, persons said to be close to Juan D. Peron, who ruled Argentina from 1945 to 1955, say he is very hopeful of returning to power in the Argentine, and

It is also implied that if the U.S. backs the Argentine military in the present crisis, it might force Peron into a polititical alliance with the Communist party in Argentina. The speakers said he has been offered such an alliance repeatedly in the past and has refused it.

PERON SILENT

Peron was also said to feel that the Alliance for Progress was well-meant, but poorly implemented. It was explained that Peron himself would make no statement, for fear of embarrassing his host, the Spanish government.

What has happened in Argentina is expected to have impact in other Latin American countrires. The longer the reaction takes in manifesting itself, the better chance the Alliance for Progress will have to take hold and prove itself.

The United States will have to meet the Argentine situation step by step as it develops. It may be called upon to do the same elsewhere. This is going to take great patience and wisdom, but it is felt that this is the way to bring about more democracy, instead of less, in Latin America.

SUM AND SUBSTANCE

Are Our Hopes Too High For The Coming Council?

Are we indulging in false hopes for the coming Ecumenical Council? The brilliant young Swiss theologian, Hans Kung,

may be in for a painful disillusionment if we peg our hopes too high.

If it were anvone but Kung who offering advice this we might dis-



miss it as a false alarm from a panicky pessimist, a fuddyduddy. But Kung is one of the most radically progressive theologians in the Church at the present time.

He looks forward to the coming Council as to the coming of a new Pentecost. He sees it transforming the Church into such a vision of unity, truth and charity that separated Christians will seek for unity with its Gospel splendor. When he warns against false hopes, it is a warning that is born of wisdom, enthusiasm and optimism.

CATHOLICS APATHETIC

As far as I have been able to discover, there is - sad to say - no need for such a warning in this country. On the contrary the danger here is apathy. Within the last year I have been traveling about in various Eastern cities giving lectures on the coming Council and reunion.

I have found a prevailing apathy to the Council that is due almost entirely to a woeful lack of information about it. One senses a certain amount of devout curiosity about the Council but most Catholics seem to be timid about asking questions about it for fear of revealing their

This is truly disappointing. Here it is the month of March, the greatest event in Catholic history this century is only six months away, and yet few

By FR. JOHN B. SHEERIN Catholics have any information about it. Whose is the fault? As Pope John says about the religious divisions of Christianity, let us not try to affix blame.

> I will say however that the Catholic Press has been admirable in its coverage of plans for the coming event. The diocesan Press has ried the ample NCWC releases and the Catholic magazines have presented numerous articles on the Council.

Bishop deSmedt, in his "Priesthood of the Faithful," (Paulist Paperbacks 1962) says that the Church does not rely exclusively on the Holy Spirit's action on the bishops when it tries to arrive at the full knowledge of revealed doctrine. "It listens also to the action of the same Spirit at work in the People of God. Thus, the teaching body not only speaks to the People of God, it also listens to this People in whom Christ continues His teaching."

SUGGESTIONS WELCOME

In my travels I have not met a single person who has written to the proper authorities any suggestions for the coming Council's consideration. Cardinal Koenig told some Austrian newsmen last year that they should not wait for the bishop or a report from Rome if they had something to say about the Council. "Sound a warning whenever you feel you ought to."

And Martin Work, head of the National Council of Catholic Men, has reminded the laity that such suggestions would be welcomed.

Until such matters as these are a common topic of conversation among lay people I don't think we need worry about overoptimism in regard to the Council. As to the clergy, many of them felt a keen sense of disappointment when Pope John ordered seminaries to teach theology in Latin. But the clergy will take it in stride.

How God's Grace Can Change Your Life

Some time ago a non-Catholic who had made a retreat with a Catholic friend found himself intrigued with the teaching on

grace. He was especially curiious about the amazing change wrought in people some long known as careless or even



asked Father Walsh question:

"You claim this transformation is the work of grace. But does grace in a person who has proved his extreme weakness take away his freedom, so that he is bound thereafter to do good or does the presence of grace mean that he will no longer be subjected to temptation?"

That raises an interesting point or two. In some cases of conversion, when a person goes from the extreme of evil to the extreme of sanctity, it probably appears to many that he is no longer free or subject to temptation.

Take for instance the astonishing change in the man now known as John of God. He had been for many years a professional soldier and led the hard, selfish, lustful life associated with mercenaries.

When close to death as the result of a skirmish, he suddenly began to pray to Our Lady. He promised if she saved him he would reform.

He kept his word after being rescued. But he soon found that carrying out a good resolution was considerably more difficult than making it.

John's subsequent battles with himself prove impressively that grace, while always present to enlighten and strengthen, never took away

his freedom for he was constantly faced with bewildering choices in trying to find out what God's will was for him.

It took him years to settle down in what was meant to be his life's work. Nor did grace mean the elimination of temptation after he seriously turned to God. On the contrary, it is easy to believe the devil gave him a harder time than ever before, since John was determined now to love God and to help others love Him.

It is the nature of man to be free and grace never destroys nature. It builds on it, purifies it and elevates it, but never tears it down. God's help can only go so far, strangely enough, just as temptation can exert just so much force on us and no more.

Grace can no more overwhelm us to do something good than temptation can crush us into doing something evil. We stand between these powerful forces, free and responsible, able to turn either way.

In fact, we all know from sad experience that we have often used our freedom to resist grace. This is the reason for our sins. Sin does not happen because we are weak. It happens because in our weakness we resisted the grace offered to overcome it. God's help was there. Our cooperation was missing.

We know too that slavery sets in, not from having too much grace to aid us, but from surrendering too often to our own evil inclinations. The man who makes the habit of sin is really enslaved.

Only the person who disciplines himself to keep all the Commandments can really claim to be free.

Grace is not given us, it should be remembered, to remove trials and temptations from our life. Many people believe this. It is given us that we may have the strength to

battle valiantly and well with

the enemies of the soul.

