The Pope made his plea for peace at a regular general audience. He said he would discuss "some serious thoughts" because of the 50th anniversary of the first World War and 25th anniversary of the second World War. He said he was also motivated to these thoughts by "acute disagreement, already stained with blood and pregnant with menacing omens, existing today between various coun-

In a voice choked with emotion, the Pope pleaded: "Men of good will, listen to our humble voice, that of a brother and a father, evoking undying memories of two fearful wars, not to project upon the world's present state empty and frightening phantoms.'

He urged all to responsible reflections and "to place above every other interest, every other value, that of human dignity and brotherly peace and a foretaste of joy and prosperity which can never again be born of war, but only of peace in sincerity and goodness.'

89 NEW CLASSROOMS BUILT FOR RECORD ENROLLMENT

40,000 In Schools Of Diocese

dents will attend Catholic schools in the Diocese of Miami during the 1964-65 school year which begins next week.

This will be an increase in enrollment of approximately 45 per cent over the 27,058 Catholic pupils in Catholic schools during the 1958-59 term when the Diocese first was created.

School bells will ring out

Forty thousand Catholic stu- next Monday, August 31, in 66 schools of the Diocese. Those figures compare with 43 grade schools, an increase of 23, and 11 high schools, an increase of 11, since 1958.

> A total of 89 new classrooms will accommodate the enlarged enrollment this year. These include 61 built since last June and 28 to be completed soon.

Pupils will begin their studies elementary schools and 22 high Monday in three elementary schools constructed this year. They are St. Thomas the Apostle, in South Dade, with eight classrooms; St. Ambrose, in Deerfield Beach, with eight classrooms, and St. Clare, in North Palm Beach, with six classrooms.

> Elementary schools where additional facilities have been

provided include St. Charles Borromeo, Port Charlotte, three classrooms; St. Joan of Arc, Boca Raton, four classrooms; St. Luke, Lake Worth, four classrooms, and St. Mark, Boynton Beach, two classrooms.

High school construction has included a new Science and Library building and eight more classrooms at Msgr. Pace High School, Opa-locka; a new Science and Library building and eight more classrooms at Cardinal Gibbons H i g h School, Fort Lauderdale, and seven new classrooms at La Salle High School, Miami.

In addition, a new Central Catholic High School is now under construction at Fort Pierce, with 13 classrooms and two laboratories. This will be completed in time for the pupils to transfer from the old building they are now attending to the new building during the first

Plans also have been completed and bids are now being received for the new Lourdes Academy building, in South Miami, which will contain 11 classrooms, and for a new St. Bartholomew school in Miramar.

In addition, plans also are being drafted now for a new wing to be built during the present school school year at Cardinal Newman High School, in West Palm Beach, making that school co-institutional. Consideration also is being given to proposals that a new wing be built at Mary Immaculate High School, in Key West, to make it co-institutional as well.

Of Christ's Weeping Excavations Made At

JERUSALEM (NC) - Visiors to the Holy Land have alvays viewed with awe and cuiosity the city of our Lord. The historic pilgrimage there of Pope Paul VI in January, 1964, nas provided added stimulus to he public search for informaion about the holy shrines.

Of particular interest, because of recent excavations, is a site Lord Wept). It is a narrow strip of land on the steep western slope of the Mount of Olives and overlooks the entire city. It forms part of the northern limits of the largest cemetery of Jerusalem, the largest and probably the oldest since it has been used continuously down to our times.

This necropolis is virtually a city of the dead. It contains thousands of graves from all

called Dominus Flevit (The periods of time since the 4th millennium before Christ.

> The northern half of the Dominus Flevit property was acquired by the Franciscans of the Custody of the Holy Land in 1889. In 1891 they had constructed there a chapel with the same name of Dominus Flevit. In 1955, the present chapel was built to commemorate the fact that Jesus, during His triumphal entry into Jersulem, wept over the city.

No one knows the exact spot where Christ wept, for the tradition is not very clear. That He did weep over the city is known from the Gospel (Luke 19. 41-44).

Pottery found in the tombs aided the archaeologists in dating the Jebusite burial place as in the Middle and Late Bronze Age. More than 2,000 objects were found shedding light on the daily life of the people of

The relics in the Roman necropolis were found in the ovenshaped tombs and chamber-type tombs cut into the rock. It is because those people sculptured their tombs into stone and buried their dead in stone coffins that we have something left of their civilization. These tombs represent the last century of the pre-Christian period and the first century of the Christian period. During this time Jeru-

salem was under Roman control and Christ spent much time here.

The Dominus Flevit not only has meaning for the archeologist but also for the pilgrim of today. For here he can see the modern Jerusalem and the general lines of Herod's Jerusalem. He is not really far from Christ in time. The tombs are still there and visible to the eye as they were in His day.

POPE SAYS IT'S MYSTERIOUS

Church Old But Very Alive

CASTELGANDOLFO (NC) -A papal audience is a trip hrough time that reveals the Church in its antiquity and its vitality in the present day, Pope Paul VI told several thousand persons at his weekly general audience at his summer residence here.

One characteristic of a papal

audience, the Pontiff told his Church are enmeshed in visitors, including 250 students from 40 countries including Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland and Yugoslavia, is that such occasions turn one's thoughts to the past, to history and tradition. In fact, he said, it may lead people today to conclude that the Pope and the

things which are "perhaps very curious and very pretty, but strange and superfluous to modern life."

The Pope said that "naturally we cannot agree with this opinion, which we seem to see written in the faces of many of our visitors." However, he said, certain particular forms which mark the exterior aspect of the Church can be debated.


"But we are very glad that in coming into our home and breathing our atmosphere, our visitors are led to give a glance at the past, albeit a rapid and summary one, because this glance at the past, we think, is one of the benefits of the papal audience. It is a bright flash over the past centuries which arouses a spiritual vibration in him who witnesses it, which we might call a 'historical sense,' Pope Paul declared.

The Pope said this spiritual vibration brings the mind back to "the slow, difficult, dramatic march of humanity." Something of this feeling can be captured in visiting museums, monuments and libraries where treasures of the past are housed, he said.

But, he said, although a papal audience shows the continuation into the present time of things which date back to centuries long past, it also shows the aliveness of the Church.

"This is not a museum, it is not a cemetery, it is not a valuable and exotic collection of antique objects which is offered to the observant visitor. It is a thing alive and the fact that it is alive and very ancient is a mystery.

"The fact that it is so very antique and yet always the same in itself, always coherent, always faithful to the standards of its origins, is, we repeat, marvelous. We go further to say, it is mysterious," the Pope said.

