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

## Kennedy To Visit Pope John

WASHINGTON - Announcement that President Kennedy will visit Pope John XXIII next month has revived interest here in previous meetings between U.S. chief executives and Roman pontiffs.

President Kennedy will become the third president of the U.S. to call upon a pope while in office. One other president visited a pope before entering the White House, and three others visited pontiffs after their presidential terms expired.

#### Schools Closed Memorial Day

Schools in the Diocese of Miami will be closed Thursday, May 30 in observance of Memorial Day according to an announcement from the Department of Educavisit to Italy, expected to begin June 20.

As the nation's first Roman Catholic president, Mr. Kennedy will be making history by calling on Pope John.

It is not yet known whether the visit will take place at the Vatican or at the Pope's summer residence at Castelgandolfo. Details of the visit are to be worked out by a White House advance party going to Italy

During his European tour next month the President will visit West Germany and Ireland as well as Italy. Mr. Kennedy is to return to the U.S. June 29.

The two previous U.S. chief executives who have met with a pope while in office are Woodrow Wilson, who visited Pope Benedict XV in 1919, and Dwight D. Eisenhower, who visited Pope John in 1959.

O'Connell, and Father Jack L. Totty for the Diocese of Miami and on Father Ernesto Garcia-Rubio for the Archdiocese of Havana.

Father Gary R. Steibel will be ordained for the Diocese of Miami by Archbishop Egidio Vagnozzi, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, on Saturday May 25, at the Pontificial College Josephinum in Worthington,

Father Kevin MacGabhann, of Dublin, will be ordained in June at St. John College, Waterford.

Father Charles Zinn, of Fort Lauderdale, who was ordained last December at Christ the King Church in Rome, has been continuing his studies there and will return home next month. Father Thomas P. Hanly, or-

## Pope On Retreat; His Health Guarded

VATICAN CITY (NC) - Pope John XXIII was expected to withdraw from all but the most pressing demands of his office so that he could go on a spiritual retreat in preparation for the feast of Pentecost.

There was no official announcement, but Vatican authorities said that Pope John would go on retreat.

Word of his pending withdrawal followed rumors to the effect that he had had a new attack of illness. But no authoritative comment about the Pope's health was available.

The week before the feast of the Ascension he had canceled for two days all private audiences and regularly scheduled conferences.

Pope John's Wednesday general audience was canceled less than an hour before it was scheduled to begin. But the Pope appeared at an apartment window overlooking St. Peter's Square and told a disappointed crowd of 10,000 that "it is still St. Peter's, whether inside or out."

He led the recitation of Regina Coeli and gave his apostolic blessing. The Pope looked drawn, but spoke in a firm voice.

Pope John's planned retreat would not only allow him a period of special prayer, but would also free him from the burden of audiences and routine business.

His retreat was to coincide with the pre-Pentecost novena to the Holy Spirit to implore Christian unity.

## Vatican Council To Speak On Peace, War

\_NEW YORK (NC) — The Second Vatican Council will speak out on peace and war, Leo Cardinal Suenens, Archbishop of Malines - Brussels, Belgium, has disclosed.

Cardinal Suenens, here to address a meeting of the U. S. committee for the United Nations on the recent papal peace encyclical Pacem in Terris, gaid the council will deal with peace and war in a special schema on vital world problems.

This schema will take up suchissues as population, hunger, race, the developing nations, the Church and the individual, the Church and culture, and the Church and social and economic affairs, he said in an interview

The Cardinal is head of the commission drafting this schema.

#### PRESS COVERAGE

Cardinal Suenens also said he sees "no reason" why newsmen should not be admitted to at least some sessions of the council.

He said the council Fathers are "now studying how to make it (arrangements for press coverage) better in the next session."

One idea under consideration, he said, is to have one or more bishops meet with nevsmen daily and discuss what is taking place in the council.

Cardinal Suenens was asked whether Pope John had advocated unilateral disarmament in his peace encyclical, in the event that both sides could not be persuaded to disarm. He replied:

"No. In Pope John's view both sides must disarm."

QUITE IMPORTANT
The Belgian Cardinal spoke at length of the need for making the Church's message more intelligible to the modern world. He interpreted the division of the council Fathers at the first session over the question of the sources of Revelation in these terms, saying:

"It was largely a question of how to express ourselves. Some stressed the need of underlining principles in all things and of saying exactly, has always been said.

"Some wanted to say things so that all can understand them properly. These are differences over modes of expression and such things can be quite important."

#### 'LAYMAN'S ROLE

He said it is "always important" that the Church express itself effectively but "today it is more important than ever."

"There are so many misunderstandings," he said.
"Words change so easily in meaning. And today so many people do not understand religious affairs . . . Matters of religion must be expressed to them very clearly and exactly and in some detail if they are to understand what we are talking about."

Cardinal Suenens stressed that laymen must have a more active role in the Church.

"We must emphasize that the lay person has not only the role of helping the priest materially, but of helping him in his spiritual role, too," he said.


"The layman must share in spreading the kingdom of God in the world."

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## 'Passive Catholics' Called Chief Problem Of Church

NOTRE DAME, Ind. (NC) — Belgium's Leo Cardinal Suenens declared here that the main problem facing the Church is "to make passive Catholics active."

Catholics have no right, he said, "simply to accept their faith, but must give it to others."

Speaking at an outdoor University of Notre Dame convocation, the Archbishop of Malines-Brussels said Christians have a duty "to know God and to make Him known, to love God and to make Him loyed, to serve God and to make Him served."

Cardinal Suenens spoke at the grotto of Our Lady of Lourdes on the campus after receiving an honorary doctor of laws degree from Father Theodore M. Hesburgh, C.S.C., Notre Dame president.

Once a hostage slated for execution by the nazis, he was cited as "a valorous fighter and

almost martyr for truth, freedom and justice."

"No man alive," the citation declared, "better understands the meaning, force and charity" of Pope John XXIII's recent peace encyclical Pacem in Terris.

The Belgian Cardinal, who spoke on the encyclical earlier at the United Nations headquarters in New York, described it as "an open letter from the Pope to the universe."

The U.N. he said, is the "first step" toward peace and order in the world, "but we must go further."

He pictured the Pope as serene despite the monumental problems facing the world and his own burdens.

He quoted Pope John as saying recently: "Some people prefer to complicate simple things; I prefer to simplify complicated things."

Cardinal Suenens termed the Second Vatican Council "one of the most important councils in history."

## Sacred Heart School Grads Are Greeted By President

WASHINGTON (NC) — President Kennedy surprised alumnae of schools of the Religious of the Sacred Heart by unexpectedly appearing to greet them during a White House tour.

Noting that his mother, three sisters and two sisters in-law were Sacred Heart graduates, the President joked that he was used to having alumnae around, but never as many at one time.


Some 600 delegates to the 14th biennial conference of the Associated Alumnae of the Sacred Heart were touring the White House.

Msgr. William Barry, P.A., pastor, St. Patrick parish, Miami Beach, and life-long friend of the jubilarian, will preach the sermon during the jubilee Mass at which more than 1,000 are expected to assist.

#### BORN IN COUNTY KERRY

Born in County Kerry, Jan. 13, 1913, Monsignor O'Donoghue began his studies for the priesthood at St. Brendan Seminary, Killarney, and St. Kieran Seminary, Kilkenny. Following four years of theological studies at St. John Lateran University in Rome, he was ordained there for the Diocese of St. Augustine on May 15, 1938.

Shortly after his arrival in Florida, the young Father O'Donoghue was appointed assistant pastor at the Church of the Little Flower, Coral Gables, one of the four Catholic parishes which then served the Greater Miami area. The others were Gesu and St. Mary, Miami, and St. Patrick, Miami Beach.

