



Oils To Be Blessed On Holy Thursday

Solemn Pontifical Mass of the Holy Chrism will be concelebrated by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll and 18 priests of the Diocese of Miami at 10:30 a.m. on Holy Thursday, April 15, in St. Rose of Lima Church.

The Holy Oils used for administering the sacraments throughout the year will be consecrated by Bishop Carroll during the Mass which will be concelebrated in accordance with the provision of the Ecumenical Council's Constitution on the Liturgy which specifically calls for concelebration during the Chrism Mass and which goes into effect on Holy Thurs-

NEW SOUNDS

Among new sounds which will be heard in the rite of concelebration will be that of the celebrants singing or reciting the most solemn words of the Consecration. All priests participating will recite the Canon prayers aloud, including the words of the Consecration.

What Is Truth? Pope Asks Students; Gives Its Meaning

VATICAN CITY (NC) -Pope Paul VI posed Pilate's "What is truth?" query in meeting a group of Roman students who had won religion competitions in various state and church schools.

"The answer to that tremendous question is . . . Christ is truth!" the Pope said.

The competition was entitled "Veritas" — the Latin word for truth. In a reference to it. the Pope said "It is a grave word, full of meaning and sacred." He asked the students if they knew why it was the slegan of the competition.

'You will say the reason is clear, because religion . . . is truth; thus does the Catholic religion present and proclaim it-

QUESTIONS ARISE

"This . . . is exact. But if it is exact that the study of our religion is the study of truth, a hundred questions arise which you, intelligent young people that you are, can immediately perceive. Granted that truth exists, how is it that so many scholars, very respectable ones,

doubt or deny this fact? And indeed what do we mean by truth? Are there not several ways of regarding it?

"Certainly, and it is here that matters become complicated. There is a truth of the knowledge of the senses, then that of intelligence turned toward sensible and experimental re-

"But is not there also another, inner truth - truth of the conscience that we call certainty; that is to say truth which is based on the value of our knowledge? And do not doubts and problems of all kinds begin here?

"But pay attention for another moment. Don't we have some notion of a third truth? The artist who thinks of and then expresses his work, who has impressed an idea on his art, does he perhaps not have the conviction and satisfaction of having created a true work, of having expressed a truth of his own? Isn't the relationshp between the generating idea and the generated work a wonderful product of truth?

Married Couple Appointed By Pope As Council Auditors

MEXICO CITY (NC) - Husband and wife who are awaiting the imminent birth of their 12th child have been appointed lay auditors of the ecumenical council by Pope Paul VI.

Jose Alvarez Icaza, 44-yearold civil engineer, and his wife, Luz Maria, 41, are the first married couple to be named council auditors. They were presented the papal document appointing them by Archbishop Luigi Raimondi, Apostolic Delegate in Mexico.

The Alvarez Icazas, who live in Mexico City, together founded the Christian Family Movement in Mexico in 1958 and served as its first national presidents. The movement has now grown to some 12,000 Mexican families in 52 dioceses.

The pair has taken part in a number of international conferences on family life and at the Christian Family Movement assembly in Peru last August they

were named presidents of the Latin American secretariat of the CFM.

Accepting the appointment as an opportunity more than an honor, the Alvarez Icazas said:

"We hope to become the voice of a common and contemporary family — not a theological, or scientific voice, which we are not, but the voice of a normal family, like the millions of similar families existing in the world and which are to be served by the Church."

Expressing the hope that other American families, Catholics and other Christians alike, will write them to "tell us what they want us to say in Rome on topics that affect family life," they declared:

"We believe that it is urgent for the voice of the family to be present in the council, because as the family is, so is

open the door to Red Chinese expansion, according to L'Oservatore della Domenica, Vatican City weekly.

An editorial in the weekly by Federico Allessandrini, assistant editor of L'Osservatore Romano, Vatican City daily, said communists are posing as 'champions of the rights of peoples and their freedom" and demands are being made that the U.S. get out of Vietnam and halt its "imperialist" efforts. Alessandrini added:

"Nothing is said, however, about the other real imperial-Tung is bringing to bear on Vietnam by promoting and feeding guerrilla warfare."

He added that the U.S. has shown it knows how to get out of a country when a situation has been solved. This is not the case with the communists, he said. He concluded:

"The Americans are attempting with air action in North which feed guerrilla warfare in the South. And it would be fitting to point out that, despite the obvious difficulties in which they have found themselves, they are fighting not only for their own interests but for the interests of all free men."

'Deo Gratias' Still Part Of The Mass

VATICAN CITY (NC) -The "Deo Gratias" said after the "Ite, Missa Est" at the close of Mass must still be said even though the response was overlooked in the new missal and ritual issued by the Congregation of Rites.

Father Annibale Bugnini, C.M., an undersecretary of the congregation, said the failure to include the response in the liturgical books was an oversight.



Repairs At Holy Sepulcher

JERUSALEM (NC) — When viewed from the high tower of the Lutheran church in the Jordanian sector of Jerusalem, the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher is distinguished by four obvious features. There is a very large dome which covers the tomb of Christ, a smaller dome over the Greek Orthodox church, a bell tower and a maze of girders.

If one looks closely it can be seen that there are two sets of girders — an old set used to prop up the crumbling walls, and a new web of scaffolding erected by present-day construction workers.

MOST VENERATED SHRINE

These new girders are the most significant features. For

after centuries of wars, fires, restorations and interdenominational fights, Christendom's most venerated shrine is being restored once more, and this time it is hoped the work will suffice for many generations.

There is much evidence to prove the early Christians revered the place where Christ was buried and the spot where He died on the Cross. Apparently in an attempt to discourage the veneration, the Roman Emperor Hadrian built a temple to Venus on the site.

In the fourth century the Emperor Constantine and his mother, St. Helena, began the work of uncovering the ancient shrines. Together with Bishop Macarius of Jerusalem, and after a long search, St. Helena found the burial place and the Cross still intact.

The church built on the spot in the year 335 was immense for its day, measuring 163 feet long by about 95 feet wide. The bare rock of Calvary, cut into shape, was covered with a gilded canopy. The tomb of Christ was at the center of the circular Chapel of the Resurrection at one end of the church.

SERIES OF MISFORTUNES

Three centuries after the church of Constantine was finished, a long series of misfortunes began for the basilica. In 614 it was destroyed by fire when the Persian Chosroes sacked Jerusalem. A dozen years later it was rebuilt by the Abbot Modestus with the help of the Patriarch of Alexandria. In 1010 the building was destroyed again, this time by the Mohammedans under the Caliph Hakem. Through the intercession of Emperor Constantine Monomachus, the basilica was restored once more in 1048.