VATICAN CITY (NC) -Standing as an umbrella over the deliberations of the Second Vatican Council is the virtually all-inclusive draft proposal, on schema, on the nature of the

It has been characterized innumerable times as the central subject of the council, the most important discussion the bishops of the world will undertake, and the keystone on which will depend the ultimate success or disappointment of council sessions for future generations of the Church.

It is necessary to define the Church properly before one can proceed to describe and intensify its activities properly. But the fact remains that throughout the history of the Church, there has never been a clear, definite pronouncement on the nature of the church which has had the effect of closing the subject to the satisfaction of everyone.

Progress has been made throughout the centuries. Ideas have been developed and expanded which have formed a working basis on which to pursue other aspects of Church theology. There has been a working definition developed at this or that time in history.

But always it seems such definitions have been formulated - in reference to some particular heresy or false notion which has stimulated theologians to intensify their research and arrive at a defensive, or apologetic, definition.

DEFINITION FORMULATED

Such was the case during the Reformation, when the authority of the Church and its institutions were called into doubt by the reformers and its juridical

By Father JOHN P. DONNELLY structure was attacked from all sides. In this context, Robert Cardinal Bellarmine, a giant of the Counter-reformation and the Council of Trent, formulated the following definition:

> "There is only one Church, not two, and this one true Church is the community of men gathered together by the profession of the true faith, communion in the same sacraments and under the government of legitimate pastors and principally the one vicar of Christ on earth, the Roman

In this definition, the cardinal was stressing three specific aspects of the Church:

- 1. Possession of one true faith.
- 2. Participation in a common sacramental system.
- 3. Allegiance to one central authority.

In other words, membership in the Church called for a recognition of the three aspects of the priestly function: to teach, to sanctify and to rule. So externalized was this concept of membership in the Church that Cardinal Bellarmine could go a step further and admit that "in order that someone be declared a member of this true Church, of which the Scriptures speak, we do not think that any interior virtue is required of

With this concept in the fore, it is easier to see how there developed in the Church an emphasis on external membership, on the requirement of baptism in its external rite as a necessity for salvation, and on the juridical power and responsibility of the Church to make laws and devise norms for the external conduct of the Chris-

In some areas this concept became confused with the actual pursuit of the spiritual life.

Such externalism has never been admitted in principle by the Church. Always the insistence has been on the spiritual development of the soul in its relationship with God. But in some quarters the emphasis has been such that many have been confused into hoping that by external acts alone they are justified in the eyes of God.

CHRIST'S TEACHING

Christ's teaching in the New Testament gives the lie to this philosophy. His striking parable of the pharisee (the external practitioner of all the laws and rites of the Church- and the publican (the inner commitment of the soul to God in humility and dependence) shows what He thought of the former.

Indeed the whole pattern of scriptural theology points to the one essential aspect of membership in the Church - love, charity and the communion of the soul with the source of all love, which is Christ. In this framework, St. Paul speaks of the "Mystical Body of Christ" - a body not merely because of some external organizational linking, but a body in the supernatural sense of unity of function, unity of goal, unity of thinking with Christ and unity of love of God after the pattern of Christ and in communion with Him.

These ideas have been discussed by theologians throughout the course of history. Actual definition by the Church, however, has been slow in coming and to date has been minimal, considering the basic nature of the subject. Thus the concern of the present council.

The First Vatican Council in 1869-1870 was called to discuss such definitions. But a civil war in Italy forced its recess before the council Fathers has finished the first topic, the infallibility of the pope. Therefore, the Second Vatican Council must take up where the first left off, using as a starting point the definition of papal infallibility pronounced by the first and attempting to pursue the implications of that doctrine into other branches of the Church - bishops, priests, deacons, religious and laity.

The draft on the nature of the Church was first introduced in the present council very late in its first session during the fall of 1962. At that time, according to official council press bulletins, speakers "generally praised the substance and structure of the project," but the oraft also received much criticism. It was sent back to the commission to be revised, but with the hope that it "be considered the central work of the council.'

At the beginning of the second session on Sept. 30, 1963, the revised draft was introduced to the council Fathers. It consisted of 11 chapters divided into 45 points in a 90-page man-

Anti-Poverty Plan To Boost Progress

WASHINGTON (NC) — President Johnson has signed into law the \$947.5 million antipoverty program which will enlist public and private agencies in a fight to raise living conditions for millions of Americans.

The President said the bill will stimulate a "new era of progress" for those who have not shared in America's pros-

he American answer to poverty is not to make the poor more secure in their poverty, but to help them reach down and help themselves out of the ruts of poverty," the President said before using more than 50 pens to sign the bill in a ceremony in the White House rose garden.

Among those present was Msgr. Francis T. Hurley, assistant general secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, and Msgr. George Higgins, director of the NCWC Social Action Department.

The program had been backed in an April 17 joint statement to a House subcommittee by the NCWC's Social Action and Education Departments, the National Conference of Catholic Charities, the Bishops' Committee for Migrant Workers, the National Catholic Rural Life Conference and the Bishops' Committee for the Spanish Speaking.

Under terms of the bill, private nonprofit agencies and institutions engaged in antipoverty work, including those with religious affiliation, are eligible to cooperate in several key sections.

Already, the NCWC's Youth Department, the National Council of Catholic Men and the National Council of Catholic Women, plus major Catholic universities, have agreed to a request of Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz that they join in the effort to locate about 2,000 counselor aides and vouth advisors in conjunction with the anti-poverty campaign.

During its journey through Congress, which approved the measure finally on Aug. 11, the bill faced several obstacles related to participation of churchrelated institutions.

The House Education and Labor Committee voted to eliminiate direct aid to schools, thus ending disagreement over the place of parochial and public schools in the program. The original bill provided aid for school projects only if they were conducted by public schools.

The Senate adopted a provision to give governors' veto power over participation of private agencies in their states. However, the final version changed this, providing governors with a veto power over any Federally financed aspect of the program begun in their state. This was a concession to states' rights sentiment in the two

Finally, the bill prohibits use and work-training projects from working on the construction, operation or maintenance "of so

Sponsors of this ban explained that in the case of youths whose work experience meant joining construction crews on a church-related hospital, for example, the limitation would prevent them from working on the hospital chapel.

Programs for youth training make up a major part of the anti-poverty bill. They are a job corps for 40,000 young people who would live for up to two years in conservation camps and training centers; a work-training effort for 200,000 youths aimed at increasing their employability and helping them stay in school; and a work-study program to assist needy college students.