Until 1945 he assisted the late Msgr. Thomas Comber, pastor, in ministering to the spiritual needs of the large number of Catholics served by the Coral Gables parish.

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## NEA Blasted By Goldwater At College Aid Bill Hearing

WASHINGTON (NC) - The Senate education subcommittee received several proposals for U.S. aid to higher education in hearings last week.

It also heard from three opponents of assistance for education in church - related schools. They were the American Humanist Association, the Unitarian Fellowship for Social Justice and Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and

Headed by Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, the subcommittee recessed for a week and will pick up hearings again during the week of May 27.

Focal point of the sessions has been President Kennedy's 24 - proposal "omnibus" bill which would aid all levels of education. The measure already has been cut up by the House Education Committee which has approved a separate bill for aid to public and private colleges.

In the meantime, the National Education Associaiton reported that a pamphlet which drew angry charges from Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona is out of

Goldwater, who opposes U.S. aid to education, charged the powerful association with distributing a "subversive document" when it reprinted an editorial from the Hutchinson (Kan.) News. The editorial said that the aid to education controversy is "a struggle between people with wealth and people with

As Robert H. Wyatt, NEA president - elect, sat in the witness chair, Goldwater waved the pamphlet and charged that it

"could have been printed in the Daily Worker. It is anti-American. It is subversive.'

Goldwater read into the subcommittee's record a portion of the pamphlet which said that "the traditional foes (of Federal aid) have been helped this year by such strange bedfellows as Sen. J. Strom Thurmond (of South Carolina) who is afraid the Negroes will get in and Cardinal Spellman who is afraid that the Catholics will be left out."

The NEA, an 815,000-member organization whose voice is one of the most influential on education legislation, said later it had distributed 11,000 copies of the pamphlet last Fall.

In testimony from college spokesmen, the subcommittee heard Logan Wilson, president of the American Council on Education, support Federal assistance for all types of institutions, public, church-related and independent.

The three groups which opposed aid to private institutions all struck the same theme: their concept of separation of Church and State demands that education in church-related institutions be denied assistance.

The spokesmen for the Humanist Association was Roy R. Torcaso of Wheaton, Md., a principal figure in a major decison of the U.S. Supreme Court related to Church-State rela-

Torcaso, who in 1961 called himself an atheist, refused to take an oath as a Maryland notary public because it required a declaration of belief in God's existence. The Supreme Court struck down this required declaration on June 19, 1961.

## **Bus-Rides-For-All Backers** Fear Missouri Referendum

ST. LOUIS (NC) — Advocates of tax-paid school bus transportation for parochial school pupils reported themselves far from happy over the proposal to put the controversial issue up to a statewide vote.

They said the referendum is likely to result in rejection of the bus rides unless there is a massive education effort. A major obstacle would be the heavily anti - Catholic prejudices in rural areas, they

Such a failure, they predict-

ed, would effectively kill the school bus issue for years to

They were asked for comment on a constitutional amendment introduced in the Missouri House of Representatives. It calls for voters in the 1964 balloting to decide whether the Department of Public Health and Welfare should establish a system of state aid for tax-paid transportation of children in private and parochial schools.

One observer of the recent maneuvers on the bus issue. the hottest potato in the current legislative session, said that "putting the idea up to a vote should get everyone off the hook.

"It will please the Catholics in St. Louis and Jackson (Kansas City) counties because they can vote for the issue and it won't offend the folks outstate because they know they will be able to vote it down."

The vote idea was proposed by a St. Louis legislator, Thomas A. Walsh, following statewide protests by Catholic parents over the death of a bill to let private school pupils share in tax-paid school bus transporta-

## Ribicoff Gives 6 Proposals For Aid To Private Schools

WASHINGTON (NC) - Sen. Abraham Ribicoff has presented the Senate with a six-point program to aid education in church-related schools and extinguish what he called smoldering religious controversy.

The Connecticut legislator said his two-year stint as President Kennedy's first Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare taught him the "depths of the feelings and strength of the convictions in-

"But I firmly believe," he said in the Senate, "that the effort must be made to resolve this controversy."

Ribicoff's statement comes almost one full year after he stirred nationwide comment with a similar declaration.

#### BASIS FOR ACTION

In June, 1962, speaking as HEW Secretary, he told a television news panel show that he thought it possible to aid education given in parochial and other private schools.

In his Senate speech, Ribicoff made thse proposals as a basis for action:

#### 1. Income tax deductions of up to \$1,500 per college student and \$100 per student for private school expenses.

- 2. Public financing of sharedtime arrangements whereby private school pupils could use some public school facilities. For each private school pupil using public school space and equipment, states would get half the allotment proposed for fulltime public school students.
- 3. Assistance for special purposes. "In elementary and secondary schools, there is a wide range of permissible aid in selective areas such as math. science and foreign language teaching . . . We should explore . . . classroom construc-
- 4. Broadening present programs of teacher training for all teachers, including those in privat: schools. "Why not provide scholarships which would enable promising teachers to return to universities for a year of advanced study?'
- 5. Furnishing auxiliary services of direct benefit to the child, such as school lunches and bus transportation.
- 6. Aiding all types of higher

education. "I am entirely satisfied that public funds may be used broadly without constitutional question."

Ribicoff said that private school students number more than 15 per cent of all students in the elementary grades, 11 per cent in the secondary grades and 33 per cent in higher education.

#### ARE PERMISSIBLE

"It is a fact," he said, "that these children, in these numbers, attend private and churchrelated schools. It is a far their parents have exe. .ed the right to send their children to these schools, in preference to available public education.

"It is a fact that the education of each of these children means just as much to the strength and future of this nation as the education of every child in a public school."

Turning to constitutional issues, Ribicoff said too much had been heard from extremists.

"There is agreement both that the Constitution does place some outer limits on the use of public funds for private education and that there is a range of activity within these limits where some forms of public assistance are permissible.

#### ASSISTANCE SOUGHT

"The exact point at which the constitutional limitations apply is not clear. But disagreement over the outer limits should not foreclose full consideration of all possibilities within the area of generally agreed constitutionality," he said.

Ribicoff said some people think that private schools should be financed exactly like public schools. "But this is not the prevailing view of those who seek some assistance for private and churchrelated schools," he noted.

"Most proponents of aid to private education have forthrightly recognized that public funds ought not to be used for religious teaching; their proposals have been designed to exclude an expenditure for this purpose.

"Of course, there is much dispute on all sides as to what constitutes support of religious teaching. But that is no reason to ignore the agreement on the underlying principle: assistance is being sought for non-religious aspects of private education."

## Priests, Nuns Join Strike **Against Guiana Leftists**

PORT - OF - SPAIN, Trinidad (NC) - Priests and Sisters have joined in the general strike against Premier Cheddi Jagan's leftist regime in British Guiana, according to word received here on a fishing vessel from that country.

Normal communications between British Guiana and the outside world have been disrupted by the strike.

tion is likely in the case of Jozsef Cardinal Mindszenty, according to the Austrian cardinal who saw him in Budapest in mid-April and has arrived here to report on their interview to Church authorities.

Franziskus Cardinal Koenig, Archbishop of Vienna, told newsmen on his arrival that many factors are involved in Church-State negotiations in Red Hungary concerning the possible departure of the Hungarian Primate from the U.S. legation there.

But Cardinal Koenig, who met the press briefly at the Rome airport, said the negotiations about Cardinal Mindszenty are "the business of the Vatican" and declined to comment on his role in them.