For example, Matt Talbot's conversion from a life of dissipation by no means indicated that he would thereafter be free of all desire to drink.

Matt himself testified that for a long time after resolving to stay sober, he actually had to hide in the church after working hours so that he would not give in to his restless desire to join his former cronies.

It seemed to him many times in dark hours that he would never be able to last another day, so great was the stress and weariness. He remembered that St. Paul in one of his great trials begged Christ to remove it.

But instead of taking away the conflict, Christ reminded him: "My grace is sufficient for thee." And he went on trying constantly to do his best, even when his best seemed useless, and for the rest he confidently depended upon God to give him the grace as he needed it.

This is the formula, the only formula, that has made saints out of sinners. We can do nothing alone. Grace cannot do it all for us. Christ warned us that "the spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak." Whoever tries to stand alone ends by falling.

More than one saint had the habit of repeating, as well we might, St. Philip Neri's remark made whenever he saw a man disfigured by sin: "There but for the grace of God go I."

bleeding from head to foot the Roman soldiers lead Him into an inner courtyard. Their perverted minds had just conceived of a new en the monot- Father Kilian sport to bright-



ony of a military barracks. Christ had claimed to be a king — they would show Him how they expressed reverence to a would-be-king!

A fresh excitement prevails in the courtyard as the performance begins. The innocent Victim is placed on a slab of stone. A cast-off mantle of a Roman officer is thrown about the scarred shoulders of Jesus. One soldier takes a thorny bramble from a pile of fire-wood, shapes it into a diadem, and hammers it into the head of Christ. As the thorns dig painfully into His temple, another soldier pushes a reed BB YOU PERFECT

between His bound hands.

Another mockery is inserted into this blasphemous ceremony. Forming a procession, the soldiers approach Him one at a time, bend their knees in mock obeisance, and salute Him: "Hail, O King of the Jews." As some pass Christ, they take the reed and strike Him with heavy blows on His crowned head. All spit in His face as they go by. St. John's words that "they kept coming" (John 19:3) implies that this performance was repeated again and again.

Throughout all this blasphemy, Our Lord did not utter a single word of protest. Angels bowing down in humble adoration are amazed at the silence of their God before the brutal treatment of some of His creatures. They knew He was King by right of creation. They knew how He calmed the winds and waves, healed bodies and souls, and cast out devils by His kingly power. Perhaps they also knew that the supreme achievement of the kingship of Christ would be to win His kingdom anew - this time by the shedding of His precious blood!

By His humble and amazing silence Christ atoned for the countless men who have refused to bend their wills to God's plan for human life. By enduring this base humiliation He made reparation for all those proud men who try to take the place of God. In this mystery of the Rosary, Our Lord accepted the sufferings that should have been their punishment.

When St. John wrote, "They kept coming," it was as though he tried to erase the memory of this scene with the fewness of his words. In this procession of cursing and taunting soldiery Christ saw an endless procession of proud men of all ages. Each of us played our shameful part in this scene — as does anyone who rejects or ignores the Kingship of Christ.

There are so many ways that we can sin by pride. First, by refusing to acknowledge our absolute dependence on God in all things and at all times. By being perversely attached to our

own ideas and opinions even when we knew the truth is otherwise. By sniping at authority because we resent the obedience we owe to the representatives of God. By claiming that we are willing to forgive, but then refusing to forget.


By running roughshod over the feelings and sensitivities of others and then being supersensitive ourselves. By having an exaggerated concept of our own excellence in one or many things and refusing to acknowledge or use the obvious talents of others. By injuring others in our speech or actions, and then being too proud to admit our weakness or to ask forgiveness. By being constantly over-fretful and anxious lest anyone detract from our imagined excellence.

There are many lessons, indeed, that we may learn from the sufferings of Our Lord in this Sorrowful Mystery. Surely one of the greatest is that of humility . . . and that aspect of this basic virtue that makes us suffer the wrongdoings of others in sanctifying silence. He was "obedient unto death" for our sake . . . what do we do for His sake?



only one union for each craft or industry and have also favored the idea of a single trade union federation.

At times in the history of the American



ment this policy has admittedly been more honored in the breach than in the observance. Nevertheless, it remains the offical policy of all but a handful of dissident labor organizations in the United States.

In this respect, the point of

view of American unions differs sharply from that of the European and Latin American unions affiliated with the International Confederation of Christian Unions. Traditionally the unions attiliated with the IFCTU have favored a plurality of unions as the only means of safeguarding religious and ideological free-

The point of view of the Christian unions on this matter is stated very succinctly in an editorial entitled "Trade Union Pluralism" in the February 1962 issue of Pueblo, the official organ of the autonomous Christian unions of Venezuela.

Underlying all its arguments is a well-founded fear of Marxism. The editorial

also points out that in totalitarian countries unions are converted into unitary organizations of the State - instruments in the hands of the government for directing and controlling the working class.

It seems to me that the editorial is guilty of begging the question when it says, without qualification, that trade unions are "essentially ideological" and that trade union unity is "necessarily totalitarian."

American trade union are certainly not essentially ideological. And trade union unity in the United States is not totalitarian. Whatever else may be said for or against American unions, it cannot be said that they have suppressed religion or imposed a particular philosophy or ideology upon the American working class.


Nor can it be said that they have tried to control or direct the lives of American workers. As the authors of a recent study point out, "The typical American trade union is an organization established and maintained for the primary purpose of obtaining higher wages and improved labor conditions. It is a wholy independent organization and is not sponsored or controlled by government or employers."

While the point of view of the Christian unions with regard to trade union unity may be valid in certain countries of Western Europe and Latin America, it is not relevant to the trade union situation in the United

Aquinas Senior, Science Winner


A senior from St. Thomas Aquinas High School, Fort Lauderdale, was among grand prize winners during the recent South Florida Science Fair held at Dinner Key.







at Fort Myers will be a twostory structure built around an open-air patio in the center. It will front on New Sunrise Drive, at the corner of Charles Road, with plenty of parking space. Murray Blair Wright of Miami is the architect.

