

Following his talk, the Pope received 70 representatives of 45 organizations throughout the world, including William Toomey of Albany, N. Y., executive board member of the National Catholic Social Action Conference. Toomey is the U.S. delegate to the constitutional assembly of the World Movement of Christian Workers, which began May 23 in Rome.

Pope Paul reduced the message of Rerum Novarum to seven "elementary propositions," which he called fundamental axioms.

"First, the Church has been thoroughly interested in the social question. Nobody can reproach it for its absences from the problem, for its timidity, superficiality or inconsistency.

CRY HEEDED

"The Church has heard the 'cry of anguish' of the worker proletariat and even made it its own, not as a tinder of hatred and revenge, but as a demand for love and justice.

The second axiom founded on Leo's encyclical, Pope Paul said, is that "the Church has proclaimed the dignity of labor of whatever kind so long as it is honest, and supported it with wonderful argumentation.

"What has the Church not said, what has it not proclaimed regarding the worker, his person, his singularity and his numerical unity in the midst of the crowd, which the Church does not call a 'mass' but a 'people'? What has the Church left unsaid about his conscience, his liberty, his inalienable and sacrosanct right to bread, to a family, to education, to spiritual hope and to a profession of religious beliefs?

"The third axiom is that the Church has made its own the principle of the progress of social justice, that is to say, of the necessity of promoting and implementing the common good, not only by its speculative doctrine (which it has maintained ever since the evangelical

Hierarchy Is Indispensable In Faith's Chain, Pope Says

VATICAN CITY (NC) - The Church's hierarchy is "normally indispensable" for those who have received their faith from the Apostles, Pope Paul VI said here.

He told those attending his weekly general audience:

"The work of the visible hierarchy is concerned with the diffusion of the Holy Spirit among members of the Church. Its ministry is not indispenable to the operation of God's mercy, which may be diffused as God pleases. But it is normally indispensable for us who have the mandate and good fortune of having received the word of God, the grace of God, the guidance of God from the Apostles — that is to say from the ministers of the religious, supernatural life emanating from Christ."

The Holy Spirit is free to exercise His "mysterious action" directly, the Pope observed. "The council affirms this ex-

pressly and repeatedly . . "Isn't the service which the Church intends to provide in teaching, sanctifying and guiding the faithful superfluous and cumbersome? Don't the faithful receive the Holy Spirit directly, without this human screen, this intermediary institution?

"This is an essential point of the Church's doctrine and it is necessary to examine Christ's

teaching. For Christ entrusted the fulfilment of His work among men to two different factors: the Holv Spirit and the Apostles. He promised to send the Holy Spirit and He sent His Apostles.

"These two missions both come from Christ. The indisputable design of the divine Founder of the Church intends that the Church be built by apostles and vivified by the Holy Spirit. Apostles build the body of the Church whose soul is the Spirit of Christ, and these two different agents are so linked to each other that St. Augustine affirms in his famous and incisive words that the work of one is the extension of the other: 'Nothing participates in the Spirit of Christ except the Body of Christ . . . Do you wish therefore to find life in the Spirit of Christ? Then be in the Body of Christ.' (Tract on John the Evangelist).

"And again: 'The Christian need fear nothing so much as to be separated from the Body of Christ. If in fact he is separated from the Body of Christ He is not His member; and if he is not His member, he is not nourished by His Spirit.' "

Church has recognized the right to form trade unions. It has defended and promoted it, overcoming a certain theoretical and historical preference for corporative forms (guilds) and mixed associations. It took cognizance not only of the strength of numbers which the fact of unionizing was bound to exert upon a society oriented toward democracy, but also of the fruitfulness of the new order which could spring from workers' unions - an awareness on the part of the worker of his dignity and his position in the social framework, a sense of discipline and solidarity, a spur to professional and cultural advancement, a capacity to participate in the productive cycle no longer as a mere executive instrument, but to some extent at least as a sharer in responsibility and an interested participant as well."

The sixth axiom, the Pope said, is the "most discussed and most difficult of all of them. The Church has not and cannot adhere to social, ideological and political movements which, in finding their origins and strength in Marxism, have maintained its negative principles and methods, which result from the incomplete and therefore false conception of man, history and the world which is typical of radical Marxism.

"The atheism which it professes and promotes is not in favor of the scientific concept of the cosmos and of civilization, but is a blindness which man and society will have to pay for in the end with the gravest consequences. The materialism which derives from it exposes man to experiences and temptations which are extremely harm'ul. It extinguishes his true spirituality and his transcendent hope."

Bishop McNamara Dead; Headed Diocese Of Joliet

ROCHESTER, Minn. (NC) - Old Cathedral College, now Bishop Martin D. McNamara, known as Quigley Preparatory 68, first bishop of Joliet, Ill., Seminary North. He also died at St. Mary's Hospital here following heart surgery. Three years ago, following heart surgery here, he was on the point of death for several days. He never fully recovered. He had been at St. Joseph's Hospital in Joliet for 111/2 months prior to his recent entry to St. Mary's, Rochester.

Martin Dewey McNamara, the seventh of eight children, was born in Chicago. He began his studies for the priesthood at studied at St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore, and at the Catholic University of America, Washington. In 1922 he was ordained in Chicago's Holy Name Cathedral by George Cardinal Mundelein.

In 1948 he was named to head the newly created diocese of Joliet, Ill. He was consecrated with Bishop William O'Connor of Springfield, Ill., and Bishop William Cousins, now Archbishop of Milwaukee, by Samuel Cardinal Stritch in 1949.