#### UNUSUAL SECURITY

Asked to give his opinion about the possible future arrival of Cardinal Mindszenty in Rome, he said only: "I do not believe there will be a rapid

Shortly before Cardinal Koenig's arrival, a high Vatican official returned here from Budapest where he conferred with Church and State authorities. The arrival of Msgr. Agostina Casaroli, Undersecretary for Extraordinary Ecclesiastical Affairs in the Papal Secretariat of State, was surrounded at the Rome airport with unusual security measures, which led several news agencies to report mistakenly that Cardinal Mindszenty had arrived here.

Monsignor Casaroli has seen no newsmen and has made no comment on his Budapest activ-

#### CONFLICTING REPORTS

The arrival of the two prelates in the face of conflicting reports from Hungary has touched off renewed speculation about the terms of the possible departure of the Hungarian primate from the U.S. legation.

But absolute silence is being maintained by all Vatican officials who have termed the matter "very delicate" and who have been unwilling to risk upsetting any possible understandings by premature

come to Rome. Parties to the agreement, reports said, were communist Hungary, the Holy See and the U.S.

#### REPORTS DENIED

The following day a Hungarian government source reportedly denied knowledge of such an agreement and a U.S. legation spokesman stated that the legation had not taken part in any negotiations with the Church or Hungarian government authorities.

Other reports reaching here from Vienna and Budapest centered on stories that Cardinal Minszenty has set certain conditions for his leaving the legation.

The Cardinal is understood here to be strongly opposed to leaving his country before receiving firm assurances from the communist regime that it will relax its stranglehold on the Church.

Speculation on Cardinal Mindszenty's fate has been building up for the past month.

The Cardinal, now 71, entered the American legation in Budapest on November 4, 1956 - a refugee from Soviet forces quelling Hungary's short-lived rebellion against communist government. Anticommunists had freed the Cardinal only four days earlier from the jail where he was serving a life sentence.

#### FOUR POSSIBILITIES

There appear to be only four possibilities in the future for Cardinal Mindszenty.

• He could be restored to his See and permitted to govern it under the same difficulties and restrictions which hamper the other bishops in the country. The likelihood of this outcome is slight.


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## Space Flight A Milestone In Man's Quest For Truth

In the midst of all the excitement and admiration generated by the remarkable flight of Major Gordon Cooper into space, it came as a surprise to hear more than a few people express a dim view of the whole affair by posing the question, "What good is it doing? What's it prove?" The unexpected query reminds us that it's a matter of historical record that Christopher Columbus heard the very same tune, only it was much more strident in his day since it was coupled with the prediction that he and his men in ships would surely fall off the edge of the flat earth.

A few years ago Pope Pius XII answered this very question about the value of space exploration with this beautiful thought: "Through new and broader avenues, humanity is advancing, but always like a pilgrim, towards deeper knowledge of the laws of the explored or unexplored universe, as it is spurred on by the natural thirst for truth."

And Pope John XXIII has indicated on several occasions his profound interest in the space projects. He stated publicly that he had prayed not only for Major Cooper recently, but also for the Russian cosmonaut last summer, because he sees in these flights a potential "contribution to brotherhood and civilization."

These extraordinary efforts are certainly a tribute to the human spirit in its restless desire to push beyond the confines of the earth. This should not be too hard for Christians to understand. As human beings, according to the convictions of our faith, we are not made for this earth. We can never be fully satisfied with what we find here, simply because God has designed the human heart to seek the Infinite. Long ago St. Augustine expressed it: "Thou hast made us for Thyself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in Thee.'

This restlessness of man, so vibrant a part of his nature, drives him on to find truth on this earth, in space, throughout the universe, because in seeking knowledge, he is following the impulse of his nature to seek the Summum Verum, the Truth which is God Himself.

Incidentally, by way of contrast with the strong religious convictions of both John Glenn and Gordon Cooper, we remember the pathetically flip, childish remark of the Russian cosmonaut. Andrian Nikolayev, namely that he did not see God in space, which is about as strong as any argument the communists have ever given for their atheism.

We offer our congratulations to pupils, teachers and parents. Together they form the Catholic school system, a phenomenon which wins our admiration more with the end of each school year.


## Church's Concern For Dead

carefully paid special reverence to the bodies of the faithful because these bodies have served as temples of the Holy Spirit, have been nourished by the Sacred Body and Blood of the Savior, and are destined for reunion with immortal souls for all eter-

This traditional reverence of the Church always has been a source of consolation and of reassurance to Catholics. The sorrow of their loss is made lighter by the knowledge that their dead have been buried in ground blessed and consecrated to the service of God, even as the Church itself is ocnsecrated to the service of God.

The Catholic cemetery had its first beginning at the foot of the Cross when Joseph of Arimathe Church itself is consecrated tomb for the burial of Christ.

When the Apostles left the Supper Room on the first Pentecost Sunday to begin the spread of Christ's Kingdom, they carried with them welldefined ideas concerning the burial of those who died in the Faith. In the first four centuries after the death of Christ, the Church at Rome provided more than 500 miles of catacombs, underground caves for the burial of the

It is estimated that more than 1,700,000 Christians were buried in these hallowed resting places.

The early Christians realized, as do we, that the body, although it is no longer joined to the soul as in life, still is a temple of the Holy Ghost. Because of that belief, they risked their own lives to obtain the bodies of those who had been martyred so that those relics of the saints might be properly enshrined.

The same care and solicitude for the mortal remains of one of the members of Mystical Body Christ's prompts the attention which is given to Catholic cemeteries today. The cemetery as a resting place for the mortal remains of Christ's followers has always been under the care of the Catholic Church.

From earliest times, the cemetery has been called "God's Acre." This is to remind us that it is consecrated to God in a special way and that there the bodies of the saints await that glorious reunion with their souls which Christ has promised at the end of time.

In cemeteries of the Church lie the bodies of countless numbers of uncanonized saints.

Many are known only to God, but that does not lessen their sanctity nor their place in Heaven nor the honor which we accord them by our visits and our prayers. The body is destined to rise glorified on the Day of Judgment.

Burial in a cemetery which is Catholic surely is the most appropriate conclusion to the ceremonies which the Church usually accords the dead. Having received the grace of Extreme Unction, the benefit of a Mass of Requiem and nal blessing, the deceas laid to rest in the company of other members of the Mystical Body.

Thereafter he is remembered in prayers each time another burial takes place in the cemetery. These are recited by the priest officiating at the graveside. The deceased is remembered, too, in the prayers of all visitors in all the years to come.

In the Diocese of Miami, the proper care of the dead has been one of the greatest concern, with the result that although the Diocese is not vet five years old, it already has two fine cemeteries. One is Our Lady of Mercy, serving parishes of all Dade County, and located just four and one-half miles west of Miami International Airport at 11411 North West 25th St. The other is Queen of Heaven, serving the parishes of Broward County and located four and one-half miles north of Sunrise Blvd., at 1500 South State Road No. 7, Pompano

In both cemeteries there have been more than 1,300 burials. including seven priests and three nuns. In Our Lady of Mercy Cemetery there have been five entombed in the temporary crypt awaiting construction of the new Our Lady of Mercy Mausoleum.

Outdoor Masses will be offered at both cemeteries on Memorial Day, Thursday, May 30, for the repose of the souls of all those buried there. The outdoor Memorial Day Masses are traditional, as also are those offered each year on All Souls Day,

It is a holy and a wholesome thought to pray for the dead. So, too, is it an honor, a privilege and an obligation to bury our dead in a Catholic ceme-

## Grace-Christ's Marvelous Gift To Mankind AN ALTAR BOY NAMED "SPECK"

Time and again since the Ecumenical Council began, we have heard that one of its aims will be to make ancient Chris-

tian truths more clear, more understandable for non-Catholics.