The shape of the original building had now been altered considerably. Only the domed structure over the tomb retained its former magnificence. The other holy places were marked by small chapels or oratories. Yet some of the original structure remained. To this day one can still see parts of the basilicas of Constantine, Modestus and Monomachus. The steps leading to the first basilica can still be seen in the Russian hospice and the Coptic convent.

THEN THE CRUSADERS

When the crusaders captured Jerusalem in the 12th century, it was decided to rebuild the entire basilica on a grand scale. The result was a building which for the most part stands today. Crusader architecture was bold and daring. The rugged clusters of stones they used seem almost to be thrown together. The roof of the new church, which again sheltered all the shrines, was supported by thick walls and bulging columns which fanned out at the top.

The rotunda of the tomb of the previous church was largely preserved in the crusader church. Just outside, a stairway led down to the chapel of St. Helena and the crypt of the True Cross.

Franciscans, who by now had been assigned to care for the Holy Land shrines, restored the basilica in 1555 and again in 1719. However, in 1808 the church was gutted by fire once more, and the rotunda was completely destroyed. Since the Franciscans were unable to g financial assistance from the West, the basilica was restored by Greek Orthodox whose work erased all the designs and decorations of the Latin church. These have still not been uncovered.

REBUILT IN 1868

Hardly 50 years later the Greek dome began to collapse. It was rebuilt in 1868 with several countries financing the work. Then in 1927 an earthquake left the walls of the basilica tottering.

When the British, who now governed Palestine, were unable to get the various sects to cooperate in a reconstruction program, the walls were simply shored up with a network of wooden posts and iron girders. Pieces of glass were fastened to the stones, so that if they moved once more the glass would break.

In 1949 the dome was again severely damaged by fire and subsequently covered by a lighter material.

The modern work of reconstruction was inaugurated in 1955 when the Jordanian government brought the various religious groups together to plan the work. A committee of experts from Europe and the United States was appointed by the Latin-rite Custos to study, along with committees from other Churches, what could be done.

In 1959, representatives of the Catholic, Greek Orthodox and Armenian Churches signed an agreement to carry out the reconstruction. Each was assigned a portion of the basilica to restore. A joint technical bureau coordinated their efforts.


IMMENSE TASK

Although the barriers of intercommunity strife had been largely overcome, the task facing the builders was an in mense one. They had to reopen a quarry to find stones similar to those used for the Constantine and crusader churches. The stones had to be carried many miles into Jerusalem, then navigated through a narrow entrance — less than a yard wide - to the square in front of the basilica. Building materials had to be carried in by animals and rubble carried

The work of reconstruction has by necessity gone very slowly. It takes one man a week to prepare a single stone. Since there is little room to work, only a few men can be employed and no heavy equipment can be used.

Holy Week: Time For Total **Dedication To Spiritual Life**

Even the casual Christian finds that Holy Week is one period of the year when his conscience disturbs him if through indifference he remains on the fringe of the great spiritual events being commemorated. And this year, with the emphasis more pronounced than ever on the renewal of life for the individual Catholic, the sacred rites of next week invite a deeper participation in the mystery of Christ's passion and death and resur-

The changes this Holy Week will be comparatively minor, since Pius XII almost ten years ago made the first drastic revision of the Ordo. There will be for the first time certain readings in the vernacular. The unique ceremony of concelebration will be witnessed also for the first time in the Diocese when our Most Reverend Bishop and 18 priests will celebrate Mass on Holy Thursday at St. Rose of Lima Church.

Wording of various prayers will be changed, such as praying "for the Jews" rather than for the conversion of the Jews; praying for those "who do not yet believe in Christ" rather than for the pagans; praying for our "brothers who believe in Christ" rather than for heretics and schismatics.

The purpose of these revisions, as indicated in the Osservatore Romano, is so that "emotional bitterness, harshness and contempt" may be eliminated and none will be able to find "motives for spiritual uneasiness in the prayers of the

There will be no change, of course, in the serious character of this holiest of all weeks nor in the obligation of every Catholic to enter into it with a fervent spirit of reparation and a desire to be more closely united with Christ. This indeed is one time of the year when a Catholic is out of step with the Church if he does not voluntarily arrange his schedule to attend all services and involve himself more deeply in the wonderful mystery of our redemption.

A Sane, Positive Program

It is usually politicians who are expected to "view with alarm and point with pride," especially in comparing their opponents, record with their own.

However, the citizens of our area as well as those of most other sections of the United States have viewed with alarm for a long time the growing problems of boys and girls out of school and out of work, drifting from day to day with no plan and a sense of frustration, and sooner or later getting into trouble with the law or making impulsive, unfortunate decisions about an early marriage, which compounds their problems and often penalizes them for life.

Recent happy news of the Neighborhood Youth Corps project is enabling us to begin at long last to point with pride at a sensible, positive program already underway. This has been made possible by a federal grant of \$279,200.00, which is to be applied to certain young people by the Catholic sponsored South Florida Economic Opportunity Development Council. (The program will be expanded to take in other counties in the Diocese).

The project gets to the heart of the youth problem by enabling those who are in school to work ten hours a week, so that they can continue their studies. It also offers aid to those

out of school by making thirty hours of work a week possible, and therefore in many cases enabling young men and women to return to school eventually, or at least to gain experience for permanent jobs.

These young people eligible for help come from families with incomes under \$3,000 and Dade County alone has about six thousand girls and boys in this category. Already the Neighborhood Youth Corps has put twenty-five to work, Within six weeks it is estimated that five hundred will be benefitting from the program. It is important to realize that the Corps project is directed to all eligible youth regardless of race or

This positive, constructive approach will not enable all citizens at once to stop viewing with alarm the critical problem of drop-outs and unemployment among youth. But it certainly offers an encouraging means of tackling the problem and gives us ground for pointing with pride to the farsightedness of those who have planned and are executing the project.

Team of Religion, Science

Last week's meeting of Pope Paul and the members of his special study group on the problems of family and birth regulation had special significance, even though it was announced that the Commission had not yet finished its work and therefore could not give a final report.

Its significance, it seems to us, can be found in the closing words of our Holy Father's talk to the members. He urged them to "apply yourselves with your whole heart to your task, allowing that to mature which must mature. But you must understand the anguish of so many souls and work with diligence without being concerned with criticism and difficulties."

These words contradict the cynical view that the Church is not really interested in the question of family limitation nor in the emphasis being placed on the aspect of conjugal love in marriage, lest the purpose of procreation be downgraded.