During the Mass, Father Keogh told other members of the clergy and seminarians that "the occasion of a jubilee is, like retreat time, a time for praver. a time for recollecting. a time for remembering; a time for regretting and a time for rejoicing.

"Were it not for the thought that in spite of our unworthiness. God Himself calls us to riests to work with Him well as for Him," Father Keogh said. "And what a wealth of grace He has given us that more than supplies for our deficiencies. If it were not for His help our hearts would falter and our feet would fail."

Emphasizing that a jubilee is a time for rejoicing, Father Keogh pointed out that memories of frustrations and setbacks mingle with those times and opportunities when "we have extended helping hands to those in need in so many walks of life. Time for rejoicing when we recall the honorable company in which we walk, brothers to the mighty and the immortal dead. "We ask the prayers," Fa-

The 25th anniversary of their ther Keogh said, "of all that the future years may be more blessed than those gone by. That the Wings of God's protecting providence may always overshadow us. That we may always walk in the shadows of the Immaculate Queen of Heaven. That we may follow in the footsteps of the saints whose names we bear."

At the conclusion of the Mass during which the seminary choir sang, Bishop Carroll extended his congratulations and the felicitations of other priests in the Diocese of Miami to the jubilarians, emphasizing that for the past 25 years the faithful in Florida have benefitted from their ministrations.

Bishop Carroll outlined in detail the directives of the Vatican Council decree on the Priesthood, pointing out that the primary work and duty of a priest is the proclaiming of the word of God.

"There was a time when the priest of a parish cared only for the needs of the Catholics within a confined area," Bishop Carroll declared.

'We are living in a new day and new age. It is the obligation of the priest to be concerned not only with those in his parish. He must be concerned with others, with their spiritual well-being.'

Spiritual Life Institute To Open Sessions Today

Conference of the Spiritual Life Institute of America opens today (Friday) at Marymount College and continues through Sunday, May 29.

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CCD Teachers Presented Awards By Bishop Carroll

Bishop Coleman F. Carroll has issued a plea to the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine workers of the Diocese to "fulfill the obligations" they have assumed "through prayer and study."

Bishop Carroll made the plea during a talk to CCD members from throughout the Diocese who attended ceremonies held at the Cathedral last Sunday.

During the ceremonies, probationary and permanent CCD teaching certificates were presented to the teachers by Bishop Carroll.

Among recipients of the certificates were 12 Sisters, 49 students at St. John Vianney Minor Seminary and 27 Spanish-speaking instructors.

More than 300 persons were eligible to receive the CCD awards for having successfully completed a course in Doctrine and Methods of teaching religion.

In his talk, Bishop Carroll reminded his listeners that if they were living in Cuba or some other Communist - controlled country they would not have the opportunity to do CCD work.

For this reason, he said, "your work should not be taken lightly."

"All of you have the obligation," he stressed, "to be Apostles - to bring the teachings of Christ to others.'

Pointing out that the "prime obligation" of a bishop of a Diocese is "to teach," Bishop Carroll declared that in this work the bishop needs not only the assistance of priests but "in this day and age also needs the assistance of zealous, devoted lay men and lay women.'

Those responsible for carrying out the CCD program, said Bishop Carroll, "feel that a special type of training is necessary now for those who teach CCD classes."

"This is different," he explained, from the type of for "teachers who training teach in Catholic schools."

He emphasized that in performing their teaching duties the CCD workers were helping "to lighten a burden and responsibility that is primarily the bishop's."

Bishop Carroll urged his listeners to "continue their genuine interest" in CCD activities "par- * ticularly by way of study.'

Citing the fact that only 25 per cent of Catholic boys and girls of high school age in the Diocese were in Catholic schools, he stressed that more CCD workers were "greatly needed."

Bishop Carroll pointed out that in this Diocese, a large part of the "work of catechizing must of necessity fall upon the shoulders of the lay people." He called on the congregation

"to urge others to undertake this important work."

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
Blessing Of Statue At Marian Center









EDITOR'S COMMENT

Are Americans Becoming A Nation Of Knockers?

Those concerned about the sharp criticism of the Church by Catholics ought to see the larger picture and come to realize that we Americans generally "by all odds have become the most self critical nation in existence."

So says James Reston of the New York Times. He claims: "The critics have taken over the country and everything, we are told, is falling apart. The American automobile is a wreck. The American bathroom is out of date. The American university is in revolt . . . Cries of anguish about Vietnam, Latin America, China, Johnson, McNamara, Rusk, Fullbright, the poverty program, and the Republican party. But elsewhere and despite all this we must be doing something right."

For good or ill, this is the spirit of the times, but it does wear on the nerves after a while. Everything has to be reexamined and re-appraised. Nothing is sacred. Nothing can be taken for granted. Downgrade the whole list, and see what survives. It's weakness to praise the good points; condemn what is wrong or unjust or too old, and watch things get better.

Perhaps Mr. Reston's suggestion ought to be taken seriously, namely, to have an off season for hunting politicians. . . a couple of days or even a week each month. While we're at it, let's plug for a comparable off season for criticism of religion, God, the spiritual life, celibacy and authority.

Racism Toppled Into Dust

Whatever one thinks of the outcome of Tuesday's contest for the Democratic nomination for governor, one aspect of the day's results should be welcome news to every citizen. This is the fact that racism was dealt a stunning blow.

After studying the returns, analysts are strong in conviction that the race issue as a statewide political weapon has disappeared. Mr. Burns thrust ancient racial fears before the citizens of this state as a magnet for votes, and even in the rural areas where, it was believed, racism could be a powerful factor, the people did not buy it.