The preparation for the coming feast of Pentecost reminds us that one of the most com-

s used by Catholics makes hardly any sense to non-Catholics. We frequently use the phrase, "the state of grace." A confused non-Catholic thus may hear that a person might be in the state of grace or out of it, that he has lost it or regained it, that nothing matters so much as keeping in it. One man who heard two Catholics discussing the state of grace wondered if they were talking about good health.

He was far closer to the truth than he realized. The soul in the state of grace is assuredly in good health, because grace is actually the life of the soul.

#### THE 'NEW LIFE'

Hence, when we say a soul is the state of grace, we mean that it is alive, truly alive with the supernatural life of God. When the soul has lost grace, we mean that it is spiritually

dead, that a serious sin has separated it from God and therefore destroyed its life.

This is the "new life" Our Lord was referring to when He spoke of the necessity of Baptism: "Unless a man be born again of water and the Holy Ghost, he cannot enter into the Kingdom of Heaven."

What makes grace different from anything else is the fact that it is a share in the life of God Himself. It is nothing less than a created participation in the Divine Nature, a marvelous gift far beyond any natural talent or power which a human being may lay claim to.

#### LIFE OF SOUL

Indeed Christ summed up the purpose of His coming to earth in the few words that indicate the necessity and importance of grace: "I am come that you may have life and have it more abundantly."

Now He does not mean here surely the life of the body. We already have that. He is calling attention to the peculiar life of the soul. Hence it is no exaggeration to say that the Son of God became man, died on the cross and founded His Church for the purpose of enabling human beings to receive sanctifying grace and to preserve it until death.

The sacrament of Baptism figures largely in this plan. It is the divine means of putting us in the state of grace for the first time. In this sacrament the Holy Spirit comes into the soul and makes it His temple.

#### **ENORMOUS CHANGES**

St. Augustine says, "The Holy Spirit dwells primarily in the soul and gives it its true life; and since the soul is in the body, the Holy Ghost dwells therefore in our bodies."

The advantages of being in the state of grace are beyond the powers of description. Think of these enormous changes wrought within us by grace - we become sharers of the Divine Nature, children of God, heirs of heaven and members of God's family. It is grace that St. John is talking about when he said we have been given the "nower to become the sons of God." It is truly a supernatural power that enables us to live the supernatural life of heaven hereafter.

#### SPIRITUAL SUICIDE

However, as we well know this most precious gift of grace can be lost. The soul of the Christian is not immune to death as long as the trial of life lasts. And the strange thing is that no one can destroy the life of my soul except myself.

The evil spirits of hell have incredible powers, but they are too weak to take away the life of grace. The best they can do is urge me furiously to commit spiritual suicide. Nor are there any enemies on earth capable of separating my soul from God, thereby causing its death. They too can merely encourage me to do the deed myself.

This points up the wonderful protections God has given me for this most precious of all gifts. I am safe from all enemies — except myself. For the only way I can lose the state of grace is my own deliberate decision to separate myself from God. I can only do this by offending God in a serious way. Hence, it is so clear why mortal sin is so called — deadly.

The coming of the Holy Ghost with His very special grace of Pentecost reminds us most impressively of the necessity of safeguarding the treasure of grace. And this is the reason for the year round stress on frequent confession and Holy Communion. These channels of divine grace cannot be overrated. The sacrament of Penance is the divine remedy for restoring the supernatural life of Christ to a soul dead through mortal sin. Holy Communion is the greatest means of increasing the life of grace in the soul and the best guarantee of never losing it.

## U.S. Migrant Workers Need More Protection Under Law

The Reporter magazine recently took notice of what certain church groups are doing to try to improve the lot of mi-

gratory farm workers in the United States.

"Being the constituents of no one in particular," The Reporter remarked in an editorial note, "the migrant



workers depend as much on the seriousness of 'do-good' lobbies as they do on the seriousness of 'do-good' Con-

"But except for certain church groups, particularly the National Catholic Welfare Conference and the National Council of Churches, and for one or two unions . . . most of the labor and social welfare lobbies have done little beyond testifying when called upon."

#### MAJOR STEP

The Reporter's favorable reference to the National Catholic Welfare Conference is appreciated, but those of us at NCWC (and counterparts in other national Catholic organizations) who are most directly involved in the problem of migratory labor know that we have hardly scratched the surface of the migratory labor problem.

Perhaps the most important single step that should be taken right away to improve the lot of migratory farm workers would be for the Congress to repeal Public Law 78 under which tens of thousands of Mexican farm workers are brought into the United States every year in competition with our own domestic agricultural workers.

Representatives of all three

asked Congress to allow Public Law 78 to expire on Dec. 31, 1963. They are convinced that the program is extremely harmful to American farm workers and small farm operators.

#### "ADVERSE EFFECT"

Public Law 78 was first enacted in 1951 as a temporary measure to bring Mexican farm workers to American growers. Less than two per cent of American farms use the Mexicans, known as braceros. These are often large corporation type farms. In 1962, 227,000 braceros were contracted and recontracted.

The mass importation of foreign workers is one of the major reasons why American farm workers, the poorest work group in the United States, were able to earn an average of only \$881 in agriculture during all of 1961 and were able to obtain only 134 days of farm work in the entire year.

Although P.L. 78 seeks to provide against "adverse effect" to domestic farm workers, the importation has kept down their farm wages and limited their employment opportunities. The existence of the program prevents the law of supply and demand from operating in setting farm wages in the bracerousing areas.

#### PRODUCES POVERTY

A bracero-seeking grower offers work at perhaps 60 cents an hour in Arkansas. If the wage is inadequate to attract farm workers, he does not have to raise the pay. He simply tells the Federal Government that he cannot get farm labor, and asks for braceros from Mexico. The poverty of northern Mexico is so great that braceros are available at these wages.

## Our One Purpose In Living: To Love God

The whole spiritual life, as we know, can be summed up in the single phrase, "Love God!"

It is for this that God made us that we might love Him.

There is no other reason for our existence. It is love for God, too, which equips us for the ecstasy of faceto-face union with God in

heaven. Without love, a soul could be in the midst of heaven and still be in hell.

Such a soul could be surrounded by God, by angels and saints, and be totally unaware of their presence. A soul without charity soul without spiritual vision— a soul totally blind.

It is fortunate that God, in baptism, has infused the virtue of charity into our souls, has given us a talent for loying Him. It is not easy to love someone whom we never have seen. It is especially difficult when our love for the unseen God conflicts with our desire for some lesser but visible good. The truth is that, without God's help, we really could not love Him at all.

On the face of it, it seems a great mystery why our love should mean so much to God. In our honest moments we have to admit that our love, at best, is very imperfect.

#### GODS WORLD

There is a good bit of selfinterest intermixed even with our most disinterested loves: our love for spouse, for parent, for child, for brother or sister. It may illumine the mystery a bit if we examine what we might call the "anatomy" of our love for God.

In baptism, the greatest thing which happened to us is that we were made one with Christ; incorporated with Christ is the theological expression. We were united with Christ in a way which our human mind cannot quite fathom.

Christ shared with us His Spirit of divine love. There is no example adequate to illustrate the nature of our union with Jesus.

The closest that we can come by way of parallel is to imagine the intimacy of union that would exist between two humans who shared one and the same soul between them. In a sense, each would be the other. Similarly, after baptism there is a sense in which you are Christ and Christ is you.