Pope Paul's fatherly concern about "the anguish of so many souls" reflects the minds of the bishops in general in wanting to re-examine in the Council the nature of marriage and the duties of parents in the light of God's unchanging

ers have been identified no wever, many of the member and, in one sense, this is fortunate since they represent so many fields that new prestige is given to the whole group.

Among them are theologians, scientists, physicians, psychiatrists, sociologists and specialists in various areas, both lay and clerical — a noteworthy cross section of professionally competent men and women.

While everyone is anxiously awaiting the findings of the Commission, we cannot but be grateful that public pressure is not pushing the members into quick, premature statements, such as those being made by a doctor and a theologian here and there. This study is an excellent example of religion and science working together in the application of unchanging moral principles to new findings of the laboratory.

Concelebration Of Mass: Ancient Practice Revived

Long familiar to Catholics of the Eastern Rites, the concelebration of Mass which will become universally possible in the Latin Rite (with

permission the local Bishop) on April 15 will mark a new and important development in the reform of the Church's liturgy.



GRACIDA

Concelebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass means simply that instead of a single priest offering the Sacrifice at the altar several priests will offer it together at the same time and at the same altar.

Such a form of celebration of Mass was the rule rather than the exception in the first centuries of the Catholic Church's life. It was customary for the bishop of the diocese to gather about him the priests of the diocese (usually quite few in number) and conjointly with them to offer the Holy Sacrifice, with each functioning fully as a priest in the exercise of his priestly powers.

CUSTOM LAPSED

With the rapid expansion of the Church in the Western part of Europe and the consequent increase in both the number of priests and the number of local congregations, the practice of concelebration fell into disuse in the Latin Rite. The Fathers of the Second Vatican Council recognized that the concelebration of Mass can again become a meaningful practice and in their Sacred Constitution on the Liturgy they directed that a new and modern rite of concelebration of Mass should be prepared. Such a rite has been prepared and was promulgated by the Postconciliar Commission For the Implementation of the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy on March 7, 1965.

In the Diocese of Miami, as in almost every other diocese of the world, the new Rite of Concelebration will be employed for the first time in the Mass which Bishop Carroll will offer in St. Rose of Lima Church, on Holy Thursday.

In the decree by which the new Rite of Concelebration was promulgated, it was pointed out that in every form, however simple, in which the Mass is celebrated, all its essential characteristics and properties remain the same. Yet some characteristics need to be revealed more clearly so that the Eucharistic Sacrifice can teach as well as sanctify the faithful of Christ.

UNITY STRESSED

First of all, there is a certain unity to the Sacrifice of the Cross. Many Masses still represent only the single sacrifice of Christ. They are the memorial of the Bloody Sacrifice achieved on the cross, the fruits of which

are received through the unbloody sacrifice.

Next, the unity of the priesthood. Whereas there are many priests who celebrate Mass, the individual priests are only ministers of Christ, Who exercises His priesthood through them. To achieve this purpose, makes the individual priests participants in His priesthood in a very special way through the Sacrament of Holy Orders.

Consequently, even when priests act as individuals in offering the sacrifice, they all nevertheless do this by virtue of the same priesthood which they share. They act in the Person of the High Priest, to Whom it belongs properly to consecrate the Sacrament of His Body and Blood whether through one priest or through many priests acting together.

Finally, the action of the entire people of God in the Sacrifice of the Mass appears clearly. It is through the celebration of the Mass that the Church lives and grows without ceasing. It is through the Sacrifice of the Mass that the true nature of the Church is re-

ESSENTIALS CLEARER

When several priests concelebrate the same Mass, these three essential characteristics of the Mass are revealed much more clearly. When a Mass is concelebrated the several priests, in virtue of the same priesthood and in the Person of the High Priest, act together with a single will and a single voice, and together they bring about and offer the unique sacrifice by a single sacramental act, and they all participate in it together.

When Mass is concelebrated and the faithful present all participate consciously, actively, and in a manner befitting the holy people of God, such a Mass is truly a manifestation of the nature of the Church.

This is all the more true particularly when a bishop presides as the principal celebrant at a concelebrated Mass. Such a concelebrated Mass is a manifestation of the unity of the sacrifice of Christ and of unity of the priesthood. priests and people, are gathered together around a single altar and all, according to their powers and place in the Mystical Body of Christ, offer the single sacrifice.

bration truths pertaining to the nature of the sacrifice of Christ, and the nature of the Church, are more clearly revealed. These truths can, when so revealed, foster the spiritual and pastoral life of priests and the Christian formation of all the faithful.

It is to achieve this lofty objective that the Rite of Concelebration is being revived in the Latin Rite.

Father Gommar de Pauw's group is not the first to imply that it would have been more advantageous if Vatican II had been put off until the twentyfirst century. But his movement is the first to advance such quaint arguments about the Council's being a colossal mistake and the bishops' being deceived by a "well organized minority" of liberal theologians, who are accused of undermining the Mass and papal infallibility.

In reading the Manifesto of the Traditionalists, one is surprised, after all the hullabaloo in the communications media last week, to find in it much that is appealing and agreeable.

It hurls bombs primarily at a few scholars whose "way out" views do not reflect the general opinion of bishops or theologians.

In typical tempest-in-a-teapot style, some of its most ardent declarations easily fit the mood and convictions of the vast majority of Catholics.

Much of the poorly written Manifesto reminds one of the fiery orator before the Altar Society who is all for motherhood and against sin.

For instance, it would be an odd Catholic indeed who would not endorse the Traditionalist urging to practice loyalty to the Pope and recognize his supremacy, or who would tolerate deliberate downgrading of devotion to Our Lady, or who would entertain seriously the thought of changing the Church's law on the celibacy of priests.

The Movement very likely

would trigger many yeas of assent, too, on the subject of habits, easily winning agreement that their garb should reflect their religious dedication. The Ursuline models still give most Catholics the shivers, so the Traditionalists obviously have a big play of unity here.

Perhaps they pick up more support in taking a swat at the use of Protestant hymns, for it is understandable that most Catholics will not be able overnight to substitute the "Rock of Ages" for "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name" without feeling pangs of disloyalty.

In mentioning Ecumenism, the thoughts in the document are vague and leave us with the idea that the Manifesto will have much more to say on this, besides lamenting what they call the effort to Protestantize the Church. Surely very few Catholics are going to quarrel with its insistence that we ought to "proclaim the full unadulterated doctrine of Christ's Church."

All these points, I say, represent a wide field of agreement. When the Traditionalists get into the Liturgy, however, for a few moments they probably pick up some followers in rather roundly condemning the use of English, but at once lose many more in their illogical and shallow charges that the bishops didn't know what they were doing in approving the Constitution on the Liturgy.