No one should be naive enough to conclude that racial problems are now about to be easily solved or that the issue will never be raised in less important elections in certain areas. But at least the citizens of Florida proved they have a sense of responsibility towards their neighbor and can use mature judgment in refusing to allow the color of skin to influence their preference for a candidate.

A Towering Man Of Peace

Feelings of frustration arising from the war in Vietnam are reflected in the latest Gallup poll. If the Buddhist-backed military forces and Premier Ky's government are going to fight on a large scale among themselves, the majority of Americans, according to the poll, want U.S. forces to pull out completely. And if the South Vietnamese decide to quit fighting altogether, most U.S. citizens are in favor of our troops coming home.

Of all the events in recent years which have been shrouded in mystery and defy clear analysis, perhaps most of us would select the Vietnam situation as the least understandable. Until this recent poll, we seemed hopelessly divided on all issues related to our policies there. Close friends and even families disagreed sharply on the basic issue of whether or not we belong there.

It seems now that the internal bickering of the South Vietnamese is uniting our public opinion at last into a hope of withdraw-

al. But actually this does not solve the larger problem. It surely offers no guarantee of peace.

Perhaps the clouds of pessimism are settling down over us most of all because all the promising peace hopes of the past year or two seem to have been dashed. Even Pope Paul's peace efforts, which were watched with so great interest and care by people across the earth, seem to have been stymied by the unwillingness of North Vietnam to negotiate.

Despite the frustration of it all, it seems certain that Pope Paul has emerged as a universally accepted peace mediator. The list of the men who have conferred with him on the cessation of the war in Vietnam indicates clearly that he is now accepted as a powerful force for good in world affairs.

Perhaps the only glimmer of light in the increasing gloom is the consoling fact that sectional differences in the free world are being forgotten in a united effort to bring peace to all men.

VATICAN CITY (NC) - Troubled by the deteriorating situation in Viet Nam, Pope Paul VI again asked for prayers for the restoration of peace.

Speaking from his apartment window to the Sunday noon crowd gathered in St. Peter's Square, the Pope referred to the "painful situation" revealed in current news from Viet Nam.

"We must pray," he said, "that there may be no further divisions and no further struggles to afflict this beloved and so sorely tried country, and that concord, order and finally peace may be happily granted it."

On this Memorial Day as we come to honor the War Dead, the flag of our nation will be flying over the graves of thousands of veterans. Some graves will be old; others fresh with the recent victims of Vietnam.

Though disease, accidents and age must take their toll, we cannot but be saddened to see the flag of glory flying over the graves of young men and women beause of the slaughter necessitated by war. Before Vietnam there was a Korea; before Korea; World Wars II and I; conflict, strife and war because civilized man has not learned to live with his fellow man.

That nations should be at odds with one another is no surprise when we consider families, who collectively make up the nation are frequently torn with strife and dissension.

If in this basic unit of society the family, we would learn to observe the message of Christ - the message of love for one another - then Memorial Day could be a day of honoring those soldiers of life who through their example, not the shedding of their blood, have made this a better world in which to live.

In tune with this thought we find the most excellent statement ever to be written to have come from the pen of one named Sirach who lived about 200 years before Christ. Sirach, praising the great Ancestors of Israel could have envisaged the type of society to be founded by Christ where love must someday flourish in the hearts of all men. Let us listen to the words of this great sage who under divine inspiration composed this statement, more than appropriate for this and all Memorial Days.

Idiotic Attacks On Devotions To Mary

Among the vatniks, the avant garde in radical post-council thinking, downgrading devotion to Mary is now "in." You hear about them pub-

licly pulling a rosary apart or digging a hole to bury the neighborhood's beads. All of this more or less pure corn is meant to symbolize melodrame lly the MSGR. WALSH end this an-

cient devotion to Mary.

Their sensitive nature is offended by the sight of a statue of Mary in church. And the very idea of people going to church to pray by means of a novena is rather revolting to them. When "Novena Notes" recently discontinued publication after a generation of contact with the devotees of the Sorrowful Mother Novena, some of the way-out people were delighted, as if at long last the first rays of the era of enlightenment had pierced our granite skulls.

These oddball doings are scandalizing many, who are not familiar with the characteristic nutty approach of extremists. It is faintly reminiscent of the goings-on in the Protestant Reformation, when Mary became a target of ridicule and vandalism. Statues and images were destroyed, her shrines pillaged, and the Christian barbarians expected a reward from God and man for being so orthodox.

This is not to say that the vatniks necessarily are attempting to deny the Church's dogmas on Our Lady. What bugs them for the moment is devotion, not doctrine. For a variety of reasons they feel something dramatic and radical must be done about devotion to her. All

that some of them can think up for the moment, however, is a program of ridicule in what they think is a humorous, but reverent vein.

SOME ABUSES

They are indeed right when they claim there are abuses in devotion to Mary. This came out often in the council talks of the Bishops from almost every part of the world. In some places among those with little or no education, there is considerable superstition related to Mary. No one can deny this. Missionaries recognize that some private devotions are artificial and shallow and mechanical, like the prayer wheels in India. And even in the U.S., among those who have had instruction in religion, there is no doubt that some, perhaps many, have devotions to Our Lady which are sentimental, nondoctrinal and indeed a scandal to sincere Protestants.

Pope Paul time and again has referred to this and has called on us to "purify and embellish the forms of our Marian piety, never allowing it to be detached from its doctrinal sources, but finding in them the norms and stimulus for pouring itself forth in genuine expression."

However, the recent rash of idiotic protest against Marian devotions indicates that the vatniks want no half measures here. They are once again trying to throw the baby out with the bath water. Why? There may be several explanations.