#### SPIRITUAL MERGER

Our spiritual merger with Jesus does not destroy our personal freedom. With our cooperation, however, it does make it possible for Jesus to act in and through us. This He does, most especially, in our act of love for God. Our own act of love consists simply in identifying our will with God's. What God wants is what we want. Our love is expressed in our obedience to God's law, an obedience which involves the sacrifice of self.

Our obedience, our act of self - renunciation, creates a clear channel through which which Christ's own love can go, through us to the Father. Our personal love, at its best, is ridiculously weak. But our

own love is transformed by being made the vehicle of Christ's love.

It is not we who love God. It is Christ Who, through us, loves God. The millions of baptized souls, in the state of sanctifying grace, are like so many prisms.

Through them, the infinite love of Jesus is refracted to the Father in limitless variety. The Holy Spirit, the Spirit of Love, flows from Son to Father in a hundred million ways. And, since divine love is an interchange, the Father's love returns to His Son with just as many variations. In loving each of us, God can and does love His Son.

We are, then, God's created instruments of love. We are God's agents in this commerce of infinite love which forever occupies Father, Son and Holy Spirit. ## **Father Charles Ward Gets Doctor Of Theology Degree**

Father Charles F. Ward, assistant chancellor of the Diocese of Miami, has been awarded the degree of Doctor of Sacred Theology by the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C.

The Miami priest recently completed a course of study at the university and in partial fulfillment of requirements for the degree, he presented a dissertation on "Two Recent Theories on the Finality of Extreme Unction."

In a precis soon to be released by Catholic University, Father Ward points out that agreement among Catholic theologians was signally complete until recently on the fundamental purposes and over-all effect of Exteme Unction.

"Indeed, few theological concepts have ever been more commonly shared," he wrote, "than that which designates this sacrament as 'the consummation of the entire Christian life' and 'immediate preparation for glory' . . . The current century, however, has witnessed the appearance of two new theories on the finality of Extreme Unction, which either radically expand or altogether discard the Scholastic notion of anointing as preparation for eternity."

Hist study, Father Ward says, was undertaken to examine each of these theories, and he

"The 'Total Remission of Temporal Punishment' theoory, advanced by Father Joseph Kern, S.J., in 1907, assumes that Extreme Unction is the divinely appointed antidote to purgatory. From this it follows that normally - per se - the total debt of temporal punishment must be cancelled through anointing. And the Council of Trent is held to have confirmed this very view, by declaring that Extreme Unction removes the remains of sin; for these are said to include temporal punishment. But it can be shown that neither Trent nor Tradition goes this far. Whenever Extreme Unction remits temporal punishment totally, it therefore does so only per accidens.

"Inexorably opposed to the concept which links anointing to death and eternity are the 'Sacrament of the Sick' theorists, who see Extreme Unction as having to do rather with the state of sickness considered precisely as sickness. Serious illness is undoubtedly required for valid anointing, but no concomitant danger of death. Viaticum is the Sacrament of the Dying; Extreme Unction is the Sacrament of the Sick. And Trent is alleged to have upheld this more ancient, and surer, tradition, by refusing to define that Extreme Unction is exclu-

"It can be conceded that the arly Church very probably lacked explicit awareness of Extreme Unction's preparationfor-glory role. On the other hand, the solemn rite of Anointing was almost certainly reserved for the gravely ill, even anciently.

"The danger-of-death requirement would therefore have been compled with in actual practice. In time, the doctrine unedrlying the practice would have grown inexplicit. creasingly more

Eventually, the Council of Trent would be able to teach that Extreme Unction is the sacrament which fortifies the end of life.

"In this broad and basic sense, it is thus the Sacrament of the Dying; it is thus also properly called Extreme Unction. For this reason, too, a true danger of death - which need be neither imminent nor even proximate - is postulated for valid, as well as licit, anoint-

"But if Extreme Unction is essentially the Sacrament of the Dying, it is likewise though subordinately — the Sacrament of the Sick. Which is to say that its effect upon the organism as such is by no means limited to instances of total bodily cure."

Father Ward's major professor at Catholic University was Father Emmanuel Doronzo, O.M.I., internationally-recognized authority on the Sac-

Father Ward was born in Mobile, Ala., where his mother, Mrs. Helen C. Ward, still resides, along with a brother and two sisters. He attended St. Paul school, Jacksonville, and later St. Bernard Minor Seminary, Culman, Ala.


He was a student at Catholic University of America seven years, receiving a master's degree in philosophy.

In 1949 he went to Rome for post-graduate work at the Gregorian University, and was awarded there a degree of Doctor of Philosophy.

A WORD TO THE RICH:

"He Who was rich became poor for our sakes that we might become rich." St. Paul applies these words to Our Lord, Who emptied Himself of the glory of His Divinity to make us spiritually impoverished souls rich in His grace. And that same Lord made you rich in a materi. sense. Oh yes, you worked hard, or you guarded your inheritances, or vou invested well, but the Lord is still the first cause of your wealth. "What have you that you have not received?"

It is much easier for you to save your soul than a famished "fellah" in Egypt or a miserable cliff-dweller in a Latin America "favella." You can give in Christ's Name. But the poor have to sink down into the depths of their souls and make an act of resignation and submission to God's Will. You say you are generous? You boast that you gave \$100,000 to build a \$3,000,000 church or \$250,000 to construct a library? Fine! But are you really satisfied with what you have done, or were you "pressurized" by agents, public relations officials or drive "hatchetmen??" Did you give supernaturally or did you give naturally? Did it profit you for eternity or did it give you a bronze plaque in time?

Measure your gifts with the rules that Our Lord lay down for giving:

- 1) Our Lord said we should give to the poor. When you are ready to make a distribution, "call in not the rich, but the poor." He meant that you should treat the disinherited of the world as though their need was not a stigma but a claim. The needy catechists in Korea, the impoverished priests of Rhodesia - these are the men to benefit in the light of the life to come!
- 2) Our Lord said we should give anonymously: "Do not let thy left hand know what thy right hand is doing." Ever notice how much more you give when you "subscribe" than when there is a collection? The ego wants satisfaction in the first instance. Beggars always carry tin cups because the giver gets a ring of satisfaction as he hears his coin jingle in the cup. But the Lord wants complete anonymity; He would have your gift take wings so you could never see where it went.
- 3) Our Lord said we should give to the poor because "they have nothing to repay thee with; for thou shalt be repaid at the resurrection of the poor." The rich could repay you, honor you, put you on a board, but the poor can do nothing. Therefore, the Lord will have to reward you. The saddest words in Sacred Scripture are: "Thou hast already received thy reward."

"If you are to exercise influence that you should, it is very important that you be regarded in the community as a person who has been entrusted with a very important work and responsibility. If that is your due you must measure up to that in the eyes of those around you. There is a necessity of your being a 'shining light' in the community," 'hop Carroll said.

Pointing out that in Pacem In Terris, Pope John stresses the four major needs of contemporary society as truth, justice, charity and freedom, Father Canfield said, "Truth is not a mere matter of isolate I facts. Truth, on one level, is the correspondence of man's words with his mind. On another, it is the harmony of his mind with the objective order of things as they exist in reality.

"But to achieve that harmony of mind and reality, the teacher must lead the student

It is your vocation as professional teachers, as loyal Americans, and as witnesses to the Gospel to reenforce and if necessary introduce into the lives of your students these great forces."

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
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
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## Prepare To Be Leaders, Cuban Youth Told

Unaccompanied Cuban youths whose parents are still in communist-controlled Cuba were urged by Bishop Coleman F.

Carroll Sunday to deepen and strengthen their faith and to acquire the truth and learning which will prepare them to one day assume positions of leadership among their people.