Techniques Of Space Age Coming To Diocesan Schools

Back to school news this September in certain areas will have a touch of space age fascination about it, since the most modern of the communications media, the television screen, will become standard equipment, along with blackboards and desks in some Catholic schools.

The granting of permits for educational television stations to the Dioceses of Rockville Centre and Brooklyn recently had local news value for Catholics in Southern Florida. While these—were the first dioceses ever granted authorization from the Federal Communications Commission to use closed circuit television over assigned channels, it was revealed that the Diocese of Miami along with New York and Baltimore had also filed application for the same unusual permit.

There has already been enough use of educational television in public schools and in more than a score of Catholic schools to some degree in this diocese to convince educators that a vast, challenging field is just beginning to be discovered. For the past four years experiments in connection with two local Dade County Education television programs have produced satisfactory results.

In Catholic schools where the shortage of Sisters and Brothers and lay teachers has been a severe handicap and poses an even more critical problem for the future, the use of television in the instruction of students is certain to broaden the scope of Catholic education and to make it more effective.

The granting of these permits from the FEC has been described as a coming of age for Catholic education in the use of the new communications media. Father John M. Culkins, S.J., television consultant to the NCEA stated that: "It now becomes possible to think in concrete terms of courses and series of programs on video tape and film using the best teaching talent in the country."

It is heartening to see the name of the Diocese of Miami among the first five dioceses in the nation ready to use this powerful means of teaching.

It is another sign that Catholic education in this Diocese, while struggling to meet the needs of a constantly growing population, is making every effort to bring the best and the most effective means of instruction to our children.

Noteworthy And Salutary

The annual Labor Day Observance sponsored by the Diocese of Miami has become a noteworthy event in the opinion of leaders in industry and government. For the fourth consecutive year, representatives of both management and labor will come together next Thursday and discuss problems affecting not only their own personal interest, but the welfare of society in general.

No one can measure the good effects accurately of these past meetings when leaders in labor and management frankly discussed their areas of agreement and disagreement in front of an interested audience and answered questions and objections put to them by citizens who wanted to exercise their right to know where their leaders stand on vital issues.

It is reasonable to believe that such discussions are certain to create a spirit of harmony among men whose titles may differ, but whose concern for the principles of free enterprise is deep and genuine.

and in industry. The frank, fair exchange of ideas can eliminate misunderstandings, bring out in the open unwarranted suspicions, clarify truth and expose falsehood.

When this happens, it is all to the good because men of good will on both sides can thus grow in trust of each other, and while battling as fervently as ever for their cause, can at the same time enlarge their areas of interest to embrace the welfare of all citizens.

We are especially encouraged by these Labor Day Observances as we move more and more swiftly into the age of automation, when many jobs will be eliminated, when new problems will need a calm, thorough exchange of ideas on the part of representatives of management and labor. We hope that many of our people will participate in these sessions and recognize them as a constructive force for good in modern day industry.

Chile In The Spotlight

The danger of another country in Latin America following Cuba's plunge into the Red sea of Marxism is so acute that more attention is being centered at the moment on Chile probably than ever before. On September 4, that country will face an election which has been described as possibly marking the first time in history that the citizens in a nation may by their vote open the door to communism.

The choice given the voters has been described as a clear choice between Christian Democracy and Marxism. Senator Salvador Allende, representing the Revolutionary Popular Action Front (FRAP), has never concealed the fact that he is a Socialist and a Marxist. He has the complete support of Chile's communist party, which sees reflected in him the brightest hope ever entertained in South America for a Red Government operating with the support of the people.

Allende to temper such intense enthusiasm and to create a better public image among the Chileans, has hastened to explain that his government would not be truly Marxist and would not put the communists into power. Observers feel otherwise and with very good reason.

The other candidate, Senator Eduardo Frei, is backed by the Christian Democratic Party. He has been an active Catholic all his life, has a daughter a Carmelite nun, and worked hard in his youth in Catholic Action movements. Known as a moving orator, he has the support of some Conservatives and Liberals, who don't want communism, but apparently are not keen on Frei and his ideas either.

The recent break of Chile with communist Cuba has had surprising reactions in the country. Neither candidate apparently favored the country going along with the decision of the OAS last July to cut off diplomatic and commercial relations with Castro's government. How this will affect the election next week

We are all deeply involved in this election. If another country in Latin America raises the Red flag, not only will the people of that nation suffer the usual loss of rights and freedom, but many other countries, now facing the same choice between Marxism and Christian Democracy, can be weakened in their determination to wrench free of the Red chains. This most certainly is reason for fervent prayer that the Chilean people may vote with their eyes open to the true situation and strike a blow for freedom for themselves and for others.

Last fall at the Council he drew the rapt attention of many Protestant observers with his words about Christ. In his opening address at the second session he devoted several paragraphs to his request to the bishops that they keep Christ constantly before their minds in their deliberations.

At first, one might think these repeated and extensive allusions to Christ are out of place in this encyclical.

My impression is that here, as in his opening address last fall, he was addressing his remarks not only to the Catholic bishops but to all Protestants as well. He wanted to bring home to Protestants the fact that the Catholic Church does hold that Christ is our Life and Guide, the ultimate Authority in the Catholic Church.

For there are many Protestants who feel that the Catholic Church has exalted the Pope to such a degree that we have dethroned Christ and put the Pope in his place.

Recently I read a Protestant author who was objecting to the phrase used by Catholics, "The Church is the continuation of the Incarnation." He claimed that the assumption of such a title leads to idolatry.

If the Catholic Church pietures itself as the continuation of the Incarnation, then it will consistently claim that it is the equivalent of the God who took flesh and dwelt amongst us in Palestine. The inevitable result of such a way of thinking, he said, would be the infallible Pope concept, the Catholic Church arrogating to itself the person and authority of Christ.


So it seems to me that Pope Paul in the encyclical is ing in effect: "We do adore ist as supreme."

Quoting from the encyclical of Pope Pius XII on the Mystical Body, he says: "We must accustom ourselves to see Christ in the Church. It is Christ who lives in the Church, who teaches, governs, and sanctifies through it." Then he makes clear that the whole hierarchy (including the Pope) is simply a means to bring Christ to the people. It is divine only in the sense that God established the hierarchy in His Church when He founded it.

But it is an instrument and therefore subordinate to the God who employs it for His purposes: "It is by means of this divine instrumentality that Christ communicates to His mystical members the marvels of His truth and of His Grace, and confers on His Mystical Body as it travels its pilgrim way through time, its visible structure, its sublime unity, its ability to function organically, its harmonious complexity, its spiritual beauty."

