

# **Pontifical Mass** set on Pentecost in the Cathedral

Pontifical Mass celebrated by Archbishop Coleman F. Carrell at 11 a.m., Sunday, June 2 in the Cathedral of St. Mary will mark the observance of the feast of Pentecost.

At 3 p.m. the Archbishop will administer the Sacrament of Confirmation to children and adults of the Cathedral parish as well as to any persons who were not confirmed in their own parishes.

Pentecost celebrates the birth of the Church and the manifestation of the Holy Spirit, in the form of tongues of fire, for the first time to Christ's Apostles.

The fire was the purifying and cleansing Spirit which descended upon the Apostles and gave them the faith to spread the word of God throughout the world.

# Pope Paul VI officially proclaims Holy Year

VATICAN CITY - (NC) - The 1975 Holy Year was proclaimed solemnly and officially on Ascension Thursday with the reading of a

papal bull in which Pope Paul VI said he hopes that pilgrims to Rome will find a realization of the themes of renewal and reconciliation.

The proclamation was essentially ceremonial in nature because Pope Paul had announced his intention of holding a Holy Year at a general audience in May 1973.

The papal bull - considered the most solemn form of documents issued by the Holy See - was entitled Apostolorum Limina. translated by the Vatican as The Memorials of the Apostles, meaning the tombs of Sts. Peter and Paul.

At the ceremony a group of prelates, including Msgr. Guglielmo Zannoni, head of the archives of the papal secretariat of state, and Msgr. Virgilio Noe, master of pentifical ceremonies, received the copies of the bull from Pope Paul in the Vatican palace early on May 23 and then went in procession to the atrium, or open front porch, of St. Peter's Basilica for the official reading of the Latin document by Msgr. Zannoni.


AFTER copies of the bull were consigned to officials of St. Peter's Basilica to be affixed to the doors of the Church, Msgr. Noe and other officials departed for St. Paul's Outside the Walls for a similar ceremony. In the afternoon the reading of the bull was again performed at the remaining two patriarchal basilicas in Rome, St. John Lateran's and St. Mary Major's

At noon on Ascension Thursday, Pope Paul told crowds gathered in St. Peter's Square that his bull is "an invitation to take this event seriously" and to see it as "a very special and rich religious act

The Pope told thousands in the hot, sunny square that the Holy Year is a "special period of spiritual favor" and offers Catholics "an opening to divine mercy that seeks to draw them into a renewed communion with the Church of God and the evangelical reign of Christ."

## Fr. Genovar retiring soon




director of the Archdiocese of Miami Office of Community Services, whose concern for the aging was well-known throughout South Florida and who died before the newest facility could be completed.



# Physicians'ambassadors of God,' Pope declares

VATICAN CITY - (NC) - Medical doctors are ambassadors sent by God to protect all human beings, especially the poor and even those who are "still in the maternal womb," Pope Paul VI told a convention of Catholic doctors meeting in Barcelona, Spain, May 25-29.

In a letter written in Spanish and signed by his secretary of state, Cardinal Jean Villot, the Pope told delegates to the world congress of the International Federation of Catholic Doctors:

"If all men participate in the dignity of divine life, it is not less true that the love of God is manifested in a special way to the poor, little ones, invalids and babies, even when they are still in the maternal womb.

"Doctors are the principle protectors of the weak . . . They are like ambassadors sent to them to offer all the relief which God has placed at the disposition of His creatures."

TURNING to the theme of the convention, "Rapport between the Doctor and Patient," the Pope first listed some of the prominent ethical problems related to this rapport and then commented on the Church's viewpoint on those problems.

The Pope said those problems included the obligations of the doctor to the patient, especially in a medical world that has become impersonal, as well as the right of the patient to receive "sincere and prodent informa-

Other ethical questions mentioned by the

. Consent of the patient or his family to complicated therapies, that is, to those which might have side-effects, be lengthy or extremely costly.


. The right of a medical person not to participate in treatment that is against his conscience, even if the treatment is called for by 'juridical or professional" groups.

· Need for the medical community to speak out against socio-economic structures that undermine the physical and moral health

"In regard to all these difficult problems," the Pope said, "the body of doctors has a decisive task, thanks to its competence and the efficacy and trust it inspires.

"Catholic doctors should boldly offer original and valid answers to these problems."

The Christian faith does not bring into the medical field concrete solutions to all those ethical problems but does emphasize the respect due the dignity of the sick person and holds high a hierarchy of values which the world in its race toward technical progress runs the risk of forgetting." the Pope said.

The Vatican announced May 24 that the charge d' affairs, Bishop Cesare Zacchi, who has filled in as the top papal diplomat in the Havana nunciature since 1961, has now been named apostolic nuncio and an archbishop.

THE Vatican withdrew its nuncio in 1961 after the government of communist Premier Fidel Castro expelled foreign missionaries, including bishops, in the earlier years after Castro became chief of state in 1959. The Vatican, however, had never broken off diplomatic relations with Cuba completely.

The 1975 Holy Year will begin officially with the opening of the first hely door in St. Peter's Basilica by Pope Paul on next Christmas Eve. The boly doors of the other three patriarchal basilicas will be opened on Christmas Day in similar ceremonies presided over the cardinals who are titular heads of

In the bull, Pope Paul recalled the twin themes he assigned to the Holy Year renewal and reconciliation - and noted that he had authorized preliminary Holy Year observances throughout the world on the twin

The Pope said he hopes that in the Holy Year "pilgrims to the tombs of the Apostles Peter and Paul and to the memorials of the other martyrs will come more easily into contact with the ancient sources of the Church's faith and life, in order to be converted by repentance, strengthened in charity and united more closely with their brethren by the grace of God.