On the first floor there will be a large auditorium which can be divided by sliding doors. It will serve as a temporary chapel for the celebration of Mass, with provisions for an altar and sa-

Also on the first floor will be a principal's office, clerical offices, a clinic, special projects room, work room, large library, a main utility room with boiler and maintenance area and boys' and girls' dressing rooms, with showers.

On the second floor there will be six large classrooms and science and biology laboratory. Two of the six rooms will have provisions for conversion into a home economics room and a physics and chemistry laboratory.

There will be aluminum awning type windows with sun shelter panels to protect typical windows. The vinyl asbestos floor tile will have a rubber cove base. Walls will be of painted concrete block.

All classrooms will be equipped with conduit for closed circuit television.







COMMUNISM: Threat To Freedom

Korea War, Hearings Awoke Sleeping U.S. To Red Peril

- This is the third in a series of 10 articles on the nature of the communist challenge in the world today with special emphasis on the most effective and intelligent response to the challenge for Americans.

In the previous article we saw that the Communists, in heyday, exercised wide influence, especially through their tactics of infiltration into key jobs and through enlisting unsuspecting persons into Communist front organizations. Two other major points need to be noted about communism in the United States.

The first is that there are some Marxists who are not members of the Communist Party or subject to its discipline. Some are former Communists; others are members of leftwing organizations, ranging from Socialists to groups even more militant than the Communist Party, U.S.A.

In spite of some growth, they offer no threat to American security, since they are divorced from the international Communist movement.

Espionage, the second point to note, has always been an important feature of international Communist activity.

As a general rule, espionage operations are governmental functions. The Soviet Union, through its Embassy, consulates, its U. N. delegation, and corresponding officials of the satellite nations, has been the primary guiding force behind intelligence operations. It normally operates directly rather than through the Communist Party, U.S.A.

Constant Threat of Espionage

Soviet or satellite intelligence agents often have been successful in recruiting scientists who felt their contribution would help the cause of world peace. Spies have been secured through blackmail, by means of threats to harm relatives behind the Iron Curtain, or simply by buying secret information.

Because of the danger of espionage, it is essential to prevent Communists from obtaining access to classified information. The security clearance system used to keep Communists out of such positions has been quite effective since it was introduced in 1949 and perfected in 1951.

Only continual vigilance on the part of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the U.S. Civil Service Commission, and other security agencies, can protect our country from espionage.

Between 1935 and 1950, Soviet espionage activities were widespread and often quite effective. Secret and even top-secret information was secured about such vital points as high governmental policy, atomic-energy operations, and electronic equip-

Because of the artificially fostered climate of opinion during World War II, there were few arrestes for Communist espionage. This, of course, was not the fault of our own intelligence agencies. Arrest and prosecution were blocked by policy decisions at higher levels.

At the end of the war, the pattern of Soviet perfidy was clear. The evidence of both domestic subversion and plans for world conquest was overwhelming. Nevertheless, those who sought to awaken a slumbering America faced an uphill struggle.

Change Of Opinion Begins

Two main series of events brought deluded Americans to ir senses. The first was the dramatic series of hearings cond by the House Committee on Un-American Activities and the Senate Committee on the Judiciary during and after 1948.


The second series of events involved the Soviet Union and its utterly callous forcing of communism upon Poland, East Germany, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia, and Albania.

Yet the awakening was slow and painful. Only the invasion of South Korea, and the commitment of American troops to its defense, finally solidified American opinion.

As this change was taking place, aroused Americans acted to remove the danger of Communist infiltration in areas of public importance. Communists were removed from government posts systematically as a result of the federal loyalty programs. Communist unions were expelled from the CIO.

Communist writers and actors in Hollywood were no longer in demand. Newspapers, research groups, and schools began to

clean house. Front organizations found it difficult to find dupes. The Communist movement was thoroughly discredited in the American mind.

The Situation Today

The basic reason for this change is widespread American disillusionment with communism as practiced in the Soviet Union, China, and the satellites.

The East German and Hungarian rebellions were put down by brutal force. Tibet was invaded by Chinese armies. Indian border territory was occupied by force. Laos was subverted. The Berlin wall was erected. A fifty-megaton nuclear bomb was exploded after Soviets cynically resumed nuclear testing. Further revelations were made of the tyrannical injustice of the

There is no division of opinion in the United States in regard to defending our freedom against any form of Communist aggression that threatens this liberty. Americans may differ in regard to specific tactics to be used in the struggle for freedom; they do not differ in regard to the ultimate goal.

If Communists can gather a hundred persons at one of their propaganda meetings, they are doing their best. No columnist nor editorialist in a general American newspaper of any circulation advocates communism. But many widely read columnists and editoralists regularly attack communism.

Communists no longer have positions of power and influence in government, the labor movement, the academic world, or any of the other areas which they influenced so strongly in the 1940's. Our loyalty and security programs have been effective in screening them from government positions.

The Communists that remain are by no means inactive. When trouble spots appear in our land, they try to exploit the difficulties for their own purposes. They will raise the banner of civil liberties in fighting for their members or against the House Committee. But compared with their activities and influence 20 years ago. Communists today are weak and impotent.

Misguided Anti-Communism Hit By FBI Director Hoover

PEEKSKILL, N Y. (NC) — J. Edgar Hoover has written in a Catholic magazine that communism cannot be combatted with

The FBI director, writing in the monthly Lamp magazine, cautioned that curbing communism is not for vigilantes, but for legally constituted authorities which get the cooperation of citizens.

Hoover pointed to what he called the danger of calling a person a communist "simply because his views on a particur issue at a particular time ay happen to coincide with the position of the Communist party on the same issue."

"TALKING POINTS"

The Reds, he said, often support legitimate interests in order to gain "talking points."