Some sincerely are so intent on emphasizing the supreme importance of the eucharistic celebration that they want all other "distractions" done away with. They want nothing in the Church except the altar of sac-

rifice, and the very idea of one reciting the rosary during Mass or kneeling before a statue does violence to their sense of fit-

MAJOR PROBLEM

Others are motivated by ecumenical considerations. They are deeply involved in the quest of unity with all Christians and want to avoid anything that can wound the sensibilities of our Protestant friends. They realize that a major problem in ecumenism is the person and cult of Mary. Father Walter Burghardt, S.J. emphasized this latter point when he said: "Save for the Catholic concept of the Church, the single theological issue which most effectively strangles the ecumenical dialogue is the Catholic vision of Mary. She is the 'wall' if only because she is, for the Protestant, the visible symbol of Catholic 'idolatry'; the Roman abandonment of scripture, of history and of Christ . . ."

Father Burghardt is not exaggerating.

Proof of this "wall" is found in the admissions of many notable converts to Catholicism. Gilbert Chesterton, for instance. said: "The instant I remembered the Catholic Church, I remembered her. When I tried to forget the Catholic Church, I tried to forget her; when I finally saw what was nobler than my fate, the freest and hardest of all my acts of freedom, it was in front of a gilded and very gaudy little image of her in the port of Brindisi, that I promised the things I would do, if I returned to my own land."

Charles Stoddard, a confirm-

ed agnostic for many years,

said that this greatest difficulty in the long painful process of conversion was not the doctrine of penance or indulgences, but the prejudices of his childhood against the reverence paid to Marv.

Another trend today, and a most important one, is to center all spirituality on Christ and to emphasize the Scriptures far more than in recent centuries. Some have mistakenly interpreted this so literally that they feel no attention at all should be directed to Mary and the saints.

'REVIVE DEVOTION'

Pope Paul in a magnificent talk to the bishops at the opening of the second session stressed the need to center everything on Christ. But then and many times since he has reaffirmed the need of devotion to Mary. He stated that the Church would be impoverished and compromised without devoted and reasonable honor rendered to Mary. Just three months ago he said, "It is, therefore, necessary that we revive our devotion to Our Lady, seeking the truths which give it life in Biblical origins . . ."

Downgrading devotion to Mary, therefore, needless to say, is not the intention of the Holy Fathers or the Bishops. Some have interpreted wrongly the debate in Rome on how the council should treat the question of Mary — whether to have a separate schema on her role or to include it as one chapter in the constitution on the Church. The final decision to make Mary's role part of the great document on the Church has given her new honor and prestige.

But this interesting question needs more space.

ures, too. In the past in these columns we have narrated a few instances of wayward boys or girls who were straightened out by the zeal and good works of the people who staff the institutions administered by your Catholic Welfare Bureau. These were children who, though they had the innate goodness of character, were tempted to seek what they thought were rosier paths or greener fields.

While each presented problems pertinent to his or her own It is usually comforting to family life and environment. somewhere inside each there remained a spark sufficient for the fires of love to be ignited into a glowing ember of truth and understanding.

But like the Good Shepherd who abandoned 99 of His good sheep to find one stray, so do we find that there may be one in a hundred of these lambs of ours who needs special attention.

Yet, we also find that perhaps in one of a hundred cases processed by your Catholic Welfare Bureau, the lamb turns out to be a wolf ... one who knows Op and Pop who is "in" and "camp" and sometimes "beat" and uses vile language not even found in questionable paperbacks . . . one who can hurt and scar his or her parents and teachers.

END USUALLY GOOD

love and experience are bestowed upon this one recalcitrant youngster. Generally, the even-

tual response is gratifying and heart-warming . . . and quite productive of good citizens and soldiers of Christ. But, as the saying goes, "You can't win 'em all," . . . and we are then faced with another problem: what to do with a most unruly, obstreperous child who will not respond to all the balm, the pleas, the training and the inducements of those who are responsible for his rehabilitation?

What would you do? Abandon him and say, "We

127 ... or — Continue to try with every means and facility at your command to bring the child into line?

Certainly the latter is the right course. It has worked with the majority of children. But there comes a time when there seems to be no recourse . . . no answer . . . to the antagonism that misfortune has so deeply rooted in some of our unfortunate, dependent children.

So, try as we may . . . we sometimes fail. Even the exposure to psychiatrists is fruitless. We seem to reach a sort of Berlin Wall, a mental block that pleading or probing cannot penetrate . . . and we have only one recourse: your prayers. If you, like so many others of us, have had occasion to realize or benefit from the power of prayer . . . then you know full well why we solicit yours in such times of our seeming failures.

Oh, let's not dwell on the biblical histories of the many sinners who turned their lives around. We are all too familiar with how Saint Augustine, after a misspent youth, grew to be one of the giants of the Church: how Saint Paul who so persecuted Christ, became one of the Church's leading Apostles; how Mary Magdalen was restored, by Christ Himself, from evil ways to a life of Sainthood . . . and the countless others.

SAINT REBELLED But let us never forget there

was a Saint in Heaven who also spur: Christ's death gave life rebelled. He took charge of a legion of Fallen Angels. Thankfully, their departure made room for us in heaven for our own eternal bliss. But even they who were blessed by existence in the sight and dazzling glory of God in Heaven's bounty and its eternal happiness, chose to rebel - to the point of defying their Creator and their God, and suffered expulsion and damnation for all time.

So if a few of our mortals ... a few of our own children choose to rebel, we must keep trying to provide them with a sense of true values and an appreciation of the infinite goodness of God.