THE PAPAL BULL also specifies requirements for gaining a plenary indulgence and other spiritual benefits. An indulgence grants the remission of temporal punishment due to those sins of which the guilt has been forgiven, either in Penance or because of an act of perfect contrition.

In the document the Pope set out various goals he hopes will be attained by the Holy Year beyond the immediate spiritual enrichment of individuals.

First, he said, "generous efforts must be made to further evangelization." He then cited the need to promote an apostolate to ensure that "the leaven of the Gospel" premeates "workers, members of the academic world and young peoples."

The Pope also called for an outpouring of works of charity to strengthen and support 'the moral consciousness" of all men.

He affirmed that the message of the Holy Year can shed light on many of the problems which terment men today, such as "economic and social questions, the question of ecology and sources of energy," as well as the liberation of the oppressed and the uplifting of all men to a new dignity of life.

The bull suggested that Holy Year pilgrims can aid "works of faith and charity for the benefit of our needy brethren in Rome and in other churches of the world."

Dominican Father Raimondo Spiazzi, a member of the Central Commission for the Holy Year, told a press conference that his commission is studying plans for one or more concrete projects to which pilgrims would be asked to contribute.

The Pope also appealed in the bull for help for developing countries and peoples still afflicted by hunger and war.

He said also that he hopes that nations will "consider the possibility of wisely granting an amnesty to prisoners, as a witness to clemency and equity, especially to those who have given sufficient proof of moral and civic rehabilitation, or who may have been caught up in political and social upheavals too imense to be held fully responsible.

The papal bull also expressed the hope that the Holy Year may further the search for Christian unity among all churches

The Holy Year, it said, "provides an op-portunity for doing special penance for the divisions that exist among Christians" and "allows progress toward that hoped-for reconciliation by intensified dialogue and concrete Christian collaboration for the salvation of the world.'

hassee and in 1951 was appointed Public Relations Director of Miami's Mercy Hospital, a post which he held for two years. Early in 1952 he was assigned to organize St. James parish, North Miami, where he served as first pastor until September of that year. During that time he supervised the construction of the first parish church, established a rectory in a private residence and purchased nearby property for future parish expansion, as well as organizing parochial organi-

Appointed pastor of St. Francis Xavier Church, Fort Myers in 1953, Father Genovar returned to South Florida's east coast in 1956 when he became founding pastor of Our Lady Queen of Martyrs parish, Fort Lauderdale.

DURING the next nine years Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Church and School were built as well as a large convent to house Dominican Sisters stationed in the parochial school and at the nearby St. Thomas Aguinas High School. In 1960 he organized the mission of St. Jerome, now a parish, and since 1965 has been pastor of St. Sebastian Church.

Father Genovar served as the first direc-

tor of the Miami Diocesan Council of Catholic Men, directed the first Diocese of Miami Census and from 1960 to 1963 was the Bishop's Representative to Hospitals. In 1961 he was the Bishop's Coordinator for the Diocese of Miami Labor Day program, and has served as member of the Archdiocesan school board.

Father Genovar has been Director of the Archdiocesan Society for the Propagation of the Faith since 1968 and is also Director in the Archdiocese for the Pontifical Association of the Holy Childhood, a member of the Provincial Pro-Synodal Commission and of the Archdiocesan Real Estate Board.

And this Pentecost Sunday is a good time to remember: God is God.

And so is the Holy Spirit.

# Work of Holy Spirit within us

St. Paul once met some religious-minded men in the ancient city of Ephesus who had been converted to prayer and penance many years before by John the Baptist. Apparently Paul had reason to think they knew little more than the message of the Baptist. So he went to the very heart of the matter. Only one question was necessary: "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?"

Their answer was a surprise, for it proved they were strangers to Christianity. They replied: "We have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit."

Paul went on to instruct and baptize and confirm them, so that "the Holy Spirit came upon them and they began to speak in tongues and in prophecy."

TODAY no believer in Christ can say he has never heard of the Holy Spirit. But too many of us have to say we know practically nothing about His divine work in the soul of a Christian who has received the Sacraments. We speak His name every time we make the sign of the cross and invoke Him repeatedly in the Eucharist and in many other prayers.

He is, we admit, the least known and appreciated of the three divine persons. No doubt this is due in part to the mysterious way the Holy Spirit works among us. And His very name evokes no comparison in our experience to help us understand Him better.

In reflecting on God as Father, we have a term most familiar to us. It is an intimate and consoling title, so much a part of our daily life, and it enables us to build up an image of God which draws us closer and makes conversation (prayer) more natural.

# The Truth of the Matter

With regard to the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity. God the Son, God become man, we have the clear portrait of Jesus on the pages of the Gospels. Not all the fine details we would wish, but more than enough to help us realize that He is not only God, but a man like us in all things but sin.

Because we lack such sense imagery of the Holy Spirit, He remains for most people an impenetrable mystery. And yet the work of the Spirit in fulfillment of our calling as children of God is as real as that of the Father in creating us and that of the Son in redeeming us.

Think of the scope of His influence in our lives. In Baptism we are born again of water and the Holy Spirit. By the

action of His grace we are brought into the family of God, given a share in His divine life and a right to everlasting happiness. He infused into the soul the supernatural virtues of faith, hope and charity.