Citizens can fight communism, he continued, by learning what it is, how it works and by reporting to the FBI information relating to subversive activities.

"Refrain from making a private investigation either to verify rumor of substantiate possible facts. Give us all of the facts," he wrote.

In his article in the maga-

zine, published here by the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement, Hoover said:

"I repeat what I have said on many previous occasions: attributing every adversity we encounter to communism and labeling as 'Reds' those with whom we do not agree do nothing to help in this struggle in which all of us are involved.

"On the contrary, reckless and unsubstantiated charges forter groundless fears, contribute to disunity and actually give aid and comfort to the enemy.

"As a result of inadequate knowledge, inept and irresponsible efforts to counter this totalitarian menace might well lend themselves to the creation of the climate of fear, hysteria and confusion on which communism thrives.

"Let us remember that the job of curtailing and containing communism is not one for vigilantes; it is, rather, the task of legally constituted authorities, bulwarked by the steadfast and whole-hearted cooperation of every loyal American citizen."

VOCATION A GIFT



Is God calling you to the priesthood?" the Bishop asked. lead to a Bachelor of Arts degree, a Bachelor of Science degree or a degree in Business Administration.

For the first year of operation, the tuition fee per semester will be \$350. There also will be a first matriculation fee. payable only once, of \$10, and a student service fee of \$35 per semester.

Courses of instruction for the first year will include accounting, chemistry, English, history, mathematics, modern languages and theology. Formal instruction in theology will be required of all Catholic students but it will be waived for non-Catholic students.

In order to enter the college, a student must have graduated from an approved high school with grades that correspond to those recommended for college and must have a recommendation from the school principal or guidance officer. He must also present his score on the college entrance examinations. Time and location of the tests

can be obtained from high school instructors.

For the present, almost all accommodations, academic and non-academic, for student and faculty will be housed in Mary Kennedy Hall. This will house classrooms and laboratories; a library, book store, combination auditorium-chapel; a student lounge; offices for administrators and faculty offices. There will be ample parking facilities on campus for 200 cars for faculty and students.

His "City of God" (De Civitate Dei) first fully examined the consequences of man's dual citizenship, man's rights and responsibilities as a member of human society; his rights and responsibilities as one destined to eternal supernatural life hereafter.

The word "Biscayne" has been part of the heritage of South Florida since the days when the beautiful Biscayne Bay was so named by the early Catholic explorers. For that reason, it was decided that the new school should be named Biscayne College, to indicate clearly that it is to be a truly South Florida institution.

Destroyed Cathedral Replaced In Connecticut



Religion Shackled In Russia

The author of the following article, now a teacher at St. John's Home Missions Seminary, Little Rock, Ark., spent three years studying in Europe and recently completed a four-week tour of the Soviet Union as a member of a leftist political group. This gave him freedom in Russia not ordinarily accorded to Western visitors.

People hear so many contradictory things about religion in the Soviet Union that confusion on this question is the common state of affairs.

The Church has reported that its priests and bishops are being persecuted and imprisoned, its churches closed, and Catholics threatened and accused.

At the same time, a group of clergymen representing the Protestant - Orthodox World Council of Churches states that everything is fine,

that there is perfect freedom of religion.

We hear that communism is atheistic and controls everything Yet we also hear pronouncements by the Patriarch Alexei of Moscow, head of the Russian Orthodox Church.

Can all this be reconciled? STATISTICS, GENERALITIES

Most people try to speak of 'religion in Russia today." This is the broadest generality, and working with such generalities one can substantiate almost any position. If one wishes to prove that communism is a fine thing and has been innocently maligned by opposition groups, he can point to the Soviet constitution which guarantees free attendance at church.

He can also point to statistics indicating that there are many millions of believers and churchgoers in the U.S.S.R. Both of these statements are true. Any visitor to the Soviet Union has seen evidence to substantiate both

Despite all the difficulties involved in using Soviet statistics (which are all compiled by government agencies), trustworthy sources estimate that there are between 35 and 50 million practicing Russian Orthodox Church members in the U.S.S.R., some 33,000 priests, and 5,000 men and women Religious. There are three seminaries which seem to be well attended.

The Catholic Church has been especially hard hit, but has churches open in Leningrad and Moscow which are attended by large crowds, including many foreign diplomats and diplomatic personnel.

These are undeniable facts. Unfortunately they are used by some to support the totally false conclusion that there is freedom of religion in the Soviet Union.

Religion is anything but free. Religion in the U.S.S.R. is marked for extinction. The present policy of the government is to use the tactics

which have been judged best to do this job today. The current policy is but one step toward accomplishing the final goal - the elimination of religion from the Soviet

The policy of the Communist party toward religion differs in each place according to the strength of the local communist government and the attitude of the people.

In areas where their institutions and history are strongly religious, the party goes slowly and cautiously. Where such is not the case, or where there has been anticlericalism and religious laxity in their tradition, the process is quicker and less restricted.

Even in a specific area, the policy changes radically from time to time. Immediately after the revolution took over in 1917 there followed trying days for all churches in Russia. The Bolsheviks, whose newly found power has not been tempered by experience, immediately closed all churches. They decided to do away with religion quickly. All types of services were forbidden and a newly formed Association of the Godless was created to track down and do away with all priests.

This was the period of militant atheism which lasted through the 1930s to the beginning of World War II. Twenty-eight bishops and 1,200 priests and monks were executed. Countless thousands were shipped to labor camps others were imprisoned.

Despite all this, in the late 1930s the head of the Association of the Godless, Yaro Yaroslavsky, announced that the policy had failed. There were, he said, still many millions of practicing believers in Russia.

The policy was then changed from persecution to propaganda. It was less bloody and more subtle. It has its hot and cold periods. In 1954 it got real hot and all believers were accused of being antipatriotic and charged with treason. This also seemed to backfire. So, at present, there is just the normal pressure and propaganda. There seems to be, at the moment, a period of relative peace.