Bishop Carroll spoke to hundreds of Cuban teenagers at

A dialogue Mass was offered at 4 p.m. by Msgr. John J. Fitzpatrick, assistant chancellor and director of the Diocese of Miami Spanish-speaking Apostolate, at an outdoor altar erected for the occasion at one end of the new school building. Msgr. Bryan O. Walsh, director of the Catholic Welfare Bureau lead the boys in responses and the sermon was preached by Father Eugenio Del Busto.

Pointing out to the young men that both their parents in Cuba and the faithful in the Diocese of Miami had made sacrifices to save them from life in a communist regime and to provide the young refugees with the necessary facilities in this country, Bishop Carroll reminded the boys that many of their former associates had been sent by the Castro regime to Russia

while others are forced to attend government, atheistic schools in Cuba.

"American priests," Bishop Carroll added, "have given of their time, their zeal, and their devotion to try to provide for you all these things which are necessary if you are to receive a continuation of a Catholic education. Real love and real charity prompted so many to be of assistance," Bishop Carroll said, declaring that when r member of the Mystical Bc is suffering, that suffering is felt by all.

"Your sentiments should be primarily those of gratitude to Almighty God who in His goodness spared you the lot that some of your friends in Cuba were not spared," the Bishop continued. "Some are in Russia today; some are forced to attend godless schools.

"While you have much to thank God for, much is expected of each and every one of you," Bishop Carroll said. "You have been able to get out from under the heel of the tyrant. You now have the opportunity to deepen and strengthen your faith; to acquire these truths and that learning which in time, we hope, will make you ready for positions of leadership among your people. You have an unusual and challenging opportunity. By your example when and if you return to Cuba, you can show what it is to be a conscientious and intelligent member of Christ's Church. Thank God and show your gratitude by being a real apostle in the future.

During his sermon, Father Del Busto told the congregation, which included Christian and Marist Brothers and Sisters of St. Philip Neri who supervise the activites of the Cuban children, that the dedication of a school for youths who have had to be separated from their parents and their country because of persecution is something that "is very touching because of the cruel contrast between the evil of some men and the kindness of others."

"No one as you, my dear young people, have experienced this," the Cuban born priest said. "When you decided to leave your country, you only knew that the Catholic Church would not abandon you and that there was ? Bishop waiting in the ne land to take care of you and protect you. Because we know that several thousand Cuban youths have been through this camp, we are well able to evaluate the efforts of the Diocese of Miami and of the Catholic Welfare Bureau.

"We Cubans have found in Bishop Carroll the pastor, who besides satisfying our spiritual and material needs, has been the most firm and constant defender and the best friend of the Cuban cause," Father Del Busto declared, expressing the gratitude of the boys and their families not only to Bishop Carroll but also to Monsignor Fitzpatrick and Monsignor Walsh.

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






confirmed and also forward the other information necessary to receive the Sacrament.



## 'He Rates Me After His Family'

Should a boy think more of his parents than of the girl he has been dating for over a year? I'm a junior in college and Bill has three more years of graduate work so there's no thought of immediate marriage. We get along very well except on this matter of family loyalties. He feels he should spend a good deal of time with his family and insists they have a right to expect this. I argue that if he really likes me as much as he claims, he would want to spend more time with me. Isn't it possible to remain too attached to one's family? Am I wrong in thinking he's immature in this regard?

You've asked several very different questions, Millie, but nk you have only one major problem. You like Bill and namarally want to associate with him as frequently as possible. He claims he likes you, too, and has shown it by not dating other girls for over a year. On the other hand, he doesn't date you as often as you feel he should because he insist that he must spend a good deal of time at home with his parents and other members of his family.

Considering his age, isn't his sense of loyalty and attachment to his family somewhat exaggerated or unbalanced? This is possible, for it is not unknown that some individuals are adequately weaned from their parents very late in life, if ever. Nevertheless, Millie, I don't believe that this is Bill's problem. and I rather suspect that you know it isn't either, though both of you are using the pretext of family loyalties to avoid having to face the real issue.

What's the main source of your difficulties? You pointed it out almost in passing, though the fact that you mentioned it suggests that you are not wholly aware of its far-reaching significance. "Bill has three more years of graduate work, so there's no thought of immediate marriage." This simple statement of fact tells us about all we have to know concerning your problem. Assuming that you are a normal couple and that you have already discovered that you like each other very much, the phrase, "no thought of immediate marriage," presents a dilemma that you are trying not to face squarely.

#### Analyze Attitudes Objectively

Why continue to deceive yourselves? If you follow your nattural inclinations and begin to see more of each other, there will be "thought of immediate marriage," for a normal young couple of your age cannot enjoy frequent and intimate association for long without experiencing that insistent emotional involvement (love) which craves permanent union in marriage. If you wish to maintain a workable friendship, that is, a relationship that will not place you under excessive tension and stress, you must regulate your dating and other contacts accordingly.

It is relatively easy to accept these statements in theory, or as they apply to other couples, and yet to ignore their personal implications in practice. That's why I have warned you about self-deception. Don't argue that since you both accept the fact that there can be no thought of marriage for the next three years, there is no danger that you will become deeply involved through more frequent dating. You can't have it both ways, and I think that you know it.

If you analyze your attitudes a little more objectively, Millie, you will probably find that you don't accept this "no thought of immediate marriage" as a guiding principle in your relationsiips. Although you may not wish to admit it even to yourself perhaps, for such an admission would imply rejection of the plans you and Bill have agreed upon, you are really quite willing to take a chance on an earlier marriage.

#### Must Make A Choice

Considered in this light, Bill's approach appears much more logical. I feel that knowingly or unknowingly he is using his sense of family loyalty as a convenient means of avoiding deeper involvement. He is not in a position to think realistically of immediate marriage, yet he likes you and probably senses that he cannot run the risk of seeing you too often if he wishes to complete his graduate studies before marriage. Under the circumstances he finds it difficult to provide a good excuse for not spending time with you and prudently concludes that his obligations ans parents offer as good an escape as any other.

What should you do? You have two possibilities. You may decide that a delay of three years is too difficult or too much of a gamble. This would mean that you break up the relationship and start dating others. This is a reasonable solution and should involve no bitterness - you simply face the fact that as a couple you cannot think realistically about marriage for a long time to come, so that promoting further mutual involvement at present is meaningless.

You may decide to continue dating. This means that you honestly accept all the implications of a three-year delay. Stop insisting on more frequent association, for Bill will either tire of arguing with you and break off the affair himself, or he will give in, and then you will have to come to terms with premature emotional involvement. Don't deceive vourself, immediate marriage will not be a solution. Bill will not later forgive you for interfering with his adequate preparation for life. More important, he is not ready for marriage until he has completed his studies, as all too many couples who married prematurely are discovering too late.

#### The Question Box

### When Is Marriage Considered Valid?



BY MSGR. J. D. CONWAY

Q. Recently I read an article, "Revision of Marriage Laws." It stated that when Catholics enter marriage with non-Catholics before a minister, a justice of the peace, or other qualified civil official, their marriage is null and void before the Church. Are these marriages also considered null and void for the non-Catholics?

A. You cannot have a marriage which is valid for the husband but not for the wife, or vice versa. If a marriage is null for a Catholic husband it is also null for his non-Catholic wife. The Church law affects the Catholic party directly, and concerns the non-Catholic only indirectly because it limits his Catholic partner's ability to enter a valid marriage contract. The Catholic can marry validly only before a priest.

If neither party to the marriage has ever been Catholic the Church is not concerned with their manner of contracting marriage.