WE BECOME temples of the Spirit, giving Him sanctuary in the depths of the soul. It is by His influence we are strengthened to avoid evil and do good. From Him come the graces needed to enlighten the mind and strengthen the will in struggling to be loyal to Christ.

The Sacrament of Confirmation is very meaningful in the life of a young person. It indicates that he should take an adult attitude now towards Christ and his own life in general. He is expected to bear witness to Jesus and His teachings in public, and to enable him to do so, in this Sacrament he receives the special grace of the Spirit. It has to be special, because witnessing loyally is far from easy. This grace is the divine means of making up for our weakness.

The Holy Spirit also offers the soul the seven gifts — wisdom, knowledge, counsel, understanding, fortitude, piety and fear of the Lord. The very titles of these gifts offer us confidence that what we find lacking in ourselves can be supplied by the Holy Spirit. Ignorance can be dispelled, cowardice can give way to courage, fears banished and faith strengthened by the action of the Spirit in the soul.

When a sinner is converted, it is only because the Spirit of God has influenced him. When an unbeliever makes a profession of faith he owes that blessing to the Holy Spirit. When we find ourselves stirred to love God more, to break with sin and to be more generous in living the Christian life, it is the Spirit working, silently and powerfully, within us.







# Yes, love the universe but not to the extent that you love Christ

Our common humanity is getting some severe jolts these days. The daily scare headlines do more than scare us, they make us wince in a feeling of physical revulsion at atrocities committed by members of the human family. The Palestinians wreak a bloodbath at Maalot in Galilee township on school children, the Israelis retaliate with raids on refugee camps, bombs explode in Dublin killing scores of

To experience horror and shame over these incidents seems to most of us altogether normal and human. We have been brought up to respect and revere the human person. Our culture, our religion, our American Constitution are in a very true sense "man-centered."

RECENTLY, however, an occasional writer has come forward to cast suspicion on any "man-centered" sense of values. The idea seems to be that this concern for man is a throwback to the ancient past and should be discarded as soon as possible. The new philosophy holds that we should center our system of values around the universe, not around man. Whatever helps the ecology, whatever aids Mother Earth is good: Whatever harms the ecology is evil. Man is

I came across an interesting example of this new philosophy, or perhaps we should call it "nature religion," in a book review in The Washington Post of May 18. I realize that many book reviewers are exhibitionists, displaying their erudition by means of exotic words and far-out allusions to generally unknown historical events, but this reviewer was deadly serious, propounding his new religion with evangelical zeal.

The reviewer, David Park, is a physicist at Williams College and the book he reviewed was "The Ascent of Man" by J. Bronowski. The book traces the development of man from the gravel pits of East Africa to his present high stage of development, with special attention to Galileo, Darwin, Mendel. Einstein. Not a bad set of heroes - but Park claims that this business of measuring development and achievement in terms of man-centered values is all wrong, almost as obsolete as a God-centered scale of values.

PARK'S conviction is that the universe must come first. "As a wise friend once told me, man must finally learn to love the universe as faithfully and humbly as once he tried to love God." He dismisses Protagoras who said that "man is the measure of all things," and also the Book of Genesis which Park says gave men carte blanche to exploit the

Now, how does the new philosophy of universe-centered values actually work out? The first point is that questions pertaining to man's life and death do not have overriding importance. (We wince to think that the life and death of all those innocent people in Israel and Ireland had no overriding


importance.) The second point is that whatever harms the universe, in earthly terms — the ecology), is an enemy. Those who rearrange the landscape to suit their convenience, thus injuring our agriculture, are enemies.


Park singles out for special blame the medical missionaries going about on their errands of mercy. "Thus medical missionaries spread out in regions of the world in which the human population is in balance with nature; they interfere with the death rate and prepare the way for the starvation and misery that follow." Mother Earth wants no drugs to interfere with the death rate.

Park mentions the Vietnam War in relation to Mother Earth. He seems to be less concerned about the slaughter of hundreds of thousands of persons rather than about the injury done to the ecology of Vietnam by chemicals and bomb

Unquestionably, Park is absoluetely right in pleading for a certain measure of respect for Mother Earth by conserving natural resources but he becomes a "terrible simplifier" when he asks us to abandon our system of values based on the recognition of the dignity of the human person. As for loving the universe faithfully and humbly — yes — but not to the degree in which we love and adore the lovable Jesus

# GKC's not lost but generation that ignores him is very lost

When a Catholic magazine assigned a biography of G.K. Chesterton to a young critic, that critic proudly asserted he had never read anything written by Chesterton.

It is an interesting phenomenon. now that we've reached the 100th anniversary of Gilbert K. Chesterton's birth, that Chesterton has not only been relegated to a virtual anonymity but that those who ignore him take pride in

I suppose the downfall of Chesterton in modern eyes is that he is a logical man. I'm not at all satisfied with the explanations that are offered for it but it really is true that today there is a kind of distrust of logic. Today no one seems to approve of the fact that two and two make four and there is an inclination to lean to the feeling that those who think two and two make five or three may have something.

I'M NOT certain when in my life I first encountered Chesterton. It was not as early as one of my high school teachers had wished me to meet him because I remember that even while I was in high school a teacher kept telling me I should read him

I can remember the philosophicaltheological stage I was at when I came upon Chesterton. I was at the time thinking in terms of truth as being something unknowable. It might exist but if it did then the very fact that it was truth placed it beyond my finite comprehension. I was inclined to

ing a knowlege and understanding of the Infinite - a theological viewpoint vou encounter in some confused Catholic theology today.