This is hardly a tribute to the intelligence and sincerity of the bishops, and even less a compliment to the Holy Spirit of God's influence in the final decisions of the Council.

This last point is the only one worth commenting on in the whole Manifesto and justifies the measured judgment of Father John Courtney Murray that the views expressed were "an awful lot of nonsense." Such a judgment is obvious from this line in an early dition of the Manifesto: "... these Liturgical changes were not called for by 'public opinion' but were rather subtly extorted from our bishops by a text. So great an undertaking

small but well organized minority . . ."

It is inevitable that some people, in and out of the Church, in reading such a charge will give credence to it, especially those who set a communist plot in every meeting, even one in St. Peter's. One reader has already written to ask if it was a "communist infiltration of the Council that led to this 'progressive' trend towards leftist mediocrity," whatever that means.

It would seem almost a waste of time to dwell on such an inane charge, except that we can always benefit by reviewing the record of the Liturgy debate and vote.

The intensely interesting debate on the Liturgy occurred during the first session of the Council in 1962 and was honored as the very first topic treated by the bishops. It served to make plain early in the conciliar deliberations for all the world to know that freedom of speech was never more in evidence anywhere than in the aula as bishops from all over the earth welcomed the chance to speak their mind on updating the Liturgy to the needs of modern man.

This was not done on one busy morning program, which would make a "subtle extortion" somewhat more simple, since the subject matter under debate was highly complex. But the Liturgy debate went on in St. Peter's from October 22 until November 13, five days a

Keeping in mind that fifteen to twenty-five Fathers of the Council spoke daily during these three weeks, one can see that in nearly two hundred talks on the Liturgy a vast outpouring of ideas resulted with men of all nationalities contributing.

When the bishops voted to cut off the subject on November 13th, the simple reason was that the topic had been exhuasted. Then at once began the enormous task of the Liturgy Commission to incorporate all the suggestions made into a new

was this that the bishops had nearly a year to think about what they had heard in the development of Liturgical thought before they had to take any action by votes on the proposed amendments.

Hence it was in the second session they were given printed copies of all the amendments proposed the year before. Then they were asked to vote upon them. But notice they did not vote on the whole body of amendments at once, but on small groups of them. Each chap'er was broken down into parts, and each part was voted on separately, such as amendments 1-4, chapter 2,

Cardinal Lercaro in the ninth day after the beginning of the second session in 1963 gave a report on the Liturgy Amendments before the first vote was taken in order to bring the bishops up to date on all that had been proposed and the guidelines that had been followed in incorporating the amendments And on every working day (save one) from October 8 to October 31, and for four additional days in the latter part of November, the bishops voted on all the eight chapters of the

It is true that voting on Chapter 2 failed to get a two-thirds majority. The reason was not that the bishops were against the idea proposed, but because they felt the revision did not go far enough! For instance, at that point it was planned to keep the essential form of the sacraments in Latin, that is, "Ego te absolvo, I absolve you". At their insistence this restriction was omitted, and the bishops then gave overwhelming approval to the chapters on the Mass and the Sacraments.

Finally, on December 4 when the very last vote was taken on the Liturgy text at the closing session in the presence of the Holy Father, the results showed an almost incredible agreement - 2147 in favor of the entire Liturgy text, and only four against it.

And this is the way the Liturgical changes were "rather subtly exorted from our bishops"!

sensing somehow that God was stirring the waters in Selma.'

This figure mav be exaggerated, but, whatever the exact number of clerics and nuns

involved in the Selma demonstrations, Newsweek is probably correct in stating that they were "in their own way working out the rudiments of a new role for the Church militant in modern American society."

I am all for them and certainly would have joined them

in Selma if I had been free to do so. On the other hand. I think it would be a mistake to jump to conclusions - or to become overly sentimental about the significance of Selma from the point of view of the Church's role in modern society.

There is a danger that the dramatic involvement of priests and nuns in such demonstrations - while absolutely necessary on occasion - will tempt us to oversimplify the problem of interracial justice and, by the same token, to oversimplify the problem of "working out the rudiments of a new role for the Church militant in modern American society."

The Church militant is made up of all the People of God not merely priests and nuns.

Many lay leaders in the Catholic interracial movement are very sensitive on this point and properly so, of course. In recent years they have strongly emphasized the need for an autonomous Catholic Iay organization in the field of race relations and have made it abundantly clear that, in their judgment, this new organization, rather than the National Catholic Welfare Conference, should take the leadership in developing a new role for the Church militant in the field of interracial justice.

I don't claim to understand the long-range significance of the participation of so many priests and nuns in the Selma demonstrations, nor do I pretend to have a very clear idea

of what needs to be done to enable the Church militant to play a more meaningful and more effective role in the field of race relations. I am of the opinion, however,

that the Selma experience may prove to have been a very mixed blessing at best if it tempts us to make a mystique out of such dramatic gestures and to overemphasize the role of clerics and nuns in solving the problem of racial injustice.

I also suspect that I, as a clerical spokesman for "an outmoded bureaucratic organization," am somewhat more concerned about this possibility than some of those who at the level of pure theory, talk with such feeling and with such certainty about the alleged dangers of clericalism in the field of social reform and about the need for lay autonomy in the temporal order.

cial harmony a matter of personal involvement."

"We must," said Dolan, "go beyond slogans and generalizations about color, and realize that all of us are human beings, men, women and children, all sharing the same human nature and dignity, with the same desires, hopes and feelings."

Dolan emphasized that "we should try to know and understand one another."

"To do this," Dolan said,
"we must meet and talk openly
and sincerely and calmly about
our mutual problems and concerns."

Pointing out that "there are many ways in which such meetings can come about peacefully and naturally and fruitfully," Dolan declared that "for example those in the same type of work can readily discuss the problems caused by racial barriers."

"Physicians of one race," Dolan suggested, "can talk with those of another."

SPEAKER

"So can businessmen, teachers, lawyers, secretaries, farmers, clerks and other workers," Dolan added.

Another speaker at the Institute was Robert M. Brake, of Coral Gables, former member of the County Commission of Dade County. Brake spoke on the Civil Rights Law of 1964.

Brake pointed out that the passage of Civil Rights legislation is merely a "way of opening doors" to help bring about justice in the field of equal rights for all citizens.

It is not, said Brake, "the final solution of the problems we face."

"Whenever a law is contrary to the deeply held beliefs or feelings of a large minority," said Brake, "it may be ignored many provisions to enable the as often as it is obeyed."