But no one should be fooled by this into thinking that the party has changed its mind about religion. Religion is still the "opium of the people" and has no place in the communist utopia. The government is still dogmatically atheistic, and the Church is still sentenced to death. The Church may be permitted to take one step back after two steps forward - but it is still marching toward the

Pilgrims Will \ **Before Leaving**

(This is the sixth in a series of articles describing the localities to be visited during the 21-day diocesan pilgrimage to Europe and the Holy Land scheduled to leave New York July 29.)

Bishop Fulton J. Sheen once wrote, "By going into Galilee Jesus performed a symbolic act. He turned His back upon the world of the Old Testament, and from the moment of His turning away the New Testament begins."

In his book, This Is The Holy Land, (Hawthorn Books Inc., N.Y., N.Y.), Bishop Sheen describes Jerusalem, the center of the Old Testament, was eastern while Galilee was a n"international corridor" which was almost European rather than eastern.

Diocesan pilgrims will leave Jerusalem, the old center, and travel to Galilee for a visit to Nazareth where the day will begin with a Mass at the Church of the Annunciation.

Galilee was undoubtedly a busy, crowded district during the time of Christ as can be evidenced by the writings of those who visited there at that time. The Sea of Galilee was filled with fishing towns, one of which was named for the reigning Caesar, Tiberias. The pilgrims will stay in Tiberias on their way from Jerusalem to Nazareth.

Now, the Galilee . a is not so crowded and the pilgrim must, according to Bishop Sheen, imagine the area as a crowded center of commerce and military action. This will not be too difficult because the shores of the lake are dotted with ruins of buildings and shrines which testify to the fact.

The view of this area can best be seen from the hills around Tiberias Pilgrims should have ample time to take advantage of this sight in the late afternoon when they arrive for the night on the way to Naz-

Hearty, substantial, flavorsome and staying . . . what cuisine but German could this possibly describe?

And German cooking smells just as deliciously as it tastes. The aroma of a well-seasoned dumpling dish fills the homespun kitchen, along with the spicy smell of a baking apple kuchen that teases the appetite long before dinner.

Cook noodles according to package directions; drain. In a skillet, melt butter; saute onion and celery. Stir in salt, caraway seed and pepper. Arrange 1/3 of the noodles in casserole, then 1/2 of vegetable mixture. Add ½ of cottage cheese and ½ of sour cream, spreading over evenly. Repeat, ending with noodles. Sprinkle on Brick cheese and pour beaten eggs over top of casserole. Bake 1 hour. Let stand about 10 minutes to absorb liquids before cutting into servings.

Today I have soup on my mind. The hearty nutritious kind that's long in flavor and short in preparation time.

Here are recipes for two delicious soups that your family will welcome. Both are meatless and quick and will help answer that "what to serve" problem for noon day meals during the Lenten season.

ORANGE BLOSSOM DATE CAKE

- 2 cups sifted enriched flour
- 34 teaspoon salt ½ teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- ½ cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 34 cup sour milk
- ½ cup chopped dates
- ½ cup chopped nuts ½ cup orange juice
- ⅔ cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon granted orange rind

Grease a 9-inch square baking pan. Sift together flour, salt, soda and baking powder. Cream shortening and 1 cup sugar together until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. Add sifted ingredients alternately with sour milk, mixing well after each addition. Stir in dates and nuts. Pour batter into baking pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 25 to 30 minutes. Combine orange juice, 2/3 cup sugar and orange rind, and heat to boiling. Pour over warm cake, Serve warm with whipped cream or dairy sour cream, if desired.

PASS THE CHEESE, PLEASE

Cheddar and chili sauce combine in a number of zesty appetizers. Try these two for a start.

For 34 cup Chili-Cheese Spread: blend 1 cup finely shredded sharp Cheddar cheese and 2 tablespoons chili-sauce. Spread on crackers and broil until cheese melts.

For ¾ cup Chili-Cheese Bacon Spread: blend 1 cup finely shredded sharp Cheddar cheese, 2 tablespoons chili sauce, 2 slices bacon fried crisp and crumbled, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 1 tablespoon finely chopped green pepper. Spread on crackers and broil until cheese melts.

Old-fashioned but still delicious is homemade pot cheese. Make it up to have on hand and serve in many ways. In a sauce-pan combine 1/4 cup softened butter, 1/3 cup mashed Blue cheese, 1 Baby Gouda cheese finely shredded. Blend in 2

tablespoons chopped chives and a dash of cayenne pepper. Place tablespoons chopped chives and a dash of cayenne pepper. Place over low heat and stir constantly until cheese is melted. Cool slightly; pour into small pots, cover and refrigerate. Serve with assorted crackers and breads.

Do Children Today Disobey More?

Are modern conditions making children more disobedient? We have five and they are getting to be almost more than I can handle - the two oldest boys of 10 and 12 are becoming particularly difficult and will do what I tell them only when they want to. My husband works very hard, and since he's a little on the stern side, I hesitate to say too much to him for fear he'll be too rough in punishing them. Maybe I haven't been strict enough. Do other parents face the same problem?

Yes, Gloria, some other parents do face the same problem, and I don't think it's wholly a matter of modern conditions. The experts do not agree about how modern living conditions affect children - or adults. Although it appears that considered as a group, children are becoming healthier; more restless, more demanding, more precocious - because of television, radio, mobility, and so on - it is not clear that they are therefore becoming more aggressive or inclined to disobey.

Perhaps you haven't been strict enough? Well, Gloria, that's generally the first thought that comes to mind when we observe disobedient youngsters, particularly since some modern parents have adopted a policy of pseudo-permissiveness in raising their children.

Yet disobedience in the home is frequently not the result of being too strict or too permissive. These are highly relative terms, of course, and successful parents tend to differ considerably on what they judge to be the ideal balance between restrictive and permissive discipline.