Then I came upon Chesterton. He wrote beautifully but it wasn't his way with words that impressed me but the way he called his reader to use his mind, to use logic and common sense.

Chesterton had come eventually to the Catholic Church. He resisted for awhile but because he was a logical man. he couldn't very well continue to ignore logic.

He wrote in Orthodoxy: "A stick might fit a hole or a stone by accident. But a key and a lock are both complex. And if a key fits a lock, you know it is

the right key ALTHOUGH he was not a coldly analytical man, he was a man who believed that since man has been given the gift of reason then he should be expected to use it.

He came to the Catholic Church not in some burst of emotional fervor but by reason and logic. Of course, there is a role that grace plays in all true conversion but in Chesterton grace worked with the logic of his mind.

But Chesterton was always after his conversion formed by the Church. He wrote once about how it was that those who became Catholics spoke of the peace and rest they found in the Church. But, he said, that shouldn't be understood as if it meant the person who became a Catholic had ended his search for truth; had ceased to think.

not to leave off thinking, but to learn how to think.

Chesterion was a man who thought Catholic. It may well be this is why some today are inclined to turn him off. He had no doubt the Catholic Church is the Church founded by Jesus Christ.

THIS is the kind of a certainty that makes some people today a little nervous, as if to suggest that there is a particular truth is an insult to all who might not have discovered it. But again logic certainly requires that when two statements are in contradiction then both can not be equally true. If someone says the Catholic Church is the Church founded by Jesus Christ and guided by the Holy Spirit and someone else says it is not then it is obvious that both can not be equally right. Both may be equally sincere but both can not be equally right.

Chesterton wrote voluminously. He wrote novels, short stories, poetry, biographies, histories and volumes of essays. If not everything he wrote was of equal merit, he always wrote clearly and logically. It is a sad thing to think that he is ignored today in the universities, even Catholic universities. But the sadness is not that a great man is ignored but that a generation is being deprived of an opportunity to encounter a mind that might challenge them to

# AMUSEMENTS/ New concept in programming for Miami Philharmonic

Orchestra is about to inaugurate a new concept in summer programming at Gusman Hall and the West Palm Beach Auditorium, according to an announcement from Philbarmonic music director Alain Lombard.

The new series, which Lombard describes as "promenade concerts," has been developed to offer serious music lovers what may eventually result in a year-round program of fine classical music for Miami and the Palm Reach area.

THIS summer's inaugural series will also be highlighted by Lombard's first summertime podium appearance in Florida as the maestro conducts the final pair of concerts in Gusman Hall and at the West Palm Beach Audi-

All programs in the fiveconcert series at Gusman Half will begin at 8:30 p.m. on Saturday evenings, with the identical programs to be presented at the West Palm Beach Auditorium at 4 p.m. on Sunday afternoons.

This year's promenade concert series will begin the weekend of July 6 as the Philharmonic and the University of Miami's School of Music jointly present George and Ira Gershwin's classic "Porgy and Bess."

HARRY John Brown, already slated to be one of Lornbard's two associate con ductors for the coming winter season, will be at the podium for "Porgy and Bess." with the soloists and chorus to be drawn from the University of Miami's musical forces.

Brown will return to the podium the weekend of July 13 for an all-Rachmanifoff program, with Russian pianist Misha Dichter as the soloist in the Piano Concerto No. 3 and the orchestra performing the Symphony No. 2 by the great Russian composer.

The promenade concert concept will turn to the world of operettas the weekend of July 20 as the Philharmonic presents a concert version of Franz Lehar's "The Land of Smiles." with soloists and the chorus all under the direction of guest conductor Paul Csonka, artistic director of the Palm Beach Civic Opera.

THE SUMMER series next to last weekend will feature the guest conducting of composer and television personality Carmen Dragon and the piano artistry of Horacio Gutierrez, as the Philharmonic performs Rimsky-Korsakoff's "Scheherazade" and the Piano Concerto No. 1 by Franz Liszt.

But the climax of the 1974 promenade series will come the weekend of Aug. 3 as cellist Christine Walevska joins Maestro Lombard and the Philharmonic in a tribute to the great Czech romantic composer Anton Dvorak, Miss Walevska will be the soloist in Dvorak's Cello Concerto, while Lombard will also conduct the New World Symphony.

Season subscriptions for the two series of five concerts at Gusman Hall and the West Palm Beach Auditorium are being offered at a discount of 10 per cent. Individual tickets for the concerts will be available by the middle of June.

### Wedding in Blood

# Chilling horror story long on talent, short on depth

This is French director Claude Chahrol's latest film, and it continues undisturbed his narrowing fascination with the disturbances lurking darkly within the minds of the most ordinary people. Wedding in Blood, which bears the French titles Les Noces Rouges, is characteristically set in the provinces, and it is based very loosely on an actual crime. As such, the film and its story of forbidden passion and desperate murder provide Chabrol with his favorite basis for chilling cinematic assault - to involve seemingly placid bourgeois in unspeakable pursuits that utterly belie their respectable veneer.

The problem here is that Chabrol insists on relating the actualities of the crime under inspection with vague generalities about the human toll he apparently believes is the inbred result of repressed Judeo-Christian believers living in a post-Christian age.