Negro to take his rightful place

"Prohibition," Brake declared, "is the most outstanding

Brake then listed the many laws that have been passed in the field of civil rights since the Civil War including the 14th amendment to the U. S. Constitution which sought to guarantee the right of any citizen to vote.

Eut Mr. Brake emphasized that, in spite of these laws, "the authorities at Selma, Ala., found ways to delay voter registration."

CITIZEN

Taking note of the Civil Rights Law of 1964 and its many provisions to enable the Negro to take his rightful place as a full citizen in our communities, Brake asserted, however, that "the Act has its limitations."

Brake cited some of these as:

"IT CANNOT make the voting registrar, of Selma, Ala., keep extra hours or hire extra help to speed registrations."

"IT CANNOT make a waiter act politely or take his thumb out of a bowl of soup."

"IT CANNOT prevent blockbusters' from re-segregating a neighborhood by encouraging white homeowners to move out when the first Negro moves into a neighborhood." "IT CANNOT force employers or employes to make a new man on the job feel welcome."

"These are matters of the heart." said Brake.

"And laws," Brake declared," can deal only with surface mat-

"But by breaking down the surface resistance," Brake (gested," perhaps the laws may help to break down the resistance of the heart, as well."

"Perhaps, by bringing the lonely stranger into our midst," Brake pointed out," it may remind us of the question, 'When did we see Thee, Lord, a stranger, and take thee in?'"

"'And the answer," Brake concluded," 'As long as you did it for one of these, the least of my brethren, you did it for me.'"

In addition to Brake and Dolan, Dr. George A. Simpson of Miami, also addressed the Institute. Dr. Simpson spoke on the "Effect of Discrimination Upon the Negro."







Cuban Refugees Not Eligible Now For 'Poverty War' Aid

Cuban refugees are unable to participate in the anti-poverty program that is being launched here. But efforts are under way to make them eligible.

This was disclosed during hearings held this week at the Dupont Plaza Hotel by an Appropriations Committee that will set up federal funds for next year's poverty war.

Msgr. Bryan O. Walsh, director of the South Florida Economic Opportunity Development Council, Inc., which is the official name of the Diocesan Anti-Poverty program, pointed out at the hearings that the law excluded Cuban

"The law is set up to read that only American residents can be helped," Msgr. Walsh told the committee.

"Unless a refugee is rich enough to go to Canada or some place and go through proper channels to establish residence he cannot be helped."

Msgr. Walsh declared that efforts are being made to change the present anti-poverty law to include the refugees.

For the present, however, Msgr. Walsh pointed out that all those of foreign nationalities with resident visas may apply for aid under the program.



House, Senate Bills Take Up Population Problem

WASHINGTON (NC) — Legislation authorizing major new Federal efforts in the population field has been introduced in both houses of Congress.

The Senate and House bills call for a White House Conference on population in January, 1967, and creation of special offices for population problems in the State Department and Department of Health, Eduon and Welfare. Each would be headed by a new assistant secretary with specific responsibility in the population area.

The Senate bill (S. 1676) was introduced by Sen. Ernest Gruening of Alaska and cosponsored by Sens. Joseph Tydings of Maryland, Rosa Bass of Tennessee, Paul Douglas of Illinois, Frank Moss of Utah, E. L. Bartlett of Alaska, and Ralph Yarborough of Texas. It was referred to the Senate Government Operations Committee.

BILLS IN HOUSE

In the House, bills were introduced by Reps. Paul Todd of Michigan and Morris Udall of Arizona. Their proposals (H. R. 7072 and 7073) were referred to the House Government Operations Committee.

In introducing his bill Gruening described rapid population growth as a major problem both in the U.S. and abroad. He said Federal, state and local governments must take a "positive, not permissive" approach or they will not be able to solve the problem.

At present growth rates, Gruening said, the United States will have a population of 800 million by the year 2040. "If our population growth does not stabilize," he said, "we may reasonably assume that we will lose the freedoms, privileges, and good life we enjoy today."

(A recent article in the Reporter magazine, co-authored by former Census Bureau director Richard M. Scammon, pointed out that the U.S. fertility rate has been dropping in recent years and that the 1964 total of 4,054,000 births was the smallest in a decade.

DENSITIES COMPARED

(The article said that even with a population of 1 billion, the U.S. would still have a population density of fewer than 300 persons per square mile less than the current population density of West Germany,

607, Japan, 678, the United Kingdom, 604, and Italy, 436.)

On the world scene, Gruening said, demographers "project" a global population of 150 billion by the year 2150. "If man multiplies to that extent, the chances are that life on earth as we know it today will have disappeared," he said.

The Alaska senator said the Federal government already is involved to some extent in the population area. As examples he noted that:

- Funds available for community action programs under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act — the antipoverty program — can be used for dealing with local population problems.
- The Children's Bureau of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has "for some time" been permitting state health organizations to in-

clude family planning services in maternity and child welfare programs.

He said that in New York City the Office of Economic Opportunity has made available almost \$1.5 million for birth control clinics. In the District of Columbia, he said, six city clinics give free birth control services to both maried and unmarried women on request.

INTERNATIONAL VIEW

On the international level. Gruening continued, "a number" of government agencies, particularly the State Department and the Agency for International Development, have been providing assistance on population and demographic problems to countries which ask for it.

Nevertheless, he declared, what we have done is distressingly inadequate."

Under the bill the proposed population offices in the State Department and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare would have primarily liaison, advisory and informational functions.

The White House Conference on Population would be planned by the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare. Its purpose according to Gruening, would be "develop recommendations

for further research and action.'

On the House side, Todd said "the population explosion and the problems it entails - both at home and abroad - are among the gravest issues of our times.

He also pointed to examples of existing government involvement in this area - including a \$6 million appropriation in the 1963 foreign aid bill for research into population growth problems.

Todd said family planning methods "acceptable to various religious beliefs" appear to exist already. He said an "informed, responsible dialogue" on the subject is growing.

Udall said the legislation's objective is to improve coordination of "presently authorized" population programs in the State Department and HEW.



Students Of Mary To Go **Deeper Into Scriptures**

WASHINGTON (NC) -Studies of the Blessed Virgin Mary are now being redirected toward a new focus which is both more Christ-centered and more Church-centered.

This is the promise of the fourth International Mariological Congress, held in Santo Domingo in the Dominican Republic, according to Church scholars here who participated in the symposium. They concur that in line with the ecumenical council's Constitution on the Church, Mariological studies henceforth will lay greater stress on the Sacred Scriptures.