One day Our Blessed Lord was seated at the base of one of the great columns of the Temple of Jerusalem. From that point of vantage, He could see the 13 trumpets (not musical trumpets) which received alms from the pious and the devout. He probably saw thousands dropping in coins, but there was only one person who attracted Him so much that He spoke about it to the Apostles and they, in turn, wrote it in the Gospel. It was a poor widow who put into the trumpet the two smallest coins in the realm as her offering. Our Blessed Lord said "She gave all that she had." Evidently Our

Blessed Lord judges not so much by what we give, but what we have left. She had nothing left; therefore, she gave everything.

A beautiful example of the Gospel widow is the following letter written by a daughter about her widowed mother: "My mother receives a pension each month from the Government for my father's services during the first World War. She wishes to donate a portion of this over a five-year period to educate a young man for the priesthood. Her entire life has been dedicated to helping others to find the true faith. Although partially crippled all her life, she reared eight children and, with limited finances and time, was able to personally convert an entire family of colored people, a grandmother, a mother and eight children. Recently, when the grandmother died and the family was without money to provide a grave, mother insisted that this woman be buried in our family plot with my father and brother. Now, though completely disabled with arthritis, she keeps in touch with this family and encourages them to live up to their faith and to spread it to others of their race. Once, though in constant pain from arthritis, she called on every home in our parish begging funds to dress a First Communion class in the Missions. Through sheer determination, her efforts resulted in 60 little girls being dressed well to receive Our Lord for the first time. I know she would be horrified if she knew that I had related this to you, or if anyone were to think that she had done anything out of the ordinary. She has taught us all our lives 'take the first step and Almighty God will do the rest. You have no idea what just a little bit of kindness can do'."

Our powers of dispossession are greater than our powers of possession. We can never get the whole world into our hands, but we can wash our hands of the whole world. That is why poverty, the spirit of poverty and the vow of poverty, create an emptiness which God can fill. We can never get any one of our readers to put his arms around the globe and say, "I love everyone," until like Mary he puts his arms around Christ and says, "I love You." You cannot put your arms around Christ if they are clutching the things of this world. It does not matter how much you have. It does not matter how much you give. It does matter when you give how much you have left - how much room you have left for God. God Love You!







'Preach Gospel,' Young Orators Urged

Bishop Coleman F. Carroll urged contestants in the National Catholic Forensic League tournament to make "the teachings of Christ known to all."

Bishop Carroll pointed out that the decree of the Second Vatican Council on the lay apostolate made it clear that everyone has an obligation to "preach the Gospel."

In his talk to the contestants following a Pontifical Low Mass he celebrated at the opening of the three-day tournament, he explained they could do this "by example, by dialogue and by discussion.'

Site of the tournament was the Americana Hotel. The finals in the speech competition were held last Saturday.

Bishop Carroll told his listeners they had a duty to "Christianize as best you can the community in which you live."

"It is not only enough to be concerned with saving your own soul," he asserted, but you also should be concerned with the welfare of the souls of others."

"You must take care of your brother in need," Bishop Carroll stressed," when his rights are denied him, when he is rejected because of his color or when he is looked down on because he is a refugee.'

He reminded the Forensic League contestants that because of the special training they had received in public speaking they would be better able to carry "the teachings of Christ into the marketplace."

In a talk delivered at the Mass, Father Patrick S. Mc-Donnell, diocesan superintendent of high schools, said there was a special need today for "articulate Catholic leaders."

"Whereas before," he said, we had only to develop the Christian man, today we must develop the Christian man who can, in turn, Christianize the world."

"Are you willing," Father Mc-Donnell challenged his listeners, "to go out into society and not accept it but change it - are you willing to get involved in social justice?"

Father McDonnell especially urged the high school youths to develop "sincerity" as an important character trait.

During a banquet held at the Americana on the opening day of the tournament program, Judge Mallory Horton was the main speaker. More than 700 contestants and their moderators attended the banquet.

In his talk, Judge Horton said "there can be no greater use of your talent or art of good articulation than to explain and teach those among us the meaning of the true Church and the true Faith.

"What greater reward and satisfaction," he asked, "can one receive than to know that, through his ability to explain and teach, a single soul may have accepted Christ or returned to the Church."

Judge Horton called on the high school speech contestants not to "emulate the Biblical character who was given one talent by his master.

"Use it, don't bury it," he said.

Judge Horton said that "although most any field of human endeavor requires some form of communication, there are, however, certain vocations in which good articulation is a must."


He listed as being among these the vocations to being a newscaster on radio or TV, a lawyer or a teacher.

"Last but probably most important," he declared, "is the ability of those choosing the religious life to properly and adequately express themselves."



Como tantos miles de cubanos, el General Generoso tuvo que abandonar la patria a la que ayudó a liberar con las armas en la mano. Su avanzada edad le impedía lanzarse de nuevo la manigua para arrojar del poder a los que hubían entregado su isla a un nuevo coloniaje y vino al destier o de Miami, para trabajar incansablemente por su Cuba.

Antes de venir al destierro, el anciano prócer independentista tuvo que buscar albergue en un convento católico de La Habana para eludir los vejámenes de una dictadura que lo despreció después de que él se negó a rendirle pleitesía.

Aqui, se le veia frecuentemente en la iglesia de San Juan Bosco, su parroquia, donde oraba ante la imagen de la Virgen de la Caridad del Cobre, Patrona de Cuba, de la que era tan devoto. En esa, su iglesia, le fueron rendidas las honras fúnebres, en ceremonia en la que ofició su párroco, el padre Emilio Vallina.