O. Can a woman who has repented sincerely of her sinful life with a married man, who has been to confession and received absolution, still have an affection for the man - never seeing him - without offending God? Can this woman pray for this man, though he is a Protestant?

A. I imagine that she cannot stifle her affection without choking herself. She should be sensibly prudent about it, not moon over it as a martyr, not gloat over it until she sins again through memory and desire, not enshrine it amid dreams, nor dally with it until it shakes her new resolution. Let it wear off as gently as possible.

Certainly she can pray for him, but she must be careful that her prayers do not become pious enticements to thinking about him - affectionately.

Q. Please answer soon, before the road maps are torn to shreds. At long last our children are all out of the bottle and diaper stage; and we thought it would be wonderful, relaxing family fun to take a few weekend camping trips. Some of the chosen spots will be near enough that we can take a trip into the village for Sunday Mass. However, some of the camp sites will be too far from town. Would it be a sin for us to miss Mass on these rare occasions? Are all Catholics banned from hunting, fishing and outdoor life if they cannot get to Church?

Q. Recently I heard that a Negro lady in a city of our diocese called a Catholic fraternal organization and arranged to rent their hall for

her daughter's wedding reception. The night before he wedding the owners of the building (both Catholics) found out that the woman was a Negro. They threatened to cancel the lease of the fraternal organization on the building if the reception were held there. So they called the lady and told her that she could not have the hall. As a result the wedding reception was hurriedly changed to the basement of a Protestant church, little suited to the purpose. This happened during Brotherhood Week. What is the morality of such

A. It is positively immoral; objectively a mortal sin against justice and charity, and a much greater sin of scandal and harm of religion.

The end does not justify the means. Certainly this Catholic organization wanted to keep its lease on its hall; but its members may not commit mortal sin to achieve this purpose. Better that the lease were lost and that the organization be disbanded forever than that it should lend itself to actions so sinful and scandalous.

## Many Film Characters 'Unreal, Misfits

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. -"Show me a well-adjusted happily married couple and I will show you two dull people!"

Last week a psychologist here in the West,

made news headlines with this gimmick line. Let's not bother with his name. Consider

his influence on the gimmickminded, Hollywood set.

Many "creative film writers" collect and file this type of trash as if it were genuine, 18-carat, dramatic philosophy.

One of the deadliest delusions among film people, here and abroad, is that good people are dull; that characters off-kilter or utterly evil, have theatrical color; that honest, plain-living people are of no dramatic consequence or interest unless

(instance "To Kill a Mockingbird") they are caught in social conflicts greater than themselves, when they become symbols.

#### TALENT

We see what fake for fake's sake is bringing us in the movies. For instance. Ace producer, John Houseman just made a glossy, social drama called "In the Cool of the Day." From Susan Ertz' novel, Meade Roberts wrote a script which, during the era of the Hollywood pot-boiler, might have landed any writer in the studio cooler. This movie cost millions.

The top cast is creamy with rich talent. Robert Stevens, the director, used to make his characters live, film after film. This time he had Panavision and some of the ancient wonders of Greece thrown in; the Parthenon and the Acropolis, the Temple of Zeus (515 B.C.) and the 10th-century Monastery of Kaisariani.

The film doesn't come off because the characters never become real. A less convincing screenplay would be hard to imagine. Angela Lansbury plays an incredibly cattish wife. Her husband (Peter Finch) goes galivanting with the immature, baby-doll bride (Jane Fonda), whom his best friend (Arthur Hill) coddles to distraction. The finish is out of "Camille,"

#### TRUTH IS MISSING

These characters are not dull. They are boring. They are not happy. They are miserable. They are not colorful. They are contrived. They are not real people at all. They are flat cardboard cut-outs of human misfits.

If either of the males had been a real man he might have made a woman of his wife. If either of the wives had been, in the best sense, a woman, she might have made a man of her husband.

But then, according to the "expert," there would have been two, well-adjusted, happily married couples: four dull people. So instead, we have a dull picture.

"We would be more inclined to accept Pat Boone's explanation to you (about how he came to make "The Main Attraction") if he had not already given TV interviews and promised to ballyhoo the picture in various grass roots cities." Thus an influential public leader in Cleveland, Ohio, reacts to my recent interview with Pat Boone. Many others say the

If all else fails, Pat Boone still holds the ace card. He could go on tour and tell his audiences what he told me. "I am unhappy about the film; would not have made it had I known how it would turn out. I advise young people not to see it until they've received their parents' permission."

He told me the film is not good enough for his own children. In this case it is not good enough for other people's chil-

And if he were to tell this to the public, the ballyhoo tour would end right there.





## ¿Obliga la Fe en las Doctrinas de Cristo?

-CAPITULO V-

De las palabras de Cristo "Id, e instruid a todas las naciones, bautizándolas en el nombre del Padre y del Hijo y del Espíritu Santo: enseñándolas a observar todas las cosas que yo os he mandado" ..., "el que ereyere y se bautizare se salvará; pero el que no creyere será condenado" . . . resulta evidente una doble obligación.

Primera, los Apóstoles son enviados a predicar el evangelio a todas las naciones sin excepción. Cristo vino a salvar todas las almas. Por tanto, era su voluntad que su religión fuese universal, para el género humano entero. Si una raza o un individuo siquiera rehusase aceptar su religión, el objeto y fin de la revelación divina quedaría hasta ese punto frustrada.

Segunda, Cristo impuso a sus Apóstoles la obligación de enseñar la misma e idéntica doctrina que El les había enseñado: "Ensenándoles a observar todas las cosas que yo os he mandado." Es decir, los Apóstoles no podían enseñar diferentes doctrinas para agradar a los variados caprichos y fantasías de cada individuo. Por lo contrario, tenían el encargo de enseñar todas las cosas que Cristo les había mandado. Ni estaban en libertad de enseñar esta doctrina y rechazar la otra. El evangelio cristiano forma un todo orgánico, debiendo ser trasmitido al mundo entero, sin omisión o adición, sin cambio ni mutilación.

Basta reflexionar un poco, para que se vea con evidencia que Cristo no podía lógicamente conferir a sus Apóstoles el poder autoridad de predicar el evangelio a las multitudes, sin imponer a estas el correlativo deber de aceptario. Pues, cada derecho entraña el deber correspondiente de parte de otro de respetar ese derecho. Por tanto, la solemne delegación de ese poder y autoridad a los Apóstoles de enseñar, nada significaria y seria contradictoria si Cristo no hubiese impuesto la correspondiente obligación a los oyentes de aceptar ese mensaje.

De aquí resulta claro que Cristo no dió al pueb**lo** más libertad de rechazar sus ense nanzas que la que dio a sus Apóstoles de hacerles cambios. Había venido al mundo a revelarnos estas verdades sobrenaturales y mandó a sus oventes aceptar la revelación. lo mismo que a los Apóstoles predicarla. Y. no solo insiste Cristo en que el pueblo acepte las verdades divinamente reveladas, sino que lo impone como condición indispensable para la salvación eterna.

Más Cristo no se contentó con comisionar a los Apóstoles para predicar sus enseñanzas. A fin de impedir que los Apóstoles pudieran considerarse incapaces de enseñar con exactitud sus doctrinas y disipar do temor de parte del pueblo de que los toles — al fin hombres falibles — le indujesen involuntariamente a error, el divino Maestro les prometió su constante presencia y asistencia divina, diciéndoles:

'Más el Consolador, El Espíritu Santo, que mi Padre enviará en mi nombre, os le enseñará todo y os recordará cuantas cosas os tengo dichas."