Wedding focuses its interest on two provincial couples - Michel Piccoli and his malingering wife; Stephane Audran and ber politically preoccupied husband. Piccoli and Audran, naturally, are drawn together by an almost incendiary passion that literally has them rutting in the wayside shrubbery.

Thankfully, if their own urges are out of control, director Chabrol's artistic sensibilities are fully under his command - and he assiduously avoids the use of superfluous nudity and related sensation in depicting his lovers' unmistakable activities.

Unfortunately, Chabrol has also created

a set of one-dimensional characters: the lovers have no basis for a relationship other than forbidden love, and the people they murder - the sickly wife (Clothilde Joano) succumbs to a poisoned dose of medicine; the cuckholded husband (Claude Pieplu) is simply bludgeoned and then incinerated in a laked auto accident - likewise give us no insights into their own failures to keep their mates satisfied. The few explanations we are given come in the form of blurted-out dialogue rather than in any of the more subtle devices available to a film maker as skilled as Chabrol.

YET everyone in the film gives a superb performance, and the characters are as real as Chabrol allows them to be. It would appear that the director is more interested in conveying his peculiar beliefs rather than in creating a truly chilling horror tale, and if you don't buy what he is saying, the film will be a disappointment. Even so, Wedding in Blood is extremely well made, with subtitling that, for a change, amply conveys the sly give and take of Gallic speech.

Ms. Audran, who also happens to be Mme. Chabrol, remains one of the screen's most sensually powerful actresses, and her magnetism alone provides an unforgettable moment in cinema history. It is a shame that Chabrol chose not to embroider his film with the gothic lacework that would have made it truly chilling and, in retrospect, morally devastating. (A-III)

It's very easy to define the role of parenthood — just shower your children with love and affection and all will be well. Sounds easy, but how to go about implementing this noble lifestyle is another question

We are always appalled at the slightest hint that there are some parents who do not love their children, but the cruel truth stares us in the face: Child neglect and child abuse are alarmingly on the increase. The stress of cultural forces and the fast-moving changes in society are largely responsible. The abandonment of old style morality has left us with a kind of desperation in handling very sticky

Conditions, furthermore, are not always what they seem. When we look beneath the surface, as the TV camera did recently at the Loud family, there are some surprising sights. It's trite to say it, but real love, as in so many other life situations, is the missing ingredient.

THE IDEAL father should pattern his life after God, the Father, the time-honored image which is the best designation that mankind has yet devised to symbolize love and mercy and understanding. There is also a connotation of firmness when necessary, and a helping hand reaching out to all His children. Christ, who came from the Father, always spoke very tenderly of the father-son relationship. Human fatherhood is a sublime parallel.


A father's chief responsibility is to show his children how to live a happy life by living the right kind of life himself. A good place to begin is to demonstrate a warm loving relationship with his wife, the mother of his children. Children are alert creatures. Like father, like son, platitude though it is, contains the whole story. If the father is a bounder, then the children are going to have that much more difficulty in trying to overcome the setbacks of life.

It does not mean that every father has to turn into "Superdad" day and night, acting like a child and playing constant pal, but it does call for reasonable attention, even if the moment is not always opportune.

A father, at his best, manfully refrains from saying "I told you so" and he even lends a willing ear to his inquiring offspring just when Blanda has 10 seconds to kick the gamebreaking field goal. He must sedulously practice the fine art of listening carefully not only to what is said but to what is

The emphasis today is fortunately shifting from the father as the authority figure, whose only aim is to put bread on the table, to full copartnership with the mother. For much too long in many families, the mother has exercised the full authority with the father lingering quietly in the background. Today, at the very beginning of life, many hospitals now allow the father in the delivery room to participate as fully as possible in the new birth. Fathers should also be close at hand in the cuddling and feeding process. Children need two full-time parents working together at all times. Nothing cements a closer family relationship than kind words, tender hugs and soft kisses from both mother and dad.




PARENTS now realize that the formative years in a child's life end at about the 14th year. After that, the child, depending naturally on its individual background and heritage, is nearly an adult, capable of making his own decision. Parents are often puzzled that the good example they tried so hard to give does not invariably produce results they expected. Children, in the words of "The Prophet," "Are not your children. They are the sons and daughters of life's longing for itself." They have to live their own lives and the Sturm and Dran years call for almost superhuman pare patience. The only reasonable answer during these years is to let our children know that we will never abandon them, come what may. The accent always has to be on devotion, affection and ready forgiveness whenever it is necessary.

Reams of parental psychology have been written on the family relationship. We are all familiar with the bible of Dr. Spock. Parents need to keep abreast of developments and the latest psychological findings but new pronouncements, just because they are new, are not necessarily the best. Iron-clad discipline, by the same token, "just because it worked in my day" is not always the ideal means for rearing children. The best approach lies somewhere in between - firmness with gentleness but always with love.

# Good father leads his children to God, humanity

It is no small matter to be a father in today's world. The fact that there are so many fathers — it is almost a common denominator - rather than prove a man ordinary can only mean that being a father is a most fundamental and human thing to be.

To be good at it is, for most of us, to achieve a measure of success in life. To fail at it is to fail miserably, it being a failure of such human dimension. But when we are young fathers and our children are small we know that we will not fail and that is a good thing. Otherwise we might never get the job done, or even get started for fear of it. In the end, we succeed and fail, we win and lose.