TWO INDICATIONS

One indication of this was the fact that the Congress had as its general theme "Mary In The New Testament." Another was the presence and participation of Scripture scholars as well as dogmatic theologians.

According to Father Eamon R. Carroll, O. Carm., professor of theology at the Catholic University of America and a former president of the Mariological Society of America, this was the first time that leading Scripture scholars had taken part in such a major meeting. Father Carroll explained:

"Some theologians didn't seem to trust the Scripture men. This was unfair, but the meeting helped the theologians to understand better the approach of the exegetes. Once we came together, there wasn't much else we could do, and a real climate of frank expression developed."

Father Stephen Hartdegen, O.F.M., professor of Sacred Scripture at Holy Name College here, who is a former president of the Catholic Biblical Society of America, agreed that "a very good start" was made creating "dialogue" between

dogmatic theologians and Scripture scholars. There was, he said, "a spirit of sincerity and goodwill which, without any compromise, sought mutual understanding.

DIFFERENT APPROACH

According to Father Hartdegen, the difference of approach between the two groups of scholars is that exegetes are concerned with examining the Scriptural texts in their contexts and in the light of literary forms to find out wnat their authors say and mean, while dogmatic theologians traditionally take as their starting point Church teaching - in this case, doctrine concerning the Blessed Virgin. Then they procede to select Scriptural texts to substantiate doctrine, going on to the "argument from tradition" and then to the "argument from reason."

What the Santo Domingo congress paved the way for, he indicated, is a fresh penetrating search into the development of Marian doctrine in the Scriptures - both through its foreshadowing in the Old Testament and its unfolding in the New. He said this new start by exegetes together with theologians 'should give the doctrine concerning Mary a new luster and make it attractive also to our separated brethren.'

The scholars commenting on the congress agreed that the new Scriptural stress in Mariological studies was aided not only by the ecumenical council but also by the instruction issued by the Pontifical Commission for Biblical Studies in Rome on orders from Pope Paul VI in April of 1964.

That instruction in effect dissipated the cloud of suspicion cast over modern Scripture studies by some theological circles. It also gave a green light to the application of the principle of "form criticism" whereby Scriptural texts are analyzed by separate units, for example, according to their historical setting, the literary style of their time, and their development through the process of word-of-mouth transmission into written documents.

Latin America's Problems

PANAMA CITY (NC) - "Despite recent progress, the future of Latin America and of the Church in Latin America is filled with a multitude of problems," Auxiliary grave Bishop Edward E.Swanstrom of New York, executive director of Catholic Relief Services-National Catholic Welfare Conference, said here.

He spoke at a 10-day conference of CRS-NCWC program directors from 21 Latin American countries

"So much is needed in Latin America," he said. "Millions are plagued by near starvation, poorly clothed, forced to live in abject squalor, diseased and uneducated, victims of generations of oppression.


"Help is indeed being given - a large measure of it by American Catholics and channeled through CRS-NCWC - but unfortunately not enough.

WHAT IS NEEDED

"More food is needed, more clothing, more medicine, more health centers, more schools, especially trade schools and training courses, so that not only will immediate and urgent reeds be alleviated but the seeds of economically viable communities will be planted in the vast deprived and underdeveloped areas of Central and South America.'

The Church is playing an important and increasingly active role in improving the condition of the masses in Latin America, according to Bishop Swanstrom, thus fulfilling the social teachings of the Gospels and the directives of Pope John XXIII's encyclical, Pacem in Terris.

As an indication of this, Bishop Swanstrom pointed out that ir. 1956 there was no Latin American charities organization; today 10 years later, nearly every diocese has such an organization to aid the hungry, homeless, diseased and desti-



"The religion-centered school is not just a sort of luxury which people who are well off can afford, but a necessity for which people of modest means rightly spend their hard-earned money, because it embodies our very philosophy of education he declared.

'We want God honored and cherished in our schools not simply as an act of piety, but as the very flowering of the teaching process. We believe that schooling which ignores religion is not only earthbound; it is essentially incomplete," the cardinal continued.







CONCELEBRACION DE LA MISA EL JUEVES SANTO

Cambios en la Liturgia de la Semana Santa

El Papa Paulo VI ha aprobado nuevos cambios en la liturgia para la Semana Santa, incluyendo la introducción de la concelebración de la Misa el Jueves Santo y las revisiones en las oraciones solemnes del Viernes Santo por los otros cristianos, judíos y otros no cristianos.

Los cambios del Viernes Santo fueron hechos para remover "toda piedra" que pueda constituir, no importa cuán remotamente, un obstáculo o causa de contrariedad".

Las nuevas oraciones eliminan referencias como "herejes y cismáticos" e "infieles" y "paganos". La antigua oración por la "Unidad de la Iglesia" se llamará ahora por la "Unidad de los cristianos", pide la ayuda de Dios para "todos los hermanos que creen en Cristo". La oración antes titulada "Por la Conversión de los judíos", ahora es simplemente: "Por los judíos", mientras que la "Por la Conversión de los no creyentes" ha sido cambiada a "Por aquellos que aún uo creen en Cristo".

El cambio en la oración por el pueblo judío es la cuarta decidida por la Santa Sede en menos de dos décadas. Originalmente la oración fue por los "perfidis Iudaeis" — que era generalmente traducida como "los pérfidos judíos". En 1948 la Santa Sede sugirió que ésto debería traducirse como "no creyente" o "incrédulo" en lugar de pérfido.

El segundo cambio fue en 1955, cuando la Santa Sede restauró la antigua práctica de arrodillarse después que el diácono llamaba a oración por los judíos; desde la Edad Media era la única de las nueve oraciones por las que no se pedía que se arrodillaran. Luego en 1959, poco después de asumir el papado Juan XXIII ordenó la eliminación de la palabra "perfidis" o "incrédulo" en la oración por los judíos.





## Scalloped Oysters

11/2 cups cracker crumbs

¾ cup bread crumbs

% cup (one and one-half

sticks) butter, melted 2 tablespoons chopped

parslev 2 tablespoons chopped

Salt and freshly ground pepper 1-3 cup oyster liquid

3 tablespoons heavy cream

1½ pints oysters

Preheat the oven to 425 degrees. Mix the cracker and bread crumbs with the butter, parsley and chives. Pick over the oysters and drain, reserving the liquid. Use a shallow, six-cup baking dish, butter it and spread a thin coating of the crumb mixture over the bottom. Arrange half the oysters over the crumbs and season to taste with salt and pepper. Mix the oyster liquid with the cream and sprinkle half over the oysters. Cover with half the remaining crumbs. Repeat a layer of oysters, seasonings, liquid and crumbs. (No more than two layers should be used or the middle layer will be undercooked.) Bake until the top is brown, about twenty-five to thirty minutes. Yield: 6 servings.