Elsewhere in the encyclical, the Pope says he is distressed that many separated brethren regard the Papacy as a stumbling-block to unity because of its claim to primacy of honor and jurisdiction. He observes that the Papacy is the very principle of unity in the Church and that it was inserted into the Church by Christ Himself. Nor is this claim to primacy a prideful and arrogant one. "It is a primacy of service, of ministration, of love."


God Uses Miracles To Stir Men's Faith

(Second Of A Series On Revelation) By MSGR. JAMES J. WALSH

If a man whispers to strangers that he has just discovered a gold mine and is willing to share it for a certain consider-

ation, usually he will receive in return a cold stare.

If a person tells others that God has enin a vision or lumination of



the mind, the few who will take his word for it will be greatly outnumbered by the scoffers.

Let anyone make a claim that borders on the extraordinary or the fantastic, and immediately people put him down as either insane or dishonest. If he is to convince the skeptical, he must produce something substantial in support of his words. And the greater the claim, obviously the more convincing the proof must be.

This is the middle way of human nature — to look for evidence in confirmation of an unusual claim. It avoids the two extremes of gullibility and skepticism - the one accepting without question everything proposed, the other maintaining doubts despite reasonable proof.

God has taken into account this attitude of ours and deals with us accordingly, especially in that important matter of the Revelation of truth. As we stated last week, there are many things we need to know which only God can teach us.

TRUTH OF THE MATTER

The profound truths concerning this life and the next are so far beyond the reach of the human intellect that we have to depend upon God to tell us about them.

CHOSE ANOTHER WAY

How would God do so? or since we are dealing with facts of history, how did He reveal what was in His mind? He could indeed have directly inspired each member of the race and taught individuals by personal communication how to know, love and serve Him. But He chose another way.

St. Paul explained it in these words: "God, Who at sundry times and in divers manners spoke in times past to the Fathers by the prophets, last of all in these days hath spoken to us by His Son."

So God did communicate to us through other men. From time to time. He picked a certain man as His instrument in making known His truths and His will. The one chosen then had the obligation of delivering the divine message to the peo-

How did they receive him? What was their reaction? It was not at all unlike our own in similar circumstances. He was either laughed at or punished for his foolhardiness - unless he was able to present his credentials as a messenger of God. How clearly Moses understood the attitude of the people when he was commanded by God to teach them what had

been revealed to him alone. He knew very well that his own voice and manner could not convince people that he, a creature, had direct information from the Creator.

And Moses did not hesitate to remind God of this quirk in human nature. "They will not believe me." he protested, "nor hear my voice, but they will say: 'The Lord hath not appeared to thee."

In answer God set the pattern for the future and showed how He would put His own stamp of approval on those who were His true messengers. Moses was told to cast his rod upon the ground. ". . and it was turned into a serpent .. that they may believe, saith He, that the Lord God hath appeared to

MEANS USED BY GOD

Miracles and the fulfillment of prophecies are the means used by God to help men accept the testimony of authorized teachers. When we stop to think of it we realize it would have to be thus. It is true that some people are gullible to the point of believing anything merely on the testimony of their emotions, their preferences or their special likes. But God's Revelation demands an act of faith, which requires the assent of the mind and the will. Emotions cannot and should not determine what we believe.

Man needs some assurance, some motives of credibility, some reasons for believing, if

in an act of faith and let him accept Revelation as coming from God

He must have therefore reasonable confirmation of so great a claim. Now it must be remembered that miracles are possible to God alone. So when miracles accompany the teaching of a human being, they vindicate his mission and his claim.

No teacher was ever put to the test so severely as Christ. because no one ever made such extraordinary claims. He relied on miracles to support His authority. When He was buestioned, He said: "Go and relate what you have heard and seen. The blind see, the lame walk, the dead rise again, the poor have the Gospel preached to

And to those who were reluctant to believe, He said: "I speak to you, and you believe Me not; the works that I do in the name of My Father, they give testimony of Me." Later when the Apostles went into the world to preach the doctrines of Christ, in order to pave the way God granted them the support of miracles to their words.

So it is with the Church today. In claiming the right to teach the entire Revelation of God, the Church has to bear the miraculous signs of God's authority. One of the great tasks of the Ecumenical Council will be to clarify these signs and make them evident to men of the space age, so that they will be willing to see them as the divine seal on the teaching of the Church.

Some Editorialists Careless In Analyzing The Encyclical

One of the best analyses of Pope Paul's recent encyclical, Ecclesiam Suam (His Church), which has thus far come to

this writer's attention appeared in the Aug. 24 issue of Newsweek.

Whoever wrote this piece for Newsweek obviously took the trouble to Msgr. Higgins read the full text of the en-

cyclical very carefully. This is more than can be said for a number of other columnists and editorial writers who, from all indications, analyzed the encyclical for their readers on the basis of incomplete summaries cabled from Rome.

I realize, of course, that commentators who write for the daily press are faced with rigorous deadlines, but surely this is no excuse for rushing into print about an important ecclesiastical document before they have had an opportunity to study the complete text.

The results of such carelessness in the case of Pope Paul's encyclical were, in a number of instances, very regrettable. Several commentators, for example, mistakenly said that the encyclical had condemned Communism as "the most serious problem of our time." That isn't precisely what the encyclical said. It said rather that atheism or Godlessness is "the most serious problem of our

It is true, of course, that the document went on to condemn

Moreover it is significant to note that the encyclical's pointed condemnation of Communism was profoundly pastoral in tone. That is to say, the Holy Father, while speaking "firmly and clearly in . . . defending religion and the human values which it proclaims and upholds," explicitly pointed out that he was moved by his pastoral office "to seek in the heart of the modern atheist the motives of his turmoil and deniál."

And after sympathetically analyzing these motives - more sympathetically perhaps than any Pontiff has ever done in an official document - he recalled the words of his beloved predecessor, Pope John XXIII. in Pacem in Terris to the effect that the doctrines of Communism and other contemporary atheistic movement, "once elaborated and defined, remain always the same, where as the movements themselves cannot help but evolve and undergo changes, even of a pro-found nature."

Therefore, he concluded, "we do not despair that they may one day be able to enter into a more positive dialogue with the Church than the present one which we now of necessity deplore and lament."

It would appear, then, that those commentators who prematurely interpreted the encyclical's reference to Communism as a reversal of Pope John's position either did not read the encyclical in context or read it very carelessly. Contrariwise, as indicated above, the author of Newsweek's perceptive analysis of the encyclical seems to have read the document very carefully and with due attention to all of its


We Have Power To Say 'Yes' Or 'No

The human will is a blind facultv. It can act only when motives for action are presented to it by the intellect. When the mind forms the judgment, "This is a good thing to do," the will responds and the choice is made.