Even when we try hard to be perfect as our heavenly Father is perfect, we realize sooner or later that we have only approximated our ideal, that life is more complicated than we thought it was, and that not everything was under our control after all

THE FATHER (along with the mother) is a considerable part of God's providence for his children. He is expected to provide the necessities of life: not just the elementary three: food, clothing and shelter, but also in modern times things like education, recreation, a broadly creative and humanistic upbringing. and, if he is Christian in any serious sense, initiation into the Christian religion.

Though it consumes considerable time and is important, to provide food, clothing and shelter is taken fe granted. The same is true as well for the education and recreation that society provides through its schools and other institutions with the help of the father's time and tax money

That leaves the "human thing" and the "religious thing" to talk about. These are the fine art of being a father: the education of the human heart for human living, and the education of the human spirit in man for his living with God here and hereafter, now and later.

To teach a child to have a heart for all creation, to love all God's creatures, and to do his duty to others (including God) is the epitome of human training for human living. It requires both discipline and love, or if you prefer, love and discipline. A father ought above all to reflect the loving kindness of God the Father by being kind but firm, by providing an environment and atmosphere that is marked with a love which fills the child's twofold need of tender care and firm direction

WHEN WE speak of God as a loving Father, we do not mean that He does not make demands. "In bringing up your children," Paul says to the Galatians, "correct them and guide them as the Lord does." The letter to the Hebrews says. "Has there ever been a son whose father did not train him? If you are not getting this training, then you would not be sons but

Besides, we have all had our human fathers who punished us, and we respected them for it; we ought to be even more willing to submit ourselves to our spiritual Father, to be given life." God is to be obeyed; His will is to be done. The right kind of love-discipline is a good foundation for a child's later relationship with God the Father and with Jesus. Discipline and discipleship are words from the same source.

To learn to love and to love others is also essential for human living. Others are with us in the journey of life. We are together a pilgrim people. Together, not separately, we are the People of God. One of the most difficult things to teach children (and sometimes adults too) is that they are not alone in the world, that they must not only be responsible for themselves but also for others, that everything they do affects others, and that the fairness of an eye for an eye which comes so easy to children is not enough for a good life with

ONLY LOVE is: a love that forgets self and continually forgives others. This kind of love spells itself out in terms of doing one's duties towards others, toward God and neighbor. And who is my neighbor? "Neighbor" is variously defined as the people living next to us, as everyone, as anybody in need (the parable of the Good Samaritan). Any of the definitions is a good place to start.

Jesus our brother is our exemplar, not only for being a Son of God, a Child of God, but also for being a Man for others, which He was so supremely. The good and loving father turns to Jesus even in the difficulties of mere human living because Jesus our brother is Christ the Lord. To live human life fully is too much without Jesus. What real human life asks goes beyond what man by himself can do and be. A father, because he wants the best for his children, looks in his search for ultimate meaning to what only God can provide.

# Dad's broader role may enrich family members

We need to shelve a couple of real and imagined stereotypes of the father in this changing time father as the one who brings home the bread, lays down the law, and presides over the family fortunes, unless as in "Glass Menagerie" he is "a telephone man who fell in love with long distances."

One of the most redeeming elements of a yet unredeemed medium - television - is the gradual disappearance of the duli buffoon who was the unwitting butt of family jokes, and the portrayal of father through such sensitive treatments as served by by "The Waltons," as a person who can be warm, human and compassionate, one who really cares. In fact, one of the refreshing spinoffs from the women's movement today is that fathers quite often find themselves to deeper domestic involvement, and have found that it can be rewarding.

IN EARLIER and less complex times, perhaps what father said was "law." Today what father says may not be etched in bronze, but what he does can be eloquent indeed. As Father Hesburgh suggests, the father-mother relationship can be a beautiful example to the young that mutual respect, admiration and sharing, the selflessness that is a good marriage, are goals to be achieved in life.

A father's reaction to his work can teach his children that there is fulfillment to be gained beyond the household walls. In fact, father is more often than not the link with the outside world. His reaction to that world teaches the young that it can either be an enriching, challenging arena to enter, or something to be feared, and perhaps even avoided

Father can broaden the horizons of children in innumerable ways. No matter how far the femminist movement may have penetrated the family unit, it is still likely that most mothers today are chief cooks and bottle washers. But, what great opportunities there are for fathers to expand their children's vistas . . . by baking bread, or otherwise puttering in the kitchen, activities which say "Look, cooking can be a wonderfully creative and educational thing. It is not just the thing girls or mothers do.

It is a basic human function . . . the nourishment of others, such as Jesus did at his own last supper, an act which has become the central act of our faith." Or his actions can say: "Look, this is our house Not Mom's, or mine, It's ours. We all have a stake in it.

I HAVE a friend who once vowed that he's spend his whole summer, every available hour, with his 16year-old son, whom he admitted he knew very little. At the end of the summer. I asked how the plan had gone. He smiled: "I spent every waking hour with my boy for the past three months. We did things together never imagined myself doing. I really got to know him. and do you know what, Jim? I don't like the darned kld!" Educators are generally agreed that a person's values today are pretty well formed by the age of 14. religious and otherwise.

My friend's problem is that he didn't start "getting to know my son" early enough ... like from the beginning. "The best thing a father can do for his children is love their mother." Father Theodore M. Hesburgh. boss of the establishment for which I work, made that statement many years ago. He has made a great many others, and very important ones since, but that's one of my favorites. He spoke from long experience, first as chaplain of Notre Dame's Vetville (otherwise knownas "Pertile Valley" during the post WW II days), then as professor and president of a university dedicated to

enhancing the moral values of the young Maybe the statement sounds a bit simplistic, but it makes eminent sense when you probe it a bit further, because it says that a father's relationship with the mother of the house can teach their youngsters marvetous things about human interrelationships. The father as teacher is a concept which I believe holds great promise for stabilizing the family unit in the

[Following are highlights from current speeches and documents of Pope Paul VI. The Holy Father addresses himself constantly to the problems and needs of our age in an effort to help individuals form a right conscience.)