Su muerte fue una batalla más ganada por el mambí para su patria. A las cuatro de la tarde del lunes, el exilio cubano se unía en oración por la patria en torno al féretro que guardaba sus restos mortales.


Las naves de la iglesia de San Juan Bosco no pudieron

dar cabida al numeroso público. En las calles que circundan el templo se agolpaban centenares de cubanos. El tránsito de la importante calle Flagler se vió interrumpido por horas mientras el cadáver era trasladado de la funeraria cubana Rivero a la iglesia y de allí al Cementerio Católico de Miami.

Tan pronto como el Padre Vallina, párroco del desaparecido general supo que el cadáver sería trasladado a Miami lo comunicó al Obispo Coleman F. Carroll, quien inmemediatamente ofreció el Cementerio Católico para que sus restos descansaran en esa necrópolis que acoge ya los restos de más de un millar de cubanos que han muerto en el destierro.

Más de mil automóviles se unieron al cortejo fúnebre. Quizás la más grande demostración de duelo vista en la ciudad de Miami. Una demostración de unidad del pueblo cubano en el exilio, rindiendo postrer tributo al viejo mambí, que, con palabras de el Padre Emilio Vallina en la oración fúnebre pronunciada en la iglesia de San Juan Bosco, "seguirá desde el lugar que en el cielo tiene reservado, velando y orando por la Cuba que tanto amó".

El último general de la Guerra de Independencia de Cuba, Generoso Campos Marquetti, ha muerto en el destierro. Tuvo que abandonar la tierra que ayudó a libertar y muere trabajando por su patria en Washington. Sus restos descansan en el Cementerio Católico de Miami.

Episcopado Dominicano Publica Pastoral Sobre las Elecciones

En un clima de intensas pugnas, pero en un ambiente de amplias garantías, la República Dominicana se dispone a encaminarse al ritmo democrático a través de las elecciones que tendrán lugar el primero de junio.

El Gobierno provisional del doctor Héctor García Godoy se ha esforzado para ofrecer al pueblo dominicano una demostración de que puede decidir. en forma civilista su futuro.

Estableciendo claramente que la posición de la Iglesia de la República Dominicana es de estricta neutralidad en las presentes circunstancias, el obispado de este país ha escrito una carta pastoral expresamente con motivo de las próximas elecciones.

A través de ella se exhorta al pueblo a sostener el gobierno que resulte elegido el próximo mes de junio y manifiestan que es deber del gobierno convertirse en el guardián del bienestar público y lo invta a respetar la opinión de cada ciudadano.

La carta advierte que no es misión de la Iglesia, ni de ningún eclesiástico intervenir en la solución del problema dominicano con fórmulas de carácter político, y que la Iglesia desaprueba la violencia como medio de resolver los problemas que aquejan a la sociedad dominicana.

Señala luego que es deber del gobierno robustecer la administración imparcial de la justicia en los tribunales, como medio de lograr una paz justa para todos. Asimismo, que las armas solamente deben estar en manos de personas legítimamente autorizadas.

Los obispos hacen referencia a que el odio de clases llevaría indefectiblemente a la ruina al país y que la Iglesia anhela que todos los ciudadanos, sin distinción alguna, puedan vivir dignamente, disponiendo de alimento, techo, educación y trabajo, dentro de un sistema de instituciones libres para la formación de la juventud. Expresa también la Pasto-

ral, que la Iglesia reconoce que es necesaria la existencia de los partidos políticos y que la participación en la política constituye para los fieles un deber propio y que deben inscribirse en partidos que defiendan una auténtica política nacional; recomendando al mismo tiempo que los católicos tienen el deber de votar, especialmente en las actuales circunstancias.

Las fuerzas se dividen entre Juan Bosch, el derrocado presidente que cuenta con el respaldo de la juventud y los sectores que se mueven hacia la izquierda —algunos de ellos de franca militancia marxista-y el otro candidato. J. Balaguer, que ha presentado un programa de gobierno que contempla amplias reivindicaciones sociales y reformas a fondo en la estructura dominicana, con una base bien definida, a diferencia del programa de Bosch, muy nebuloso.

El segundo cuenta con el respaldo de la población madura, del hombre mayor de 30 años del campesino y el hombre de negocios. Un tercer candidato, Rafael Bonelly, que ya ocupó la presidencia en forma provisional a la caída de Trujillo, aunque goza de grandes simpatías no parece tener la menor oportunidad y se espera que sus fuerzas se unan a las de Balaguer.



• Paulo VI Censura a Gobierno Polaco

Con toda claridad el Papa Paulo VI reprobó (mayo 15) al régimen comunista de Polonia por la interferencia sistemática que realizó a los actos que se prepararon para conmemorar el milenio de cristiandad en aquel país de detrás del telón de avero.

En un extenso sermón que predicó durante la misa especial celebrada en la Basílica de San Pedro para conmemorar el milenio, el Papa se expresó con franqueza sobre la creciente pugna entre la Iglesia y el Estado de Polonia. Unas 10,000 personas colmaban el templo, la mitad de ellas polacas venidas de distintas partes del mundo para asistir al Santo Oficio.

"Ne creo que la celebración del milenio del carácter cristiano del pueblo polaco pueda ser sospechosa de antinacionalismo o reivindicatoria de privilegios teocráticos o de arcaicas formas políticas o sociales", expresó. Luego añadió. "La celebración debe considerarse como la expresión y la inspiración de un pueblo creyente en una auténtica libertad civil y religiosa, debido a una característica tradición secular y muy honrosa. Así es como entendemos que 'as ceremonias conmemorativas no pueden, en realidad, ser contrarias al bien y al progreso de una sociedad moderna sino que se debe considerar que son en su honor y en su provecho".