Consequently, any factor which affects the clarity of the mind's judgment necessarily affects the will's freedom. This fact is recognized both in civil and moral law. A person cannot be convicted of first degree murder if he can prove that his crime was unpremeditated and was committed under a sudden access of passion. Neither will a person go to hell for a sin which, while objectively grave, is lacking in the deliberateness

which would make it a real rejection of God.

It is the emotions and passions which play the most havoc with the will's freedom, by obscuring the lucidity of the mind's judgment as to the goodness or badness of a particular

Such emotions as fear and anxiety and such passions as anger and sexual excitement can be particularly disturbing to freedom of decision.

For example, a woman may be so ridden by fear of another pregnancy that she uses contraceptives in spite of repeated good resolutions to the contrary. A man of otherwise blameless life may be so consumed with anxiety about family needs and unpaid debts that he steals from his employer. A teenager of good ideals may be so bedeviled by a sudden or prolonged sexual urge as to sin against chastity.

It would be folly for us, of course, to try to rationalize our sins and to try to escape responsibility by manufacturing excuses. It is only God, with His full view of the human heart, Who can accurately assess the degree of culpability. It is enough, for us to know that no one ever will lose heaven because under unbearable stress, he lacked the freedom to make the right

It is comforting to recall this. It is equally comforting to know that God can influence our freedom, too. Without entirely destroying our liberty, God can make easy for us a course of action that will redound to our

If we have a responsive will and a sincere desire to do what is right, we can be sure that there have been many wavering moments when God has weighted the odds in our favor. By an infusion of extra grace or by a more favorable arrangement of circumstances, God has made easier our personal decision and our ultimate victory.

After going to the extreme of assuming our human nature and dying upon a cross in order to bring us to Himself, God certainly is not overlooking such a simple and (for Him) easy technique as reinforcing our free will in its pursuit of virtue.

This is a somewhat humbling thought to those of us who may

be inclined to congratulate ourselves on a struggle won, a conquest achieved. As we bask in the warm glow of a hard decision bravely made, it is well for our self-esteem that God does not suddenly reveal to us the fact that the power which pushed us over the top came 99.9 per cent from Him.

Even for theologians and psychologists, the operation of the human will is largely shrouded in mystery. Some men try to escape the mystery by a complete denial of human freedom. They say that freedom is an illusion and that whatever we do, for good or for evil, we do because we must.

However, the testimony of our conscience gives the lie to such comfortable escapism. Given a reasonable degree of mental health and mental alertness, we know that in all decisions there is a point at which we freely choose to tip the scales in one direction or another.

We are subject to pressures, admittedly. We are the recipients of grace, unquestionably. But despite the pressures on the one hand and grace on the other, for the normal person there is in the end that margin of freedom, however narrow, wherein we have to speak our own "yes" or "no."



Newman Centers Are Seen Playing Key Ecumenical Role

WASHINGTON (NC) - The Newman center on the secular campus is going to play an increasingly important part in the ecumenical movement in this country because it offers a ready - made platform for dialogue and discussion.

This is the prediction of Father Charles Albright, C. S. P., who for the past nine years has played a leading part in the growth of the Newman apostolate.

He is leaving his position as coordinationg secretary for the National Newman Apostolate this September to become director of the Newman program at Louisiana State University in New Orleans.

"The implications of the Vatican council are going to have a rather immediate effect on the Newman movement," said Father Albright. "If there is going to be a formal ecumenical program in a diocese, there is no better place for it than the Newman center."

The Paulist priest said the Catholic center on the secular campus offers the "best possible atmosphere" for interreligious talks because the typical college campus is a composite society that is dedicated to serious inquiry. Already, he said, students and priests have taken part in discussions with their non - Catholic counterparts in a formal and organized way. Some of the Newman centers now being built are including facilities for ecumenical meet-

Father Albright, 43, came to the national Newman headquarters at the National Catholic Wealfare Conference in

Nine years ago, he recalled, there were only 100 full - time Newman chaplains in the U.S. This fall there will be around 250 of them. There are now over 175 Newman centers on secular campuses in the U.S., more than twice the number of nine years ago.

Despite the growth of the Newman movement in the last decade, Father Albright pointed out that there are still many Catholics on secular campuses not associated with Newman activities. In particular, only a

small percentage of the 750,000 Catholics attending secular colleges take part in formal religious instruction programs.

How to reach this majority of inactive Catholics is still a matter of debate and experimentation a mong Newman leaders, the priest said. A few chaplains favor replacing the traditional Newman "club" with a campus parish or with a Catholic education center.

English Used First Time In Liturgical Week Mass

ST. LOUIS (NC) - The annual Liturgical Week got underway here with major stress on the 20th century Catholic's mandate for responsible involvement, not only in public worship of the Church, but also - in cooperation with men of all faiths and none - in efforts to solve "the problems and perplexities of this world."

Serving as both the foundation and keynote for The Week was the opening Mass, the first in English, offered at 5 p.m. in massive Kiel Auditorium. This Eucharist was in effect a preview demonstrating the broad potential offered by the constitution on the liturgy enacted by the ecumenical council, and the American Bishops' decrees for putting it into effect, which are to become general throughout the country next Nov. 29.

English was used for all of those prayers and Scripture readings which the Bishops have decided will be in the vernacular. Most of the Service of the Word was in English — not only the unchanging parts such as the Kyrie, Gloria and Creed, but also the Introit, Epistle, Gradual and Gospel.

In the Eucharistic Liturgy, the Offertory Anthem and Sanctus, and Lord's Prayer and most of the rest of the Communion Service were all in English.


Father Frederick R. McManus, Catholic University of America canon law professor and liturgical expert of the ecumenical council, was celebrant. He offered Mass facing the people, at a large but starkly simple altar table. He preached the homily on the liturgy of the day, the feast of the Apostle Bartholomew, and led the restored "Prayer of the Faithful brief litany of intercessions especially for the Church's bishops, priests and people, all Christians, the Jewish people, government leaders, and those involved in the cause of justice, including civil rights.

For the congregation, 11,000 strong, there was total involvement. The congregational prayers resounded through the hall whether they were English or

The mass was filmed and tape-recorded to serve as a guide for the future for dioceses across the nation.

Convention deliberations begán the same night with a welcome by Joseph Cardinal Ritter, host bishop and one of the 42 members of the ecumenical council's liturgy commission. The Cardinal read a personal message sent by Pope Paul VI for the occasion. He voiced a special welcome to the many on hand representing other faiths.