### Pope again calls for end of discrimination of any kind whatever

VATICAN CITY - (NC) - Pope Paul VI told the United Nations Special Committee on Apartheid that the Church has unhesitatingly and repeatedly called for the end of all discrimination, whether "in law or in fact."

He recalled that three years ago he had condemned discrimination based on "race, origin, color, culture, sex or religion." He then condemned discrimination against the migrant worker, the poor, the handicapped, the incurably ill "and all those who live at the margin of society and are without voice."

Among the voiceless he listed the unborn, and in condemning abortion he cited euthanasia as another species of "that massive aberration which is the destruction of inno-

cent human life. The UN committee had been touring Europe to create a wider public awareness of the problems of apartheid - the policy of strict racial segregation.

IN HIS talk to the apartheid committee, on May 22, Pope Paul referred to 11 different papal statements from the 16th century to the present, most of them his. He quoted from seven of them.

The Pope recalled: "Our predecessors in the See of Peter, the vicars of Christ throughout the years, have repeatedly given expression to His teaching in the defense of man. It was Paul III who promoted the dignity of the native peoples of the Americas: their freedom, their right to property. In modern times our great predecessors Pius XII and John XXIII steadfastly reaffirmed the priceless Gospel

'Thus we unhesitatingly proclaim once again the dignity of the human person and the brotherhood of all men.

He quoted from his 1967 Message to Africa, in which he had demanded "an ever more explicit recognition in civil society of every human being's essential rights," and had called aspirations for the enjoyment of those rights "wholly

The Pope declared: "All men must participate in the life of the nation. Power, responsibility and decision-making cannot be the monopoly of one group or race or segment of the people.

For the attainment of "this full measure of human dignity," Pope Paul called for "a precise plan with a definite time-table.

He warned that "the cause is urgent and the hour is late." but cautioned against violence.

In the solution of these pressing problems, the only

possible means are the means indicated by the Christian message, which claims without reservation the need to give witness to, promote and effect justice, as brotherhood, love and the inventive capacity of man suggest, but with violence excluded."

Stressing that, he said: "No, we repeat, violence is not an acceptable solution.

Pope Paul referred at least twice to discrimination based on sex.

"It is likewise present, for example, when the equal dignity of women is not respected. It is present when the migrant worker is looked down upon, when the poor are held down to inhuman conditions of life.'

### Resurrection a fact


VATICAN CITY - (NC) - Pope Paul, noting that some theologians have recently contested "the historical and physical reality" of Christ's Resurrection from the dead, declared that Catholic teaching "allows no doubts about this event.

"Jesus Christ is truly risen," the Pope told his May 22 general audience, "that is, after His death — a true death — He, by divine power, returned really to life, soul and body, but in a new state, as 'heavenly man.'

"Yes, we are in the surreal," he said, "but in the truth." Christians, the Pope said, "should form what we dare to call an ambivalent conception of our life: it is in time but will be one day in the heavenly kingdom.

He urged Christians not to be frightened by "the difficult word which is not found in our old catechisms:" eschatology.

He said eschatology has two meanings. One refers, he said, to "the final, the superior, the remaining, the super-natural." The other refers, "and more normally, to the prophetic state concerning this world's end, the cosmic and existential situation which will be the end of history, when Christ will return in glory to judge the living and the dead."

# Hand missals to stage comeback

WASHINGTON - (NC) - The small daily and Sunday "hand missals" that many Catholics used to carry regularly to Mass will make a comeback this December - after a manner of speaking.

In the latest issue of its monthly newsletter published here, the U.S. Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy announced that the finally revised sacramentary - the translation of the Roman Missal which the priest uses at the altar - will be made available in published form on July 1, 1974. On Dec. 1, it said, hand missals with the final revisions may be released, and periodical publications such as monthly "missalettes" will be allowed to incorporate the final revisions starting June 1, 1975.

BUT according to the newsletter, the band missals should not be used as they were 10 years ago, when they were popular. At that time the newsletter said, the missals provided English translations to help the worshiper follow the Mass, which was being said in Latin.

This, the newsletter said, "presented some difficulties. Its orientation was not communal but individual; it brought about two parallel actions: that of the priest and that of the

and in liturgical renewal on "full, active, and conscious par-ticipation," the newsletter said, "the function of the hand missal has been reinterpreted.

The full hand missal is not prepared for use by the laity or clergy during the liturgical celebration. Rather it serves a useful role prior to or after the liturgy."

It said the hand missals should be used before the liturgy for individuals or groups to prepare themselves to celebrate the liturgy, a preparation that it said "should be encouraged.

After the celebration, the newsletter said, the hand missal "may help the faithful to reflect upon the celebration. It offers material for meditative prayer and assists the individual to interiorize the spirit of the liturgical prayer and feast celebrated.

Father Frederick MacManus, director of the U.S. bishops' liturgy secretariat, said that while the committee was arguing against the tranditional use of the hand missal. We are very anxious that it not be ruled out."