Su Santidad manifestó también que había deseado viajar a Polonia en respuesta a la invitación del Cardenal Stefan Wyszynski, y se declaró "muy desilusionado" porque el gobierno polaco no ha permitido que haga el peregrinaje a Varsovia.

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Rosemary-Scented Foods Are Alluring

"The way to a man's heart is through his stomach." But how do we plan this campaign, to get his taste buds and stomach to take favorable notice of some special treat you've cooked just for him?

If food is beautifully seasoned, even the most absentminded man will look alive and say, "M-M-M-! What smells so good?" Just a pinch of rosemary, for instance, gives delightful aroma to a wide variety of dishes - fruit cups, canned chicken soup, marinated seafood, roast lamb, spoon bread, fancy molded fruit salads.

Rosemary leaves look like little one-inch pine needles and are available nationally only in whole form. Measure them first, then crush, using the thumb of one hand against the palm of recipes serving 8 to 12 which the other as a sort of convenient mortar and pestle. It's one

Fresh Rhubarb Rosemary Parfaits 1 cup fresh orange juice

31/2 lbs. diced fresh rhubarb

of the more potent herbs, so, when you're learning to use rosemary in some of your own tried-and-true recipes, try the flavor power of 1/4 teaspoonful per 6 servings before adding more. It takes between 10 and 15 minutes simmering to release the full aroma of rosemary.

As you will note by reading the recipes which follow, rosemary can be used with many other kinds of spices and herbs, especially baking spices such as cinnamon, cloves, ginger. Add it confidently to pepper, and dehydrated onion and garlic products, mustard, etc. - those spices ordinarily used in meat cookery.

What with Father's Day, graduations and bridal showers, June is a festive month. Home economists of the American Spice Trade Association suggest the following rosemary-scented may help you in planning luncheon or party menus.



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Her Mistake: Marrying Too Young

THE FAMILY CLINIC

I made the mistake of marrying too young and after three and a half years our marriage ended. I am twenty-four years of age and recently met a widower of thirty. He is the nicest man I have ever known. I like him very much. I want to do things for him and help him any way I can and most of all I like to be with him. I never loved my husband and I have the insecure feeling that I cannot love anybody and will never love anybody. Is this possible? I do not want to hurt this man, I respect him and if this is my case, I do not want to continue my association.

Before any effort is made to answer the general question you raised, Helen, I think it would be wise to become a bit introspective about your own life. You were married at the age of about 20, which is not quite young by today's standards. After 3¹/₂ years your marriage was broken. I am not surprised that you are anxious, fearful and somewhat insecure about the whole matter of love relationship. You may have suffered, what is commonly called a "traumatic" experience and this does leave marks on our personality.

Put into somewhat plainer English, you may be on the rebound and the first person you meet looks particularly good to you. You say this man is the nicest of all the men you have ever known. I wonder if you ever said or thought that about your former husband? When we are in love, or when we think we are in love, we are not likely to be very objective.

But this is the second point I would like to make. Don't permit what seems to be a great contrast between this man and your husband to overwhelm you. The difference may be somewhat less than you think. Third, the fact that you enjoy being with him would be some indication that you may be in love with him. But nowhere in your letter do you raise some of the very important issues that you will have to face before your association continues at all.

Church Regulations

If you were married in the Church, if the marriage were not annulled but you simply obtained a civil divorce, then you cannot remarry while your husband is living. You say nothing about this man's religion, and I have no way of determining whether he is a Catholic or not. But in the event he is a Catholic, as a widower he would be free to marry, but he would not be free to marry a divorcee. If you are really anxious not to injure him in any way, then if your status is that of a divorcee, I would suggest that you break off the association.

Some readers may consider this a harsh judgment but I would refer you to one of your parish priests for confirmation of what I have just written. If you are a Catholic and sincerely believe in the teachings of the Church, such a marriage is going to be a source of constant concern and anxiety for you. If this man with whom you believe you are in love is a Catholic the same will be true of him.

However, in all fairness to you, you do not mention the possibility of marriage. And yet it seems to crop out between every line. If this feeling is reciprocated by him I feel that marriage between the two of you would be inevitable. Therefore, I have raised the caution above.

Your major question is whether or not there are persons who cannot love anybody. Yes, it is possible.

Effect Of Urban Living

Urban living seems to make people somewhat more ego cencentric or self-centered than rural living did. Recently, we heard of the murder of a young girl in New York City whose screams had aroused some 39 persons but not one of whom even called the police. Again and again we read of occasions where older people or young girls or boys are attacked or beaten on the street in the presence of witnesses without anyone's raising a hand to assist. Certainly, the spirit of brotherly love and the al of a good Samaritan seem to be rather conspicious by their frequent absence in our society.

People must learn how to love. Most of this is accomplished during our childhood days within our own families. We learn to love because we have been loved by a mother, a father, probably grandparents and very likely brothers and sisters. Conjugal love is somewhat different but this too is learned partly by our observation or our own parents who teach us what the meaning of conjugal love should be in their dealings, words and actions. When each is willing to make sacrifices for the other, when each thinks deeply and movingly of each other, children are aware of it. When they do not, children are likewise aware of it.

There are people who simply do not know how to love and part of the answer is that they have never learned how to do so. I don't believe such cases are utterly beyond help. I am not certain whether or not you fall into this category but you seem to think you do. Hence it would be wise to seek professional help on this matter and I refer both to the moral and the emotional levels. I suggest you see one of the parish priests, a physician or someone in Catholic Social Service. But don't leap to conclusions before you are more certain of your position.