Father Gerard S. Sloyan, president of the Liturgical Conference and head of the department of religious education at the Catholic University of America, also extended a welcome to other Christians and to our Jewish friends . . . here as our elder brothers."

How Sacraments Will Sound In English

WASHINGTON (NC) - Traditional confessions in Catholic churches across the nation will have an unfamiliar ring for penitents in mid-September.

The priest will absolve in English, reciting in the vernacular the formula customarily said in Latin.

This change, probably the first to be noticed by the avera Catholic, will be part of a weeping revision in the admistration of the Church's sacraments and its sacramentals.

The U.S. bishops have agreed to introduce English on Monday, Sept. 14, in the entire ceremonies, including the essential formulas, of the administration of the sacraments Baptism, Confirmation, Penance, Annointing of the Sick (Extreme Unction), Matrimony and Holy Eucharist when it is received outside of

The decision was announced by Archbishop John F. Dearden of Detroit, chairman of the U.S. Bishop's commission on the Liturgical Apostolate, at the direction of Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York, ranking U.S. Catholic churchman and president of the U.S. Bishops' Episcopal Conference.

English in the distribution of the Holy Eucharist during Mass will come about when the vernacular is introduced in this and other parts of the Mass itself.

This is expected to take place on Nov. 29, the first Sunday of Advent and the beginning of the liturgical year. The hierarchy is scheduled to make a formal decision on the date when it meets in Rome this fall during the third session of the Vatican Council.

In addition, under the agreement, English will be used in

The sacramentals include blessings of a couple on wedding anniversaries, of a woman before and after childbirth, of congregations on Sunday or of a house or place such as a

At least three publishing firms will have the rituals, containing the authorized English words for the administration of the sacraments and sacramentals, ready by early Sep-

These books will be available at church goods stores and other suppliers.

How will administration of the sacraments in English sound? The most obvious point is that singular pronoun and verb forms used in many past translations are gone, replacing "thou" and "thee" with "you." Here are some examples:

Penance: "May our Lord Jesus Christ absolve you, and by His authority I absolve you from every bond of excommunication and interdict to the extent of my power and your from your sins, in the name of

the sacramentals - special the Father, and of the Son and

Baptism: As the priest pours baptismal water three times on the head of the infant in the form of a cross, he will pronounce the following words once: "I baptize you in the name of the Father,+ (he pours the first time) and of the Son,+ (he pours the second time) and of the Holy + Spirit (he pours the third time)."

Holy Eucharist outside Mass: As the priest holds the ciborium and a single Host, he says to the people: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold Him who takes away the sins of the world." The people and priest then say three times: "Lord, I am not worthy that you should come under my roof. Speak but the word and my soul will be healed." As the priest distributes Communion, he says, "The Body of Christ," and the communicant says, "Amen."



ABSOLUTION IN English will be used in Confession beginning Sept. 14 in the United States. "I absolve you from your sins," the priest will say. Most other Sacraments and sacramentals similarly will be in English.







greatly its work in the field of special education. It is the first center for mentally-retarded children under Catholic auspices in the southeastern United States.

The first building in the center was blessed by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll on Sunday, June 21 of this year. In addition to serving as a convent, it contains several specially-equipped classrooms. A separate school building containing all classrooms, specially-equipped, will be completed soon.

Modern Catholic Education Has Broad Scope

Catholic education has for much too long been bearing a yoke of misunderstanding which frustrates progress, inhibits action, and creates problems that should not exist at all. That yoke is the fundamental misconception, among Catholics and non-Catholics alike, about what goes on in Catholic schools.

The misconceptions have been held by those who say flatly that Catholic schools are nothing more than "Bible Schools", by those who believe there is some academic content but nowhere near as much as there should be, by those who simply reject the idea that religious formation and intellectual development are compatible, and by those who have never seen the inside of a Catholic school.

These skeptics should visit a few Catholic schools, talk with a few teachers, and meet a few students.

ELEMENTARY

The Catholic elementary school is designed to be an invitation to learning, an invitation to group experience, and an invitation to seek God. It is, in sum, intended to be a happy place, for without this the youngster would not thrive. Where there is even a reasonable supply of teachers and of teaching space the design nears harmonious completion.

Where there is a shortage of these two vital ingredients the design is strived for as best as available resources will permit. The academic content includes religion, arithmetic, reading, history, geography, music, language arts, writing, science and health. The group content includes recreation, athletics, free time activities, and arts and crafts. Religion, itself an academic subject, is made part of the curriculum in a way that both deepens religious life and academic content.

The whole is an integrated curriculum that is known in no Catholic educational system in the world except that which American citizens have created for Americans.

SECONDARY

The Catholic secondary school is the place where, in addition to the continuance of religious formation and citizenship training, two vital new educational events come into the lives of teen-aged boys and girls. One is the intensive concentration in academic subjects required for the future, whether for college or another pursuit. The other is the thoroughgoing guidance in the matters required for sound personal growth.

The academic subjects are those found in the typical American high school, including English, history, social science, mathematics, science, classical languages, modern foreign languages, music, arts and crafts, and business education.

To this academic core is add-

ed a wide range of athletics, for truth are present in a vital of continuing education will the least deter the effort to extracurricular activities, and compelling way. community service tasks.

It includes liberal arts education in colleges; training for law, medicine engineering, nursing, foreign service, and all the professions in graduate schools and special institutions; the preparation of teachers, religious and lay, in schools and colleges; the education of priests in the minor and major seminaries; the searc for new knowledge and the preservation of the old in educational centers focusing on basic research, applied research, and scholarly work.

provide special education of a kind that will satisfy the special needs of these children.

The effort, where most fully implemented, seeks to help the individual child whose problems (mental retardation, brain damage, or emotional disturbance) are discovered in normal school situations, and to help the gifted child whose exceptional powers demand special attention of another sort.







In his talk on marriage, Father Gorman pointed out that marriages are ending "in seven times as many divorces as they did a century ago.'

Father Gorman further stated that "juvenile delinquency - a sure sign of the instability of family life, has tripled in the last two decades."

Father Gorman cited these statistics as a reason why every person contemplating marriage should first have a sound preparation for it.

"It is imperative," said Father Gorman, "that both parties be of the same faith." He added that "even the clergy of a number of Protestant denominations now are urging their followers to marry within the precincts of their own faith."

"Make sure your partner is a Catholic in fact, not in fiction,' said Father Gorman.

Father Gorman stressed that it is important that both part-

chological differences between men and women

"To begin with, the record of creation makes it clear that man is the primary and woman the secondary creature," said Father Gorman. "Woman was intended as man's companion and helper."

