

Medical technology and advanced science are extending the lives of senior citizens, many of whom are enjoying their golden years at one of two low-cost rental apartments in the Archdiocese such as Marian Towers shown above.

Just a few years ago many were active parishioners of churches in South Florida engaged in building fund campaigns, charitable activities, and other projects. Today, as senior citizens they are among the hardest hit by the inflationary cost of living since their incomes in most cases are "fixed." Hundreds of these goldenagers are already residing in the first two of several low-cost apartment complexes planned by the Archdiocese of Miami and located in Sunny Isles, north of Miami Beach; and Pompano Beach. The third and largest of these complexes, which will be known as St. Andrew Towers is now under construction at Coral Springs, an area West of Pompano Beach. Still other elderly men and women who can no longer care for themselves properly at home and are in need of skilled nursing care receive it through the ministrations of nursing orders of nuns who operate the Villa Maria Nursing and Rehabilitation Center, North Miami; and Lourdes Residence, West Palm Beach. A third group of people in the "sunset" of their lives are happy and contented at St. Joseph Residence in Fort Lauderdale and the Pennsylvania Retirement Hotel in West Palm Beach. All of these institutions have two things in common — they all offer pleasant surroundings, companionship, and "tender, loving, care" and all have long, long waiting lists. In their younger years they were concerned for your future — are you doing your utmost to ease their lives today?

Teenage girls who face crises in their young lives, can seek help at Bethany Residence, where experienced case workers familiar with such problems provide much needed assistance.










There is an evil thing going around the country these days called drugs and it comes in many forms from pills to liquid. It is related to other problems people have, but it makes them worse and it is a problem that especially confronts some young people and grinds them down and down, disrupting family and society and even leading to crime by youths who would never even consider it otherwise. Because the problem is complex, the Archdiocese has several approaches to this problem. There is a Drug Information Center to find out about what to do, the St. Luke's Methadone Center that helps heroin addicts; and a self-help operation, Genesis House that help young people to help themselves out of the problem, all directed by Dr. Ben Sheppard. There is also a new walk-in medical clinic named after the doctor, and it sometimes helps girls with drug related problems as well as with problem pregnancies that they might have otherwise sought abortion for.





Living on the tattered edge of society where their sufferings and degradations are little noticed, are the migrants who often are forced to live in such housing as this (left) in South Florida and who have a hard time raising their children to have ambition and a good education. Because the Church cares about people who are neglected by part of society, it has set up Rural Life Bureaus, a Delray Beach Child Development Center and a Day Care Center in addition to several missions in heavy agricultural areas.





Care for exceptional children

Very special children need very special care. Exceptional children are given the opportunity to expand their horizons to the fullest extent at Marian Center for Retarded Children.







Understanding... when it is needed


Understanding in a time of trouble, counseling in a time of confusion, and acceptance in a time of frequent rejection — all are offered to unwed mothers of all ages and faiths at the Archdiocese's two homes for unwed mothers, Maurawood Residence in West Palm Beach and St. Vincent Hall in Miami. Girls are helped to decide what to do with their lives under the guidance of experts, and are given the opportunity to choose a positive alternative to abortion. Also a new walk-in clinic, the Dr. Ben Sheppard Clinic, in Miami offers girls and women counseling and medical service as an alternative to abortion.



IN EARLY '60s the scene at left was repeated again and again at Centro Hispano Catolico, Archdiocesan Spanish Center in downtown Miami as Cuban refugees crowded the center seeking food, clothing and other assistance. The program of aid was inaugurated by Archbishop Coleman F. Carroll even before Federal funds were allocated to help the exiles who fled the tyranny of the Castro regime leaving behind them all of their possessions as well as their families. Emergency aids have continued through the years and are still available at Centro for new arrivals from South America and the staff is prepared to welcome the thousands of refugees expected to arrive here from Spain.

TODAY a variety of programs is provided for the many Spanish-speaking residents of South Florida who are now an integral part of the community. At right, Sister Margarita Miranda, supervises a group of youngsters at Centro Mater, recreation and community center, located in the "Little Havana" section of Miami's southwest area. The center is but one of the projects which benefits from the ABCD.

It is no longer my voice that pleads with you, but the voice of Christ through his Church: "Feed my sheep; feed my lambs." Care for those for whom I care.

May God bless you for your boundless generosity so that your lives may be filled with the joy and happiness of Christ who gave all of His life for us.