## Shrimp And Apple Saidd

Serve with relishes and hot rolls

¾ pound cooked shrimps

1 teaspoon salt

2 cups diced red apples 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1/3 cup mayonnaise Lettuce cups

½ cup undiluted evaporated milk or light cream Dash of salt 1 teaspoon vanilla

In the top of a double boiler, combine the brown sugar, butter or margarine, evaporated milk, and salt. Cook over boiling water, stirring frequently, for about 15 minutes. Stir in the vanilla. Keep warm over hot water until serving time (or reheat later over hot water). If necessary, thin the sauce to a good pouring consistency with additional cream or milk. Makes about 1% cups.



## What About A Wrong Committed For Fun?

Q. I have a problem and a question all rolled up in one. Will you please help me. My 18-year-old son was out hunting and he shot a man's geese; two of them. I told him he has to confess it, and he says he won't; it was in fun. He left them lay. Now I am worried about him. I want you to tell him what to do, and how to tell it to the priest. He says he won't tell the priest such a thing.

A. I would not worry as much about his confession as about his perverted sense of justice and fun. He should confess what he has done, not because it is required for the integrity and validity of his confession, but to help him to realize that you can't seek your fun by destroying another man's property. And he should go to the owner of the geese, apologize, and pay him for the geese he destroyed. It would help make an honest and honorable man of your son.

 $\star$   $\star$   $\star$ Q. Who will be responsible before God for the burning and bombing of Negro churches in America? Some forty or more Negro churches have been bombed or burned since June.

Where churches are burned or bombed the Negro is not allowed to attend white churches. Many will not be financially able to build new churches: or will fear repeated burning or bombing if they build new ones. They are being driven from their faith; probably many souls will be lost. Who will be responsible for these souls?

A. Everyone who shares in the hatred and prejudice which prompted the bombing and burning of churches dedicated to God shares in the sin and sacrilege of this scandalous destruction, and in the harm to souls which results from it.

Everyone whose soul is devoid of a sense of justice, everyone who fails to be indignant when human rights are violated, and everyone who countenances any form of racial discrimination shares in the guilt of those bombings and burnings - and in the beatings and killings which are the shame of our nation.

Every Christian who fails to love his neighbor, without regard to race, is a liar in his own profession of faith, a traitor to Jesus Christ, and an ally of those who destroy the house of

Q. In a recent column you said, "We have recently obtained the privilege of receiving Communion under both forms for a few special occasions. with implications of more frequent occasions to come." Does ean we will be given wine to drink and bread to eat? I wish you would have explained it better.

A. When we speak of receiving Holy Communion under both forms or both kinds, bread and wine are the forms or kinds to which we refer. Keeping in mind the substantial reality of our Lord's body and blood under both forms, it is proper to say that we are given wine to drink and bread to eat.

The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy adopted by the Second Council of the Vatican on Dec. 4, 1963, after encouraging the faithful to full participation in the Mass by receiving our Lord's body in Holy Communion, noted that "Communion under both kinds may be granted when the bishops think fit, not only to clerics and religious, but also to the laity, in cases to be determined by the Apostolic See, as, for instance, to the newly ordained in the Mass of their sacred ordination, to the newly professed in the Mass of their religious profession, and to the newly baptized in the Mass which follows their Baptism."

This concession, while presently quite limited, is a remarkable departure from the strict discipline which has prevailed in the Latin rite of the Catholic Church since the thirteenth century: the discipline of giving Communion to the laity under one form only, that of bread.

are needed, for each compliments the other and thus hastens the day when Christ's prayer, that there may be one fold and one shepherd, will be realized.

"Steps To Christian Unity," Doubleday & Co., New York \$4.95, presents the thought of 24 outstanding Catholic and Protestant theologians and churchmen as to how individuals can help their churches unite. "The Catholic Way of Life," Prentice Hall, Inc., Englewood Cliffs, N.J., \$3.95, presents the distinctive features of the Catholic religion and will help truth seekers find their Church of Christendom.

The influence of Catholic literature in leading persons into the fold is shown in the conversion of Shirley May Ruble, assistant professor of English in Linfield College, McMinnville, Ore.

## Girl Taller Than Her Steady; Should They Marry?

## THE FAMILY CLINIC

My daughter is dating a Catholic boy of fine morals. But she is taller than he and she is most self-conscious of it. On dates, she always wears low heels. They are quite serious and have been going steady for four months. I am afraid that after marraige she will be awfully disgusted if she cannot wear proper attire on suitable occasions. I know this shouldn't matter but it does.

No doubt some readers will consider this problem downright hilarious. It isn't.

Years ago, while in college, the Dean persuaded me to get a student to take a blind date to a dance at a neighboring Catholic college. After practically being refused by the entire class, I persuaded a small, timid boy to do so. His date was over six feet. He was about five feet two. At the sight of her he seemed to shrink and become even smaller. The result was a miserable experience for both.

In American society the ideal male, at least so far as appearances go, is supposed to be tall, tall being near six feet or more. But whatever his height, the girl is always supposed to be less tall.

Furthermore, the folklore has some unkind things to say about a short man. Smallness in stature is supposed to mean smallness in everything. This is patently absurd, but the short fellow in our society does have a problem. So does the rather tall girl.

The problem you present is real enough, and just how serious it is depends on how seriously your daughter views it. If she really takes a dim view of her boyfriend's height, why continue to go with him? So I am inclined to believe she sees some of the fine qualities in him that you describe.

He apparently does not think differences in stature are important. Yet a male can suffer just as much embarrassment with a tall girl that a girl can with a short man. If this is the case, it is a point toward his maturity.

## Moral Qualities Most Important

One of the important things to remember about marriage is that qualities which make a good date are not identical with those that make for a good mate. The Adonis may create a sensation on the beach and devastation in marriage.

There are certain qualities parents should teach their children to look for in future husbands and wives. The more they have in common socially and religiously the greater the chances for a happy marriage.

Certainly the moral qualities of the prospective spouse are most important.

Of course, physical appearance cannot be entirely overlooked. Unless a couple can feel some sense of physical attraction toward each other, marriage is out. But this doesn't mean that a boy has to combine the physical appearance, wit and suavity of a motion picture star. Neither does a girl have to possess the physique and beauty of the reigning Hollywood queen.

As a matter of fact, few persons do possess such qualifications and those who do are not necessarily good matrimonial risks. But somehow or other these notions do influence many American young people.