Father Gorman said the main distinguishing characteristics of man is his creative ability and his pride while the prime motivational force in a woman's life is her need for affection.

'Man disciplines his imagination," said Father Gorman," but woman indulges hers and so she is often swayed by its color and vivid imagery."

Father Gorman noted that "men are accustomed to dull routine" which is caused by their work patterns, while "women, of course, resent the monotonous."

"Women are more nervous and high strung than men," said Father Gorman, "and crave diversion and variety."

"Man's greatest problem is discouragement," said Father Gorman, pointing out that the smart woman is always boosting her man's ego and giving him moral support."

"He in return," said Father Gorman, "will allow her to share in his life (his work, hobbies etc.) and thus aid her to overcome the great obstacle of loneliness."

Father Gorman further pointed out that "just as a woman prefers a man who is truly manly in his manner and behavior, so too, let it be clearly understood that a man wants a truly feminine woman. He doesn't want competition for the role of head of the house. He wants someone to complete him."

When selecting a honeydew, note both the color and feel of the skin. It should be creamy yellow or, if grown in Northern California or Latin America, a sort of straw-white. When you run your hand over it, the surface should have the feel of high quality kid-skin gloves. (If it of serving honeydew melons.

has a hard, slick exterior it was probably picked too green.)

Even though your honeydew is beautifully ripe by these standards, allow a day or two of conditioning at room temperature. This gives the melon time to develop juiciness.

Honeydew, like cantaloupe, juicy, sweet and delicate in has the best bouquet if served at room temperature or just cool, rather than cold.







ligion, his interest must be kindled. What then is a simple yet effective way of arousing such interest? By bringing a non-Catholic friend or neighbor to Sunday Mass.

The fruitfulness of this method is shown in the conversion of Jeanette S. Jackson, a public health nurse of Maplewood, N. J. "My sister Pauline was invited by a girl friend to accompany her to an inquiry class. Pauline's interest was aroused and she then began to attend Mass. "I was stirred by the memorable words Christ addressed to the Apostles: 'Go, therefore. and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and behold I am with you all days even unto the consummation of the world' (Matthew 28:19-20).

"The Mass brings Jesus to us each day, and enables us to offer again in an unbloody manner the Sacrifice of Calvary. I now understood the reason why most Catholic churches are crowded not only on Sundays but even on holy days which fall on weekdays. They come to join with the priest in offering the greatest sacrifice, homage, adoration, thanksgiving and prayer which human beings can offer.

Why Is There An Index Of Forbidden Books?

A. The Index of Forbidden Books is a relic of post-Nicene days; and its value to the average Catholic is minimal. Outside of a few novels, less objectionable than 90 per cent of those you find at the corner drug store, there are few books on the Index which would interest the average Catholic.

I recognize the Church as a teaching authority established by Jesus Christ and guided by the Holy Spirit; and I accept that authority as a guide to my reading.

Saints In Public But Meanies At Home

Members of a relative's family are considered outstanding Catholics, active in every drive. All the Children went to Catholic schools. Yet I know of no more miserable home to visit. When company leaves, manners come off and the atmosphere ranges from ugly sounds to full scale warfare. In my father's home I heard little about Catholic action, but I remember love and mutual respect. What's the answer?

The answer, Jean, is that none of us quite live up to expectations. Despite our best efforts to be good Catholics and good citizens, good husbands and good wives, good sons and ood daughters, we all sometimes fall short of these goals. It started a long time ago in a place known as the Garden of

However, there are reasons besides original sin which may help you understand the situation about which you complain.

There are two kinds of human groups. One is the small, intimate, personal group such as you have in the family or in the neighborhood. The other is a large, impersonal, formal type of group such as you have in a large organization or

In the small, intimate group, people know each other fairly well. They see each other every day under all kinds of circumstances - in sickness, in health, in misery, in joy. As a result it is very difficult to deceive other members of this group. This i especially true in the family circle.

In a larger group or association, people see only one facet of another person's personality. They may know the individual as a member of a labor union, or a fraternal organization. They see the other person rarely, and they see him under very special circumstances in which he is never truly revealed to other people.

This is exactly the case of the family you mention. When they have company, they are on their best behavior. They reveal only certain aspects of their personality to those who are visiting. They put their best foot forward. No one can blame them for this

The Mask Is Off

On the other hand, when the company has left, things become rather miserable. This is unfortunate. For what you have said, I fear, there is an actual revelation of the true personalities of the family members. Some of this, of course, is understandable.

In fact, one of the very good things about family life is that one can "be himself" there, but he needn't be a very miserable self. Sometimes it is said that if husbands and wives treated each other as though they were strangers, life would be pleasanter. Within limits, this is true. But if husband and wife treated each other as strangers, they would miss all of the rich living that goes with being a husband and wife. It simply isn't

I don't believe that the ugly type of life occurring in the home you describe is traceable to Catholic action. As a matter of fact, quite the opposite. You seem to intimate that while you heard little about Catholic action in your own home, you do remember love and mutual respect. Let me assure you that these things are not incompatible at all.

As a matter of fact, in sincere Catholic action, the first kind of action begins with changing of one's self. No one can be a real leader in the field of Catholic action unless he himself has already attained the foundations of a truly spiritual life.

All human beings are a bit inconsistent, but some human beings are grossly inconsistent. This, I think is the story with the family that quarrels.

If you can speak to them calmly and charitably, it may . Particularly if there is any member of the family who is very close to you, it might be a good idea to raise this question

I am warning you to be very careful because, if you will forgive me, there is a tinge of criticism and "better than thou" in your letter. In a way, although I am sure it is unintentional, you have ridiculed this family for its various activities, most of which are praiseworthy. At the same time you do sound a little like the Pharisee who in full voice boasted to God that he was thankful he was not as other men.

Perhaps I am being a bit harsh, but I cannot escape this feeling in reading your letter. It is for this reason that I strongly suggest, if you do attempt to help this family or any member of it, you first get rid of any feeling of smug satisfaction you may have about your own family.

There is probably no family in the entire world without its intra-family problems. In most cases they are unknown to the world at large, but they do exist. They are so prevalent that it ill behooves any one of us to assume a holier than thou attitude. All we have to do to be humble is look into our own families and see problems there.



Beatle Movie Has Accent; 'Molly Brown' Colorful Film

A HARD DAY'S NIGHT (Fair). Family . . (United Artists).

Whatever you may think of the Beatles, coif, cut-ups or character-wise, you will not likely mistake the boys for actors.