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
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

Two-Part Series On Church To Be Televised On Ch. 4

"The Church: New Structures, New Voices," a two-part filmed documentary series will be seen on the Look Up and Live, program of the CBS-TV Network, on Sunday, June 5, and Sunday, June 12.

("Look Up and Live" is carried over Channel 4, WTVJ, at 10:30 a.m. each Sunday.)

Shot in Montreal, Oklahoma City and Elyria, Ohio, the series reports on experiments in democratic procedures in the Catholic Church - and on favorable and unfavorable local reactions.

Typical experiments include plans for a representative Little Council (based on Vatican Council II) in Oklahoma City and the Organization of St. Maurice, a Montreal parish in w^{1.} h the pastor has turned final authority in all temporal matters to the parishioners.

The Oklahoma Little Council has the blessing of Bishop Victor Reed, but has aroused bitter opposition among local conservative Catholic groups. The programs include interviews with Catholic spokesmen for the various shades of opposition to current diocesan policies.

The portion from St. Mary's parish in Elyria, Ohio, tells the story of Catholic lay theologian, Don Nicodemus, and his work in organizing a parish senate to form policy subject only to the pastor's approval.

In Montreal, Emile Cardinal Leger, in a comprehensive interview, explains the reorganization of his archdiocese for the purpose of involving lower clergy and laity at every level of decision-making and administration.

"The Church: New Structures, New Voices" is produced by CBS News in cooperation with the National Council of Catholic Men.

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

A. There are two traditions about the death, or dormition, of the Blessed Virgin: The more probable one, that she died in Jerusalem, where her reputed grave can be visited; the other that she died at Ephesus. in Asia Minor, where she had gone with St. John.

The shrine of the Virgin Mary at Ephesus is, indeed, held in veneration by the Moslem people; and it is my understanding that research and reconstruction is now being made in that area, especially on the great church of early centuries which was dedicated to the Blessed Virgin and St. John.

 $\star \star \star$ Q. I want to buy a new missal. Could you tell me when the latest one, with the new changes, will be in the stores.

A. You are right on time. At least two editions should be in your store right now, and others are coming.

Q. In a recent column you said, "To the best of my knowledge the limbo of the Fathers ceased to exist either with our Lord's Resurrection or His Ascension into heaven." I go to a tholic high school and my retion teacher, a Brother, told that there still is an existing abo, which is used for the unptized who have died.

A. There may be an existing nbo for unbaptized babies. d knows. But it is not the cient Limbo of the Fathers which existed before heaven was created for redeemed men.

 $\star \star$ - * Q. In school we had a discussion on ecumenísm and a remark was made that it all seemed to be one-sided. The Protestants are the ones expected to make the steps toward Christian unity and we are to stand ready to receive them back into the fold.

A. Many of the letters I receive make the opposite objection. They say that ever since the Council began we are the ones who have been making all the overtures and concessions. We have updated our concept of the Church, embraced our separated brethren as true brothers in Christ, asked pardon for Catholic sins of the past, revised our liturgy, condemned anti-Semitism, opted for religious freedom, made friendly gestures to pagans and even to Communists, revised some of our laws, and considered adapting some of our moral concepts to non-Catholic thought.

Certainly we will not get far with ecumenism if we stand still and expect our separated breth-

A Crop Of 25 Converts **Grew From Inquiry Class**

Katherine McIntee was attending Mass one Sunday at Holy Cross parish, South Bend, Ind., when she heard an announce ment that an Inquiry Class would be conducted in the school auditorium on two evenings each week for three months. She O'BRIEN listened with

particular interest when she heard me say:

"Please look over the list of your acquaintances and friends and see if there isn't some churchless person whom you could bring to this class. Many people are curious to know just what the Church teaches. They've heard various distortions of Catholic belief and often would like to know the truth about us Catholics.

"Here is their chance to learn what we really believe and practice. Invite them to the class and offer to come with them.

"Every Catholic is obliged in conscience to help bring Christ and His saving truths to those who are without them. On Judgment Day God will ask for a strict accounting of your stewardship in this regard."

REMEMBERS

It was the first time that Katherine McIntee had ever heard that the laity is obliged to help in extending Christ's kingdom among the souls of men. She reviewed the list of her friends and suddenly the name of Louise Brown popped up. She has a Catholic husband and a seven-year-old daughter Beverley, thought Katherine, and this class may help her see

the light and thus unify the spiritual life of her family.

In order that the news of the Inquiry Class might reach the largest number of people in South Bend and Mishawaka, the pastor, Father Walter J. Higgins, C.S.C., ran a good-sized ad in the South Bend Tribune which enters virtually every home in the area.

When Mrs. Martha Lachot saw that ad, she called her husband's attention to it. "Noble," she said, "this is just the dish for you. You've often wanted to get an intelligent 'closeup' of the Catholic religion. Here's your chance. I'll go with you."

At the first lecture I was delighted to see a large turn-out of Catholics and non-Catholics. There in one of the front rows were Katherine McIntee and Louise Brown. Just a few rows back of them were Dr. and Mrs. Lachot.

It was an interested audience that I faced each Monday and Friday evening for the next three months. I lectured for an hour and then remained for another half-hour to answer? private the questions of any m dividual who experienced the slightest difficulty.

Arriving at the hall about a half-hour before the lecture, I met each as he or she entered and had a little visit with as many as possible. In this way I was able to supplement the general lecture with individual contacts and conferences and thus keep my finger on the pulse of each inquirer.

Three months later at a crowded Sunday Mass I was privileged to receive 25 converts into the fold - the largest ever received at one time at Holy Cross church.