Display Pattern Of Disobedience

When children display a pattern of disobedience - all normal youngsters are more or less disobedient at one time or another - parents should ask themselves the following questions. Have they given any thought to what they are trying to accomplish in disciplining their children?

To be sure, one of their immediate aims will be simple survival. A half dozen energetic young barbarians may make a home, but they can wreck a house unless they've been taught some respect for property and the rights of others.

Unfortunately, some parents never look beyond this narrow, negative aspect of discipline, yet their major task must be to help each child gradually acquire a sense of personal responsibility and self-mastery by curbing is self-centered impulses or drives and internalizing the norms and rules determining acceptable conduct within the society in which he must live. In other words, discipline must aim at the formation of character, not the mere preservation of peace and order around the home.

Have they given any thought to the changing needs of their children as they grow up? Discipline must be adopted to the various stages of growth. It is a waste of time to try to reason with young children — you simply tell them — but as they grow older they should be given the reasons and motives underlying expected conduct, so that they gradually learn to act on principles rather than out of fear of punishment.

Has Discipline Been Consistent?

Has their discipline been consistent? Lack of consistency is probably the major source of disobedience among children, since it leaves them confused and frustrated. Several types of consistency are important in discipline.

First, there must be consistency between the parents. If they cannot agree, the children soon learn to play one against the other, or become confused by the contradictory demands they are expected to meet. Although parents may have different views on discipline and may discuss these in private, they should agree on a common program of action and support each other in carry-

Second, discipline should be consistent from one occasion to another. If parents enforce discipline only according to their changing mood, or punish a child for a given act on ne occasion and not on the next, the child is bound to be confused or may decide to gamble on disobedience, since punishment is not certain.

Third, when there are several children in the family, disciplinary treatment should be consistent among all of them. For various reasons and often without realizing it, one or both parents may favor one child over another. Children have a strong sense of justice and such unequal treatment readily increases rivalry, jealousy, and even rebellion.

Finally, there must be consistency between words and actions. Children soon learn whether or not parents mean what they say, for part of their search for independence consists in testing all rules and superiors. Parents should not be surprised if their growing children try to see how far they can go. Such testing is the child's way of learning where he stands, and if parents fail to follow words with actions, the child knows he is dealing with bluffs and will behave ac-

A careful review of all these points should throw some helpful light on your problem, Gloria. Above all, you must secure the cooperation of your husband. Once boys reach teen-age, they



have even greater need of the firm control and guidance of their fathers. Discuss this need with your husband, reminding him that your aim as parents is not merely to avoid trouble but to



Predicando con la Palabra y el Ejemplo

Anuncian su Modesta Reforma Agraria los Obispos Chilenos

SANTIAGO DE CHILE, (NC) Después de proponer la doctrina en la Iglesia sobre el bienestar del campesino, los obispode Chile han ofrecido embarcarse ellos mismos en un programa de reforma agraria.

Los prelados, que se reunieron hace unas semanas, acaban de publicar el texto de una pastoral sobre la situación del campesino chileno.

"Deseosos de colaborar no sólo con la doctrina fundamental, sino además con el ejemplo de las realizaciones concretas, hemos acordado en asamblea plenaria estudiar la eventual colonización de las tierras agrícolas que están en propiedad y libre uso de la jerarquía".

Al efecto nombraron una comisión técnica que estudia ya los aspectos legales y técnicos, "a fin de facilitar el acceso de los campesinos a la propiedad de la tierra". Se estiman en unas 6,000 hectáreas, las tierras que poseen las diócesis en Chile.

Con la repartición de nuestras tierras, dicen los obispos chilenos, "entendemos contribuír en la modesta proporción que nos corresponde, a los fines de una eficaz reforma agraria."

El documento señala estos fines: 1) "mejor utilización de la tierra para la comunidad nacional", 2) "mayor participación de la familia campesina en la propiedad y rentabilidad de la misma."

Advierten los prelados chilenos que sus tierras no son muchas, pero para ellos es un sacrificio importante.

"La utilidad que se obtiene de esas propiedades está destinada en su totalidad a la mantención de obras de beneficencia, educación y bien social, y por ello la privación de tales ingresos supone un nuevo estudio, a fin de que esta medida no vayan en desmedro de las obras que en bien del pueblo mantiene la Iglesia."

Hay en el país 1,017 instituciones católicas de enseñanza con 262,683 alumnos, muchos de ellos gratis; y 251 instituciones de asistencia social con 46,800 beneficiados.

Las Adversas Condiciones del Campesino

Gran parte de la pastoral se destina a describir las adversas condiciones en que vive el campesino chileno, sus problemas y su desapego a la tierra, y las relaciones "anticristianas" entre patrón y obrero.

Estas condiciones "reclaman con urgencia una profunda transformación de la estructura rural (para fundarla) en el respeto por los principios morales y espirituales que yacen en el orden creado, y por la persona humana, imagen de Dios.'

"Sólo un cristianismo concreto" que haga más humana la relación del hombre y la tierra "en esta América cristiana por nacimiento y por destino", podrá conjurar a tiempo la amenaza de ideologías materialistas, indica el documento después.

Al efecto, los 25 obispos de Chile escribien:

"Exhortamos a nuestros abnegados sacerdotes y religiesos, a los educadores, a los generosos miembros de la Acción Católica y a todos nuestros fieles, a que se consagren plenamente a la renovación de la vida cristiana, especialmente en el campo, tanto del trabajador manual, como de los propietarios de la tierra."

"Todos han de comprender la verdadera finalidad del hombre y de los bienes puestos a su alcance, y la responsabilidad que cada cual tiene frente a Dios."


Los prelados recalcan que toda acción pastoral ir acompañada del "conocimiento profundo y fiel de 12 doctrina social de la Iglesia, (extendido) a todos los sectores mediante conferencias, círculos de estudio, y organizaciones patronales y campesinas".