He pointed out that there are "two or three good hand missals in France." The extreme popularity of the hand missal 10 or 15 years ago might never be equalled again, he said. but "if in fact it is used in religious education classes. it

# How to gain indulgences told

VATICAN CITY — (NC) — The papal bull Apostolerum Limina of Pope Paul VI proclaiming the 1975 Holy Year explains how Catholics can earn a plenary indulgence through their participation.

The bull says that participation in the Holy Year can earn "the gift" of a plenary indulgence for "all the faithful who, through a profound conversion of the heart to God, through works of penance, piety and brotherly solidarity, sincerely and fervently attest to their desire to remain united in charity with God and their progress in that charity."

The terms laid down by the bull for the gaining of the plenary indulgence first require Confession of sins, reception of Communion and a prayer for the intentions of the Pope and the college of bishops. With those requirements as a general preparation, persons wishing to gain the indulgences

• Go in pilgrimage to one of the four patriarchal basilicas or to some other place designated by the Roman authorities, such as the Catacombs, and "there devoutly take part in a litiurgical celebration, especially the sacrifice of the Mass, or some exercise of piety, such as, the Way of the Cross, the Rosary;'

· Visit. "in a group or individually, one of four basilicas and there spend some time in devout recollection, concluding with the Our Father, the profession of faith in any approved form, and a prayer to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

The bull also states that those who are prevented by sickness or other serious reasons from making a pilgrimage to Rome may "unite themselves spiritually with this pilgrimage and offer their prayers and sufferings to God acquire the plenary indulgence. The same applies to those who are in Rome but for a good reason cannot take part in the visits to the basilicas.

The bull points out that a "plenary indulgence can be gained only once a day," and that "all indulgences can always be applied to the dead," that is, to the souls in

The bull says also that all priests who come to Rome for the Holy Year can hear Confessions and exercise all the regular functions that they are authorized to perform in their own dioceses without receiving special permission from the Rome vicariate.







# Santeria: Includes many symbols, statues of saints, 'gods'

(Following is one in a series of articles on the subject of Santeria, a practice spread throughout the continent by African slaves beginning some 400 years ago. Santeria has manifested itself in many communities including those of South Florida and in recent months has reached increasing prominence, particularly among the Latin-speaking population. This series, prepared for the guidance of our readers, was written by Father Juan J. Sosa, assistant pastor of St. Mary Cathedral, who has done extensive study and written about the subject.)

#### By FATHER JUAN SOSA

Once Santeria spread among many believers, its practices were characterized by a richness of symbols that gave to it a mystical dimension. To understand Santeria as it flourishes in South Florida today, one must analyze the development of these symbols in time. Although Santeria is not the same today as it was in Cuba, many of these symbols have been preserved, for they are considered to be essential to the religion.

The first symbol may be considered to be the 'sacred' place which Santeria believers hold, namely, the wilderness.

Lydia Cabrera, the foremost living authority on Santeria today, has captured the significance of vegetation in la Santeria through her uniquely scientific book, El Monte. The wilderness essentially contains all that the black man needs for his magic, for the preservation of his health, and for his own welfare; what he needs to defend himself from any evil forces.

IN the wilderness live many orishas, the saints or divinities worshiped by the faithful. The magic that the Cuban blacks needed for their health dwells, in their belief, in the medicinal and sacred herbs discovered in el Monte. These are called ewes, and each holds the virtue of a saint or orisha, a supernatural force. The botanicas in Miami, then, are filled with these herbs that today supposedly represent a way of acquiring health, luck, and love under the protection of their saints.

A second symbol that could be analyzed is the symbol represented by the saints themselves. These orishas or saints are believed by the followers to be the actual spirits of important men now dead who were, for the most part, kings and founders of tribes.

In the Yoruba mind, God, Olordumare, created the world, but then decided to rest altogether. Thus, he relied on his saints to continue the work of creation by protecting men in the world

Countless stories surround the life of these African gods who relied on their individual powers to overcome each other in case of a battle. As mentioned before, the Cuban blacks immediately identified these gods with the saints of the Catholic Church to protect themselves from the plantation owners who prevented them from turning to

In Miami, the most popular saints are: Chango, who takes on male characteristics, although represented by Saint Barbara, a powerful warrior in Africa. In Cuba she was the patron saint of artillerymen as well as of

miners; Ochun, Our Lady of Charity, the devotee through the top of the head, the most important part of his body. Then, the believer would adopt the personality of the particular orisha. This type of possession by a spirit, however, is not too common in Miami today.

What is most common in Miami, however, is the use of idols and precious stones. All orishas are subject to this representation, for each one of them can be identified with a particular stone. Each stone, representing the saint, dwells in the altars built at home next to the statues of the saints or within a vase that is called a sopera because its similarities to a soup bowl.


ANOTHER feature common in Miami is the use of necklaces. Once again, each orisha is identified with a particular necklace which the believer receives in a ceremony as his gradual initiation into the religion develops: thus, necklaces are the first step toward complete brotherhood in this religion. Moreover, each orisha is identified with a special animal which pleases him; thus, the offering of animals to the orisha is a common practice among these believers today.

In Miami, the growth of Santeria is also manifested by the growth of its priests or santeros. They can be of either sex and their aim is to serve the individual in his need. The difficulty arises when one begins to understand that this service requires a large amount of money, which causes great hardship among the people. In spite of this hardship, however, people turn to Santeria more now than ever before. This fact should make anyone stop and wonder. What need is Santeria satisfying in the lives of these people? Why has it spread so rapidly among all classes of the population? What can we, the Church, do about it?