Por tanto, aun cuando los Apóstoles eran de sí mismos falibles, Cristo les aseguró que en su misión de enseñar sus doctrinas, El estaría con ellos todos los días, preservándolos de todo error y refrendando sus enseñanzas con el sello de su aprobación divina. Pues de la misma manera que el Padre le había enviado a El, así El los autorizaba, diciéndoles: "Como el Padre me ha enviado, así os envio Yo."







## Creciente Impulso Católico en Perú

Perú va en camino de convertirse en la nación más católica de América Latina, opina el Padre Alberto Nevins. Misionero de Maryknoll.

"Si Perú logra mantener durante los próximos dos años el mismo ritmo que ha desarrollado en los dos anteriores, no dudo en decir que pronto sobrepasará a todos los demás en Latinoamérica en la práctica de una fe católica viviente", agregó.

El ex-presidente de la Asociación de Prensa Católica de Estados Unidos y Canadá acaba de terminar una visita de dos semanas al Perú para recoger informaciones para un trabajo que espera publicar sobre la condición de la Iglesia en este país.

Cuando se le pidió que comparara la atmósfera religiosa en el Perú con la de Colombia — país considerado por algunos como el más católico de Latinoamérica el Padre Nevins contestó que Perú se adelantaba rápida-

"En Colombia la fe es estática, tradicional y dominada por el clero; no muestra evidencia de la visión universal, del vigor ni de la participación de los seglares, como se ve por todas partes en Pe-∠rú", agregó.

He visitado al Perú varias veces por muchos años, y hasta ahora salía pesimista; pero esta vez "dejo al Perú con optimismo, pues he visto un cambio tremendo en la vida económica y en la vida religiosa".

El sacerdote norteamericano hace notar que parroquias antes vacantes tienen ahora clero extranjero, y que se multiplican las escuelas católicas que formarán a los líderes de mañana. En sólo las escuelas dirigidas por misionorteamericanos hay

10.000 alumnos. Se ha formado también un cuerpo nacio-


nal de Voluntarios del Papa, que cuenta ya con 75 perua-

Además, agrega el Padre Nevins, más de 50 seminaristas y sacerdotes jóvenes del Perú estudian en Roma; 37 religiosas peruanas estudian cursos graduados en colegios y universidades católicas de Estados Unidos: 27 muchachas peruanas siguen cursos de enfermería en Estados Unidos y el Canadá, y varias docenas de jóvenes de uno y otro sexo irán a estudiar a Estados Unidos en Setiem-

"Este programa intensivo de educación superior en el extranjero entrena los líderes que formarán el futuro de la Iglesia en el Perú del mañana", comentó.

En la entrevstia el P. Nevins se refirió también a los nuevos seminarios en Lima y Pucallpa, al movimiento de cooperativas de crédito v construcción de viviendas, al impacto de la Iglesia en la opinión pública por medio del nuevo Centro de Información Católica de Lima, a los programas de catecismo popular y a los Cursillos de Cristian-

"Perú ha sido bendecido doblemente, con un cardenal (Juan Landázuri Ricketts, arzobispo de Lima) que se muestra compasivo ante las necesidades de su pueblo y es amado por los pobres; y con un nuncio apostólico (Mons. Rómolo Carboni) que está al día con los nuevos tiempos, que ve los problemas, encuentra soluciones y se esfuerza constantemente por aplicarlas".

#### Gratitud Papal a EU. Por Ayuda a A.L.

WASHINGTON, (NC) -El número de sacerdotes, relígiosos y religiosas que han ido de Estados Unidos a prestar servicios en América Latina aumentó en 700 en año y medio, de 2.530 en agosto de 1961, a 3.205 en enero de 1963, trantando así de atender la petición de la Santa Sede de que los católicos de E.U. ayudan con más personal a la Iglesia en América Latina.

"Si bien la contribución es modesta, se preparan mayores contingentes", anunció Mons. Joseph T. McGucken, arzobispo de San Francisco, en una carta a S.S. el Papa Juan XXIII. El prelado es director del subcomité de personal religioso de la Comisión Episcopal pro América

En ella hace constar que "existe una admirable disposición entre los obispos de Estados Unidos y los superiores de congregaciones...a sacrificar sus propias necesidades para servir las mayores de la Iglesia vecina".

En una respuesta inmediata, el Papa Juan declara que "el enterarnos que este esfuerzo significa sacrificios, nos conmueve profundamen-

"Nos damos perfecti enta que el personal enviace a esos países no se recluta entre los que sobran, sino que se restringen graves necesidades domésticas, para poder prestar una avuda tan laudable a la Iglesia en Latinoamérica. . . tan importante miembro del Cuerpo Místico de Cristo, hoy en peligro".

Tiene el Soberano Pontifice luego una expresión de aliento para "el proyecto excelente" de enviar también seglares - hombres y mujeres -, a trabajar en varias diócesis latinoamericanas como Voluntarios Papales.

Entre los misioneros figuran 117 sacerdotes diocesanos. 1.478 religiosos, 200 hermanos legos, y 1.410 religiosas.

## Aclara el CELAM Impresiones Erradas Sobre el Caso Cubano

El Boletín Informativo del Consejo Espiscopal Latinoamericano refuta apréciaciones del Pbro. Alberto Nevins, Misionero de Maryknoll, sobre el catolicismo en-

"Los refugiados cubanos que inundaron los Estados Unidos — escribió el P. Nevins — eran los bien alimentados, la clase media y los ricos. Eran también los buenos católicos'. Su ceguedad hacia la injusticia social era su equivocación. En esta cegueda creyeron que todos los cubanos permanecerían fieles a la Iglesia y se levantarian contra Castro en la primera oportunidad".

"El apoderamiento de Cuba es una muestra de lo que padiera suceder mañana en muchos otros países latinoamericanos" dice el misionero. "Cuba era el cuarto país en rango económico de América Latina. Su pueblo se encontraba relativamente bien, comparado con el de otras partes. Sin embargo, cuando Castro prometió a los cubanos una oportunidad de llenar su estómago y realizar sus aspiraciones, las masas del pueblo compraron pronto la oportunidad".

El Boletín Informativo, editado por el RP Gustavo Amigó SJ, sacerdote cubano, explica luego como "nota del traductor":

"La más grave (de varias inexactitudes) es el desconocimiento de la actitud de la Iglesia. Se la acusa de no dar mentalidad social a las clases pudientes. Desde 1940 por lo menos, en Cuba se dieron lecciones de catolicismo social, y no fue culpa de la Iglesia que no penetraran prácticamente en grandes núcleos....

"La interpretación de la revolución cubana es / siado simplista. Esa revolución fue esencialmente us vimiento de la clase media para librarse de Batista, sin mayores implicaciones en la mayoría que las muy vagas promesas por Castro, quien posteriormente desvió su cauce hacía el marxismo. Por otra parte, entre los refugiados cubanos no hay sólo ricos, sino de todas clases".

En el artículo que el Boletín reproduce, el Padre Nevins habla del peligro de que "la tragedia cubana puede repetirse en otras naciones a pesar de siglos de tradición católica", y aboga por un programa intenso de justicia social que incluya reforma agraria integral, urbanización decente de los miserables suburbios, y alfabetiza-

"La verdad del asunto — concluye —, por difícil que sea de encarar, es que las masas no se identifican a sí mismas con la Iglesia. No asocian a la Iglesia con sus vidas inmediatas y sus problemas diarios. En su ignorancia, desconocen las doctrinas sociales de la Iglesia (no saben) que hay respuestas católicas a los dilemas sociales y económicos en que se hallan"..

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

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


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