Esta acción debe realizarse también la ciudad, advierten, porque allí viven no pocos propietarios de tierras.

Sólo así se formará "un ambiente propicio para oportuna y eficaz solución de los problemas rurales que hemos tratado".

Un grupo de técnicos y profesionales realizan los estudios preliminares, que incluyen el posible empleo de cooperativas de producción agrícola entre los actuales trabajadores de esas tierras.

Según los últimos datos vigentes para Chile, unos 1,-500 terratenientes (el uno por ciento de todos los propietarios de tierras) poseen 17 millones de hectáreas, o sea el 63 por ciento de la tierra cultivable, y 130,000 pequeños propietarios poseen 600,000 hectáreas, o sea el 2,4 por ciento de la tierra, la mayoría en minifundios poco pre-



munismo, aprovecharía."

El Comunismo —advirtió

Mons. Pérez— no es ya un
simple recurso de propaganda y mentira como fue en

"Es hoy una terrible realidad cuyas manifestaciones estamos viendo constantemente en los actos de sabotaje, como fueron los recientes incendios de cañaverales y fincas de pastos, y los desórdenes callejeros, así como la creciente propaganda subversiva impresa destinada a alterar el orden y la paz públicas."

What a change has taken place in the missionary world within the past 100 years! At the Council of the Vatican in 1870, there were no native bishops from Africa, Asia or Oceania; a few Vicars Apostolic of European origin represented the mission world. Today, all the hierarchy of Japan is native, and Africa has over 42 native bishops, a few more than Asia. Despite persecution, or perhaps because of it, the Church has had a remarkable growth.

As Paul, a Jew, Hellenized the Church at Corinth and other sites, so Pius XI, Pius XII and John XXIII have made the Church native in as many places as possible. The New Testament Church did not become Latin or Greek by rejecting everything Jewish; rather, it perfected the latter with Latin and Greek culture. The same thing is happening today. The Church does not become Indian or Indonesian or Korean by throwing off the three cultures proclaimed over the Cross on Calvary; it does so by enriching the latter with the vestures of new civilizations.


The bishops of Africa and the East who will attend the Second Vatican Council point up the necessity of aiding the Church at its center, namely, the Vicar of Christ. The Holy Father knew what he was doing when he said he must be aided "first and principally." He did not say "only" or "exclusively," but he did establish a pyramid of values. He alone can name native bishops—no one else in the world can do so. Missionaries can train natives, but they cannot build up a native hierarchy. That must come from the Holy Father.

Last year the Catholics of the United States gave the Holy Father an average of 27 cents each for his Missions. This year, we would like to see every Catholic offer the Holy Father a minimum of \$10. We give much in foreign aid to restore countries which are in danger of turning Communist—some \$99 million to Venezuela, \$357-million to Brazil, \$135 million to Chile—but we spend too little for "native aid." Arouse yourself to the truth that Africa and Asia will determine the future of the world, politically and religiously, and send a sacrifice to the Holy Father for the native bishops in those countries. He will receive it through his Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

The divine origin of the Catholic Church, the authority conferred upon her to teach His truths to all nations, and the

marks of her unity, sanctity, Catholicity and apostolicity continue to draw sincere inquirers into her fold as the magnet draws the steel.



This is true not only in

America but in other countries as well. This is illustrated in the conversion of Mrs. Gertrude Chapman of Semaphore Park Adelaide South Australia.

"As a child," related Mrs.
Chapman, "in a small village in
England, and a considerable
distance from the Anglican
church, I was sent to a nonconformist chapel, where I attended services and Sunday
school. I know now that I owe
much to the earnest people who
did their best to instruct me.
Later, I joined the Anglican
Church, but its services never
seemed to meet my spiritual
needs or bring me close to God.

"Coming to Australia, I married and lived far out in the country, at a great distance from all churches. For 13 years I attended no religious services. Once we were visited by a priest who had traveled 500 miles to offer Mass and administer the sacraments to a few widely scattered Catholic families. We were much impressed with the zeal which prompted the missionary to undertake such a long and arduous journey for such a few souls.

"I admired the unity and the universality of the Catholic Church. Unlike Anglicans who differ so much in liturgy and creed, Catholics everywhere attend the same Mass, receive the same sacraments, profess the same Faith and acknowledge the supreme spiritual authority. I remember a Catholic explaining to me that the word Catholic meant universal, and hence the term 'Roman Catholic' should not be applied to its members since it involves a contradiction.

"Later we moved to Alelaide where there are many churches. One day a friend invited me to attend Sunday Mass with her. It was the first time I had entered a Catholic church, as I had often heard remarks about the superstitious practices of Catholics — adoring statues and worshiping the Virgin Mary. Instead of such practices, however, the service was one of stately beauty.

"The reverence and silence of the worshipers, the singing of the choir, and the carefully prepared sermon stirred me profoundly. After the consecration when the priest raised aloft the Eucharistic host, I felt I was truly in the presence of God and wanted with all my heart to join with the celebrant and the worshipers in offering up the sacrificial Victim, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins.

"I was determined to study the Catholic religion and read everything I could find about it. Later I called upon Father T. M. O'Rourke and he arranged for Mother Mary Madeleine of the Sisters of Mercy to instruct me. Unmistakable was the evidence of the foundation of the Catholic Church by Christ, who promised to be with her 'all days even unto the consummation of the world.' Impressive too was the list of supreme pontiffs stretching from St. Peter to the present pope.

"It was clear to me that the Catholic Church is the Mother Church of Christianity, the Mother of the New Testament, every word of which was written by a Catholic. I was baptized by Father M. J. Boyard at St. Francis Xavier Cathedral and received into the Church which was taught Christ's truths through all the centuries. For this great gift I can only say, 'O Lord, I am not worthy.'"

What Constitutes Valid Marriage?

Q. I do not believe your answer in the Pegler case was very convincing. I was instructed that a marriage contracted by two baptized people (Catholic or not) performed by a religious (Catholic or not) constituted a valid marriage. Has my instruction been in error?