A combination of romantic love and dating patterns in our society help make this so. On most dates boys and girls rarely get to know each other well. They see only a superficiality.

But long before going steady occurs, there should be some cold, sober analysis of what just each person is like.

## Must Make Decision Herself

If this is really the only problem you see with the prospective marriage of your daughter, you are a fortunate mother. t it would be wise to discuss it as calmly as possible.

Most mothers are proud of their daughters and get a vicarious satisfaction out of their appearance. I have a feeling that you think her going steady with a short man detracts from her somehow or other. I hope I am wrong, but only you can really answer that one.


Your daughter will have to make this decision herself. And she should make it soon. If they have been going steady for four months, it would appear you are quite right about it being serious.

If after continuing to see him exclusively, she should suddenly decide that his stature was of great moment and break it off, he will be deeply hurt. This is cruel and must be avoided.

All of us have known cases in which the wife was a bit taller than the husband. Sometimes it is remarked, but I have never seen or heard of a case where this proved to be a real barrier to happiness in marriage.

Perhaps what really happens in marriage when husband and wife truly love each other, is that the short man seems a very big man to his wife, and his bigness is not in stature but in character, responsibility and devotion to her.





## Two New Films Fall Short Of Their Mark

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. - "Subjective values are not as well understood in Hollywood as objective ones.

"External action, worked out via brute force or demonstrative affection, instantly reveals conflict between hate and love.

"It takes a different, more subtle motion picture technique to convey to an audience what is soing on in a man's mind, p in his heart or soul."

These thoughts from one of my columns 15 years ago, strike me as even more true to-

They certainly bear critical application to MGM's "Joy in the Morning," which co-stars Richard ("Kildare") Chamberlain and Yvette Mimieux. And to Universal's new romantic comedy-drama, "Bus Riley's Back In Town," in which Michael Parks and Ann-Margret play the chief roles.

Both these stories should provide sharp insight to problems faced by many young Americans now reaching marriage-

able age. Each film indeed has its moments. Neither has anything like the impact it should

Why? Because, I think, the creative talent responsible, in trying to communicate the vital facts, relied much too heavily upon flagrant acts.

In "Joy In the Morning," from a novel by Betty ("Tree Grows in Brooklyn'') Smith, he's attending law school. She's a tenement girl who had to stop at high school. They are, as people say, "desperately in love." Shall they make their own rules and risk the consequences, or get married and work HIS way through college?

Their decision is sensible enough; their subsequent behavior is anything but!

"Bus Riley's In Town" is from a William Inge play. Because so many other writers have had a whack at it and the character played by Ann-Margret allegedly has been distorted, Inge has insisted they drop his name from the credits.

The story concerns a typical small-town youth returning after selective service in the Navy. He must get cracking in some kind of job, make up for lost time or how can he afford to get married? Then he finds his girl has not waited. She's married money.

This has happened, of course, but a fellow like Bus Riley knows a phoney when he sees one. By allowing this girl to make a monkey of him, the script-writers damage a potentially good story.

#### THEATERS

Now that "John Goldfarb" has come home to the theaters and the golden publicity which Notre Dame almost providentially conferred upon the film, has had time to work, people who confuse one kind of gold with another, seem all set to find out for themselves.

"Goldfarb" is no finger" and that's a fact.

As long as the legal hassle between 20th Century-Fox and Notre Dame remained subjudice, instinctive liberalism restrained me from any comment on the merits of the case. Now the Court of Appeals has lifted the injunction, I merely requote, for the benefit of unsuspecting, would-be patrons, parts of a review I wrote before Notre Dame sought to have "John Goldfarb" censored.

"As a motion picture, this is bad, bad, BAD. There are repetitious exaggerations of haremscarem upon which the picture virtually chokes. It is frequently unfunny, occasionally foul . so wildly overdrawn that at half its length the film could not have failed to turn icky."

"Icky," by coincidence, is a word of disparagement once chosen by a member of the Notre Dame faculty who has often expressed strong opposition to film censorship.

"That is 'icky'," he once wrote, "which causes the spirit to shudder." Okay, I've shuddered and so, most likely, may you especially if you pay good money to see "Goldfarb."

## VIEWS ON TELEVISION

## **Priest Criticizes Quality** Of TV Religious Programs

By WILLIAM H. MOORING

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. - "Religious programs on network television are generally punk. That's spelled p-u-n-k," says Father Norman O'Connor, Director of Paulist Communications, in an article by Neil Hickey ("T.V. Guide," April 3).

One wonders how Father Ellwood Kieser, young Hollywood Paulist who presents the popular dramatic series, "Insight," is going to react to this.

And what Martin Work of the National Council of Catholic Men is going to say about it. It may, as Father O'Connor says, be true that some religious programs on TV "miss their audience entirely" because "the subject matter is above the heads or outside the interests of most TV watchers."

What all Christians had better be watching for, however, is organized bodies who would like to see all religion "outside the 'erests' of all the America. cople!

The Paulist program, "Insight," has been stronger some weeks than others. The commentary by Father Kieser, seen in clerical dress, although usually excellent, may tend to alienate a built-in resistance to the clergy.

## SEGMENT

But no-one can fairly say that "Insight", even any one segment of it, has been "punk." "The Hour of St. Francis." although often on the naive side, is not "punk." The NCCM programs, remarkably varied in scope, have favored too rigidly, liberalistic patterns of thought and opinion, but here again, the organization has presented nothing "punk."

The "TV Guide" piece presents a few prickly barbs to start out with, but the real sting comes nearer the tail. 'The controversy (launched on arbitrary questions of theatrical quality) signalizes the turning of a corner for religion on TV, Hickey explains.

He already has mentioned something on which this column sounded an alarm three months

I then warned that religious TV programming, as a licensing requirement by the FCC, had "come under fire by a Washington communications lawyer named Marcus Cohn, who, in effect, is raising another phase of the 'no-prayersin - schools - no - God - in - the-Pledge-of-Allegiance," campaign conducted in unison with the American Civil Liberties Union.

Mr. Hickey finishes his article by quoting Pope Paul VI who, on February 10 told a Rome assembly of the International Association for Radio and TV: "We believe . . . television should broadcast quality religious programs in keeping with the spiritual needs of the . . . viewers. Thus indeed . . . will television contribute to forming the conscience of mankind."

From this, it seems clear that clergy and laity should do their best to enlarge audiences and improve the quality of Catholic TV, discourage sharp-shooting from the side-lines and rally all our forces on the battle line already drawn for us. The air-ways used by broadcasters belong neither to the State, nor the networks, but to the peo-