With suitably strong material instead of the haphazard, offthe-cuff nonsense Alun Owen here cooks up for them, the Beatles team might develop something comparable in comedy values to the Ritz Brothers, Marx Brothers or the Three Stooges.

Respuesta Cristiana al Problema Agrario

Por el Ing. Humberto Pérez Herrera.

Se comprueba en los últimos tiempos la emigración de grandes contingentes de población campesina hacia los centros urbanos. Este fenómeno de desplazamiento hacia las ciudades continúa verificándose en casi todos los países del mundo, en algunos en proporciones multitudinarias.

Es igualmente comprobable que a medida que se desarrola una economía ocurre una reducción de las fuerzas de trabajo dedicadas a la agricultura y aumentan por otra parte las dedicadas a la industria y a los servicios.

Lo que ha sucedido, en términos económicos, es que una baja productividad relativa del sector agrícola ha originado a su vez un bajo nivel de ingresos en la población rural y ésta busca, trasladándose a las ciudades, ocupación nes más remunerativas. Por eso se dice que la agricultura es un sector de la economía insuficientemente desarrollado. Pero además del factor económico señalado, otros factores contribuyen al éxodo de la población campesina: el deseo de abandonar una ocupación considerada estancada y sin futuro; el ansia de novedades y aventuras; la seducción de vivir con mayor libertad dis-

frutando las comodidades que ofrecen las ciudades; perspectivas de rápido enriquecimiento.

Consecuentemente, el problema que encaran casi todos los países es este: qué hacer para reducir e ldesequilibrio de la productividad agrícola respecto a la de los otros sectores productivos, industria y servicios; para que el nivel de vida de la población agrícola se diferencie lo menos posible del nivel de vida de la población ocupada en la industria y los servicios; en fin, para que se afirme en los agricultores la convicción de que el campo. puede ser el lugar estable y seguro de vida.

DIRECTIVAS PONTIFICIAS

Señalan las enseñanzas pontificias directivas concretas que contribuirfan a la solución del problema agrario:

En primer lugar es indispensable proveer a las zonas rurales de servicios esenciales de transportes y comunicaciones, agua y energía, salubridad: instrucción básica e instrucción técnica aplicada a la agricultura, condicione apropiadas para la vida religiosa. A los poderes públicos toca de modo especial tomar la iniciativa y activar la provisión de tales servicios, sin los cuales el desarrollo económico y el progreso social resultan o imposibles o muy lentos.

Un sano desarrollo económico requiere además que los diversos sectores de la economía se desarrollen en forma gradual y proporcionado balance. Vale decir que las innovaciones técnológicas, las siembras y las formas administrativas adoptadas sean las que el sistema económico de un país o región pide o permite y guarden relación armónica con la industria y los servicios.

Lograr un desarrollo económico gradual y armonioso de todos los sectores productivos lleva a la necesidad de poner en práctica una bien pensada política agraria en materia de impuestos, crédito, precios, promoción industrial de base agrícola, ade cuadas estructuras de la empresa y seguros sociales.

Se extienden las enseñan-

zas de los Papas en la consideración de esos aspectos de política agraria y llegan a establecer por ejemplo, que si un sistema impositivo ha ae ser justo y equitativ be repartir las cargas tributarias de acuerdo con la capacidad contributiva de los ciudadanos. Al fijar los tributos, sin embargo, velando por el bien común debe advertirse que los ingresos del sector agrícola se realizan con mayor lentitud y confrontan mayores riesgos en su formación y son mayores las dificultades para atraer los capitales requeridos al objeto de incrementar la producción y de consiguiente los in-

gresos. Por ese motivo los poseedores de capital se muestran reacios a invertir en la agricultura y desplazan sus operaciones hacia la más atrayente esfera de los otros sectores. La agricultura, como no puede pagar altos interese padece escacez de ca-

pitales. Dada esa situación es preciso emprender una particular política crediticia que facilite a la agricultura los capitales necesarios a un interés y condiciones adecuadas a sus pecualiaridades.

Con todo, se subraya que los protagonistas del desarrollo económico, del progreso social y de la elevación cultural y espiritual de las zonas rurales deben ser los mismos campesinos.

LOS CANDIDATOS Y SUS **PROGRAMAS**

Expectación de América Ante Elecciones en Chile

El senador Eduardo Frei, de 53 años, es el líder de la democracia cristiana; partido que surgió en Chile hace 30 años, organizado por un grupo de jóvenes descontentos. apartados del Partido Conservador. Actualmente son considerados una fuerza electoral poderosa. Frei define los principios del movimiento izquierdista con el lema "revolución en libertad", calificándose a sí mismo de enemigo de los "imperialismos y monopolios" y se declara en favor del mantenimiento de relaciones con todos los países del mundo. Aunque no se declara personalmente en favor de la nacionalización de los recursos naturales, advierte que la actual situación debe ser modificada. Una reforma agraria casi integral y medidas para establecer el contacto presidencial directo con el pueblo mediante plebiscitos están contenidas en su plataforma. Es partidario de un estricto control del crédito en el comercio exterior, el sistema de cambios, y que bajo su gobierno desaparecerían la diferencias legales entre los trabajadores manuales y los "Cuello duro".

Salvador Allende, médico, de 56 años de edad, es el candidato del Frente Revolucionario de Acción Popular (F. R.A.P.), integrado por varios grupos izquierdistas. El F.R. A.P. propugna una reforma agraria integral y la nacionalización de todos los recursos naturales y bancos, así como del comercio exterior y el tráfico marítimo; propiciando además la reforma del sistema parlamentario para "democratizar su composición y dar una representación mayortaria a la clase trabajadora". En las elecciones anteriores de 1958 salió perdedor en su confrontación con el Presidente saliente, Jorge Alessandri, por sólo 30,000 votos. En declaraciones que hizo hace poco a un periódico de Roma expresó que no habría diferencia entre el gobierno chileno presidido por él y el Régimen de Castro, y que si triunfaba en las elecciones "Cuba y Chile serán los ejemplos revolucionarios opuestos, ambos cálidos aunque diferentes en sus etapas iniciales, pero no en lo restante. Tendremos socialismo, como los cubanos". Además ha prometido que si llega al Gobierno, dejará sin efecto el pacto militar con Estados Unidos y solicitará la eliminación las bases norteamericanas en

De acuerdo a las últimas noticias. Salvador Allende ha

acusado al candidato demócrata cristiano, Eduardo Frei, de haberse comprometido con los partidos tradicionales o derechistas. Y por otro lado, doce miembros del Partido Liberal renunciaron y fueron simultáneamente e; pulsados del Partido por apoyar al candiadato Salvador Allende.