A. It certainly has. I am happy to straighten out errors of instruction, and to explain the marriage laws of the Church, even though these laws are intricate and hardly to be understood in detail by anyone who has not studied them thoroughly.

The annoyance I manifested in my previous answer results from the persistent habit of some of our Catholic people to question in shocked wonderment every "remarriage" which the Church permits to a person of prominent name: columnist, politician, or movie star. They demand to know how the Church can permit such marriage.

Whereas, if they knew even a bit of the law, they would realize that evidence in cases of this kind is usually intimate and personal, and cannot be divulged. Even an omniscient columnist can only guess at the nature of the case involved.

Let's put it this way. Suppose you had been married and divorced: The Church has studied your case and amassed a dossier of information, much of it quite embarrassing to you. Then on the basis of that evidence the Church gives you a declaration of nullity. But your nosey neighbors demand to know how, and why. Would you expect the Church to reveal the sticky details just to satisfy their accusing curiosity?

It is the nosey, distrusting gossip who annoys me.

But now to your erroneous idea. A Catholic can be validly married only before a priest. A Catholic's marriage to a baptized Protestant before a minister is invalid. It is equally invalid if it takes place before a justice of the peace. Protestants or non-baptized people, when they marry each other can marry validly either before a minister or a justice.

And now my latest querulous query demands an explanation of how Kay Spreckles Gable can be a Catholic when she has been married and divorced so many times. Do you see my point? Unless I want to become a nosey gossip myself how can I even find out how many times Mrs. Gable has been married? It is strictly none of my business



Q. In churches where there is a communion cloth what is the proper thing to do with the hands? Put them under the communion cloth? Fold them on top of the communion cloth?

A. The rubrics of the Missal, before their recent revision, prescribed that a communion cloth be spread before the faithful who are receiving Holy Communion. Where there is a rail the cloth is draped over it; it

must be of linen or hemp, and it must be clean.

It is not to be held or dled in any way by the communicants. Certainly the hands should not be put under it. It is all right for the hands to be folded gently on top of it. (N.B. It is not a cushion for elbows!)

Even though the new rubrics do not mention the communion cloth it is still prescribed by the Ritual and the Ceremonial of the Church, and by an instruction of the Congregation of the Sacrament given March 26, 1929, and never revoked.

Even when the communion cloth is used — and it should always be used — there must still be a communion plate, which is held by each communicant at the time he receives. (In practice this plate is often held by the altar boy.)



Q. After a morning offering is made do all your good acts gain merit even though you have no spiritual attitude toward them at the time you do them?

A. Yes, provided you do not retract your offering and substitute incompatible motives. And provided, of course, that you perform these acts in the state of grace. Of course it is desirable that our morning offering be renewed during the day by brief moments of prayer.

Current Movie Priests Lack Realism

By WILLIAM H. MOORING

Critics who called Bing Crosby's Father O'Malley films 'flaccid and frivolous' may need stronger adjectives to describe the weakness of some priestly characters in current circulation. The cry seems to have been that more substantial drama with an eye on art instead of mass audience, would rid the screen of ribald or ridiculous representations of the cloth. It "ain't necessarily so."

McCarey's current drama, "Satan Never Sleeps," obviously starts from a more evocative viewpoint, but although it hinges on the harrowing problems of Red persecution in China, neither William Holden's leather - jacketed Father O'Banion, nor Clifton Webb's more mature Father Bovard seems any more true to life than Bing's Father O'Malley, soon to be copied in an ABC television series starring Gene Kelly.

Maurice Chevalier's Father Antonio, in the new French-Italian comedy "Jessica," though amusing, has neither spiritual depth nor the slightest, clerical verisimilitude for all of the film's bold treatment of relevant facts. It is as flippant and frothy as they come.

John Mills in Britain's "The Singer, Not the Song," plays a priest at grips with a bandit (Dirk Bogarde). Although the theme poses highly dramatic pretensions and Mills is an artist of unusual merit, the character lacks dimension and the

Angle Bay Thevest Concept Conc In "Saintly Sinners," Don Beddoe as Father Dan goes fishing in a stolen car, implicates himself in a bank robbery and dithers through the mess. His Monsignor (Addison Richards) fumbles the truth although the situation would be clear to a child. In his "Two Women," which wins Sophia Loren an Oscar bid, Italy's Vittorio De Sica resorts to the nameless, aimless priest in the crowd, so often used to symbolize the Church's alleged indifference to social

In the German - American production "The Bashful Elephant," Fritz Weiss, as Father Francis, is straight out of comic opera, although the story presumes to deal with a tiny Hungarian refugee, caught in the pathetic aftermath of abortive, anti-commu-

The priest portrayed by Spencer Tracy in last year's "Devil at 4 O'Clock" brought power to realistic drama, filmed with artistic perception but it failed to equal in dramatic conviction, the Father Flanagan whom Tracy made so memorable in the admittedly sentimental "Boystown" films of the 1930s. Nor was it as credible or creditable as Gregory Peck's Father Chisholm, in "The Keys of the Kingdom" (1945), albeit this evolved incidental misstatements of Catholic doctrine. 



# Ban On Sunday Sales Upheld By Pennsylvania High Court

PITTSBURGH (NC) — The State Supreme Court has rejected a challenge to the constitutionality of Pennsylvania's 1959 law against Sunday business operations.

The court turned down an appeal by Bargain City, U.S.A., which operates a chain of discount stores.

The challenge contended that the 1959 law violates the State Constitution on the grounds that it is a local law regulating labor or trade and also violates the Federal Constitution because Philadelphia law enforcement officials discriminated in its enforcement.

In rejecting the first charge, the court commented: "We are satisfied that the legislative classification bears a reasonable and logical relationship to the end sought, that of effective enforcement of a valid legislative act in an area particularly subject to violation."




